Thank you for updating me on the status of Fr Lirette.

With respect to Fr Osgood and this is what I have learned:

did call the Diocese originally on March 21, 2002 to report the abuse by Fr. Osgood which had occurred in the late 1950's or early 1960's. At that time he told Joe Naff of NH Catholic Charities that he only wanted to report his experiences to the Diocese and not to law enforcement.

on May 7, 2002 and a second letter on September 16, 2002 in Joe sent a follow-up letter to to report the incidents to the NH Attorney General's office or to the which he encouraged Hillsborough County Attorney. Joe did not hear back from him until he received a call from the afternoon of 12/17/03 at 3:00pm. Apparently had recently received an invitation from Joe to attend a retreat day on January 17, 2004. Apparently this letter prompted s call in to Joe. said his mother died this past summer and he had been back in NH which triggered memories of his abuse by Fr. Osgood. In his conversation with Joe Naff, Mr. Osgood asked if the whereabouts of Fr. Osgood was known. Joe told him that he didn't know either his whereabouts or Father Osgood's current status; he only knew that Fr Osgood had reportedly abandoned ministry many years ago. In that he would inquire at the Diocese and would let him know if there was any Joe Naff also told new or further information that he could share with him about Fr. Osgood's status. Joe also asked if he thought some counseling would be helpful to him because of the memories that he has been experiencing and he said that he as been in counseling. Balso asked about the Diocese's involvement with the Attorney General's office and Joe informed him of the AG's investigation last year, the agreement reached in December 2002 and the reporting requirements of the Diocese to the AG's office effective December 2002. seemed satisfied with the conversation and did not request anything further from Joe. After receiving your email, I learned separately from Diane Quinlan that just last week she spoke with Mark Abramson, and asked him if he knew Donald Osgood's whereabouts. He sent the following address for him: Donald Osgood

The Diocese had been trying to track him down for a long time (we thought he was in CA). He abandoned ministry many years ago, and we did not know where he was. Mark Abramson told Dlane that Osgood said that he is dying of cancer. He doesn't know if it is true or not. (Either Mark or someone from his office spoke with him months ago—we don't know if his status has changed since.) The Diocese then sent a letter last week notifying the bishop in GA that we understand that Mr. Osgood lives in his diocese.

This is the most current information I was able to obtain from Diocesan officials. Please let me know if you would like any other information. I assume you will provide the same an update.
