

Regarding Fr. Timothy Murray...

Effective August 22, 2004, Fr. Timothy Murray, 54, pastor of St. Edith Parish, Livonia, has been placed on an administrative leave of absence and restricted from any public ministry.

The Archdiocesan Review Board has deemed substantive an allegation of sexual misconduct with a minor involving Fr. Murray dating back to the early years of his ministry in the Detroit archdiocese.

Preliminary information about the allegation was received this past spring by the archdiocese and immediately shared with civil authorities, who chose, because of the passage of time, not to investigate the allegation further.



Subsequently, the Archdiocesan Review Board commissioned an investigation that found the complaint to be of sufficient substance to recommend the placement of a temporary restriction on Fr. Murray's service as a priest. Fr. Murray has cooperated fully in this process.

Msgr. Gerald Flanigan, a senior (retired) priest in the archdiocese, has been appointed temporary administrator of St. Edith Parish until September 7, when Fr. Paul Ballien, currently associate pastor of Holy Family Parish, Novi, will become administrator of the parish.
