Dear Excellency,

On December 29, we met with you and Mr. Ford. At that time, we had information we needed to tell you in person and, in turn, you needed to hear regarding Father Miller and our son. [REDACTED] MS-6. He came to you in good faith asking for your total support. Indeed, your faith is our faith - we share a special bond. He thought we had that support when you acted genuinely concerned about [REDACTED]. MS-6

In the meantime, there was no interference from us with Father Miller's farewell affairs at St. Elizabeth parish. After Father's departure and his evaluation was completed, we expected some response from your office.

Since it has been three and one-half months now, something needs to be settled. There is a definite need for justice. It seems you have forgotten that [REDACTED] MS-6 is the victim. No words can describe the pain this has caused. There is a tremendous amount of anger, along with feelings of betrayal. Trust will need to be rediscovered. You better believe a lot of tears have been shed over this occurrence.

One that perhaps would have been avoided had help been given to Father Miller previously. We have grandsons, and we desperately hope and pray that nothing like this ever happens to them.

We want you to know that we strongly support our son and daughter-in-law in whatever decisions they feel they need to make in order for this matter to come to an end. Everyone needs to get his/her life on track again.
