"The Chapter decides that the Director, whilst giving the Religious his traveling money, shall also give him a written or printed note on which shall be indicated the sum given, and which the Religious shall give back at his return, properly filled out, with a detailed list of his expenses and the sum of money still remaining. This statute is applicable to all changes of residence involving expenses. The Vade Mecum is to be returned to the Provincial by the Director as soon as possible after the return of the Religious" (General Chapter of 1896, page 125. (General Chapter of 1939, pages 374 and 375).

8. It is recommended to continue the laudable custom of saying the Litany of the Blessed Virgin before each journey for the personal safety of the Religious.

NOTA BENE

- 1. "When a Religious goes to a place where the Society has an establishment, he may not lodge outside the community, not even with his parents or relatives" (Const., Art. 248). Religious are requested to notify Directors about their arrival several days in advance.
- 2. "Never should the lay religious consider himself a secular. If by his costume he differs less from the people of the world than the members of other Institutes, he is all the more bound to distinguish himself from seculars by a grave and modest exterior (Const., Art. 351).
- 3. "Mental and vocal prayers are performed preferably before the Blessed Sacrament" (Const., Art.128). It is suggested that the Religious take with him his Formulary and a copy of the Imitation of Christ.
- 4. "No present is solicited; none is accepted unless for the community or for the chapel. Every personal present is refused" (Const., Art. 40).
- 5. "The Religious ... denies himself familiarities and every unbecoming liberty ... especially does he avoid persons of the other sex" (Const., Art. 46). "In the vigilance which he exercises over his senses and in the privations which chastity imposes he finds a source of merit and consolations" (Const., Art. 47).
- 6. "Mortification directs and sanctifies the use of the senses by the holiness of the intention. There is for the professed nothing beautiful, nothing agreeable or curious to see or hear solely for the purpose of procuring for himself some gratification, after the manner of the world. Worldly amusements, futile conversations, frivolous correspondence, or

Dear Father Vasey,

I am sending to you the original copy of my letter to Father Tutas and the original copy of the letter of Brother Bernard Pleimann in which he requests a dispensation from his perpetual vows. I am doing this, so that you can act upon this immediately, if that is your agreement with the General Administration.

I am sending carbon copies of all this material to Father Tutas, and I am sending it directly to the General Administration and not to Africa.

At the present I do not know of any other religious in the Province with perpetual vows who are thinking of asking for a dispensation. This is good news, and I hope that I am not too optimistic, for the end of the school year has not yet come nor have we gone through the summer. However at present it seems that only a couple of temporary professed will be asking not to renew their vows this summer. It looks, therefore, as though our perseverance rate this year will be good. I hope this is so and such is our prayer.

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

Dear Father Tutas:

I am enclosing with this letter the correspondence of Brother Bernard Pleimann addressed to Pope Paul VI in which Brother Pleimann asks for a dispensation from his perpetual vows of poverty, chastity, obedience and stability.

As Brother Pleimann indicates in his letter to His Holiness, Pope Paul VI, he was professed in the Society of Mary in 1935. Because Brother Pleimann is already in his middle fifties, we have endeavored to dissuade him from seeking a dispensation. Several years ago, Brother Pleimann wanted to ask for a dispensation, and I at that time dissuaded him. On this occasion when he first wrote to me telling me about his intention to seek a dispensation, I asked Brother Roger Richter, the Assistant Provincial, who was going to visit Japan to talk to Brother Pleimann about this. Brother Pleimann does not want to be dissuaded from seeking a dispensation at this time.

I have consulted with members of the Provincial Council, and we agree that we should send to you this letter of Brother Pleimann asking for a dispensation.



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



#### NOTA BENE

- 1. "When a Religious goes to a place where the Society has an establishment, he may not lodge outside the community, not even with his parents or relatives" (Const., Art. 248). Religious are requested to notify Directors about their arrival several days in advance.
- 2. "Never should the lay religious consider himself a secular. If by his costume he differs less from the people of the world than the members of other Institutes, he is all the more bound to distinguish himself from seculars by a grave and modest exterior (Const., Art. 351).
- 3. "Mental and vocal prayers are performed preferably before the Blessed Sacrament" (Const., Art.128). It is suggested that the Religious take with him his Formulary and a copy of the Imitation of Christ,
- 4. "No present is solicited; none is accepted unless for the community or for the chapel. Every personal present is refused" (Const., Art. 40).
- 5. "The Religious ... denies himself familiarities and every unbecoming liberty ... especially does he avoid persons of the other sex" (Const., Art. 46). "In the vigilance which he exercises over his senses and in the privations which chastity imposes he finds a source of merit and consolations" (Const., Art. 47).
- 6. "Mortification directs and sanctifies the use of the senses by the holiness of the intention. There is for the professed nothing beautiful, nothing agreeable or curious to see or hear solely for the purpose of procuring for himself some gratification, after the manner of the world. Worldly amusements, futile conversations, frivolous correspondence, or

reading, pleasure excursions, exist no longer for him; he shuns such disedifying crowds as vain curiosity attracts sometimes even to the church" (Const., Art.171).

7. "The Chapter decides that the Director, whilst giving the Religious his traveling money, shall also give him a written or printed note on which shall be indicated the sum given, and which the Religious shall give back at his return, properly filled out, with a detailed list of his expenses and the sum of money still remaining. This statute is applicable to all changes of residence involving expenses. The Vade Mecum is to be returned to the Provincial by the Director as soon as possible after the return of the Religious" (General Chapter of 1896, page 125. (General Chapter of 1939, pages 374 and 375).

8. It is recommended to continue the laudable custom of saying the Litany of the Blessed Virgin before each journey for the personal safety of the Religious.



#### BRO. BERNARD PLEIMANN, S.M.

Brother Bernard Pleimann, S.M., was born in Norwood, Ohio, shortly after the start of World War I. He received his elementary edu-

cation at SS. Peter and Paul in that city. After a year at Purcell High School in Cincinnati and two years as a postulant in Dayton, he entered the Society of Mary's Novitiate in 1934. He professed his first vows on August 15, 1935.

His first teaching assignment (1937) was at St. James, San Francisco, where he taught the fourth grade. After a year in California he was

sent to St. Mary's in Hilo, followed by a year at St. Louis College. He made his final vows in the St. Louis College Chapel in June 1940. After two years at Cathedral School, he returned to St. Louis College where he taught for the remainder of the years of World War II.

With the grade school on half day sessions, he organized a Victory Garden where he and a group of boys raised bumper crops of string beans and potatoes besides trying their luck at papayas, corn and peanuts. One of the highlights of their victory enterprise was the visit of the late Major Lester Petri who came to congratulate and encourage the boys in their project.

He returned to the mainland in 1945 aboard the SS Permamente under wartime restrictions with the first group of Brothers to visit their homes since the start of he war. Afer a year a St. John's Home in Brooklyn he returned to the Islands and St. Louis College. In 1947 he was appointed to St. Mary's in Hilo which later became St. Joseph's High School. Here he spent four years as math teacher, athletic director, and seismological observor for the Hawaiian Volcano Observatory. For his active work in seismology he won membership in the Seismological Society of America and the American Geophysical Union. He was in the last group of Brothers teaching in Hilo.

After a year of study at the University of Dayton and the University of San Francisco, he was

appointed to be math instructor at Junipero Serra High School in Gardena, California. Here he has shown great interest in the Advanced Math Program for Secondary Schools. He has been awarded National Science Foundation membership to two Summer Institutes — in 1958 to the University of Chicago and in 1959 to the University of Arizona.

- 1. "When a religious goes to a place where the Society has an establishment, he may not lodge outside the community, not even with his parents or relatives" (Const., Art 248). Religious are requested to notify Directors about their arrival several days in advance.
- 2 "Never should the lay religious consider himself a secular. If by his costume be differs less from the people of the world than the members of other Institutes, he is all the more bound to distinguish himself from seculars by a grave and modest exterior (Const., Art. 351).

#### HILO SEISMOGRAPH STATION

By Bernard Pleimann, S.M.

#### HISTORY

Just a little more than twenty-nine years ago the first seismograph station was established in Hilo, in the basement of one of the buildings of Saint Mary's School. It was of the single-component type, that is, it had one pendulum. Since the records could be made more valuable by means of an instrument with two components. mounted on bedrock, it was decided to install one at Hilo. Dr. Jaggar, then Director of the Hawaiian Volcano Observatory, made three seismographs. Two were sent to Alaska, and the other was destined for Hilo. In the summer of 1927 an underground vault was constructed in the south corner of Saint Mary's School property. The floor was on solid rock, and the heavy masses were hung in two corners. For years this location was ideal, since the temperature remained practically constant and outside disturbances were at a minimum. However, its peace was disturbed when Laimana Street was put through only fifteen feet away. The passage of every vehicle was then unavoidably recorded on the seismograph. Recordings of traffic can easily be distinguished from those of earth tremors; but if both occur at the same time, it may become difficult or even impossible to single out important phases of the earthquake, and thus the record becomes useless. Water seepage was also troublesome; after heavy showers the observer would find inches of water on the floor.

Earlier observers for this station were Brothers Matthias Newell, Albert Holtman, Maurice Sarver, and Edward Strauss, who preceded the present Director, Brother Bernard Pleimann. The scientists at the Volcano Observatory have often commented on the careful and exact work done by these teachers.

#### HILO'S NEW STATION

When Saint Joseph's School moved to its new location on Ululani Street, the time seemed propitious for moving the station. A place for it was found midway between Ululani and Kapiolani streets, about eighty feet from Hualalai Street. This would be far enough from traffic and in a place where, it was hoped, future developments would bring no new troubles. In July, 1949, the two concrete piers to hold the masses were made. The base of each is several feet below the surrounding surface. To prevent the expansion of the floor from putting pressure on the piers a space was allowed between piers and floor. The shelter was built by the Hawaiian Volcano Research Association, after the cement work had had a chance to age and settle.

The seismograph, constructed in 1947, was being used as a tiltmeter at the Volcano Observatory. After the shelter in Hilo was ready for the instrument, pressure began to show under Mauna Loa and Kilauea, and it was deemed advisable to postpone installation until the pressure eased. The new station was finally put into operation on October 23, 1950. It is operated as part of the network of the United States Geological Survey's Hawaiian Volcano Observatory. The coordinates are 19° 43′.2 N and 155° 51′.3 W.




Fig. 2. The seismograph.

#### THE SEISMOGRAPH

The new seismograph, a modified Bosch-Omori, was built in the machine shop at the Volcano Observatory by Burton Loucks. Each of the lead-filled cylinders of this machine weighs 250 pounds. The horizontal pendulum hangs by a wire from the top of the pier. The bottom, equipped with a double pin, fits into a spring which is several inches inside of the pier. The free swinging period has been set at three




Fig. 3. Seismograph details: a, hinge at wall; b, pen lever system.

seconds, to increase sensitivity to local shocks. Oil damping is employed to steady the heavy masses. Magnification is 200; higher magnification is undesirable because of the frequent local earthquakes, one of which, occurring as recently as December 10, 1950, was so severe as to dismantle the instrument. To the mass is attached an aluminum boom stiffened by guy wires. At the end of the boom a loose, light aluminum bar is coupled to the writing arm. A stainless-steel needle set in jeweled bearings does the writing on smoked paper. The paper is wrapped tightly around a drum which is turned by an escapment clock set to make two revolutions an hour. A screw on one end of the drum makes it gradually move vertically. Time control is supplied by a Telechron clock. The paper is changed every twenty-four hours. Future plans call for an electrically driven clock revolving four times an hour. This

will necessitate an extra change of paper each day, but the extra attention required will repay itself with more accurate and more easily readable results.

#### Notes on the Seismograph (Figures 2 and 3)

The roller-like device seen at the top of the drum is a coil to magnetize the bar to lift the needles

The roller-like device seen at the top of the drum is a coil to magnetize the bar to lift the needles every minute.

The diagram (drawn by Wilbert Chang) shows the writing arm. It is a hollow aluminum tube. The part behind the balancing pin is loaded to balance the forepart.

The bar is the couple between the writing arm and the boom. The V-shaped bend is on the bar so that weights in the form of washers may be added if the machine dismantles too easily.

Hinge device.—A cantilever spring is used. The mass is equipped with a double pin which fits into the bar that is connected to the spring.

Damping device.—The oil cups were "Spam" cans, The resistance is given by a thin double aluminum prong (2 by 3 ins.). The cups are attached to the frame of the drum support.







When evaluations are made, factors such as size, type, location of school, financial support available, and state requirements should not be permitted to justify failure to provide an appropriate program and facilities to meet the needs of the pupils and community served by the school. The twofold nature of the work—evaluation and stimulation to improvement—should also be kept in mind. Careful, discriminating judgment is essential if these purposes are to be served satisfactorily.

#### **CHECKLISTS**

The checklists consist of provisions, conditions, or characteristics found in good secondary schools. All of them may not be necessary, or even applicable, in every school. A school may therefore lack some of the items listed but have other compensating features. The checklists are intended to provide the factual bases for the evaluations.

The use of the checklists requires five symbols. (1) If the provision called for in a given item of a checklist is made extensively, mark the item in the parentheses preceding it with the symbol " $\sqrt{}$ " (double check); (2) if the provision is made to some extent, mark the item with the symbol " $\sqrt{}$ "; (3) if the provision or condition is made to a very limited extent, mark the item with the symbol "X"; (4) if a provision is missing but is needed, mark the item with the symbol "M"; (5) if any provision or condition is missing and is not desirable or appropriate for the school, mark such item with the symbol "N." In brief, mark items:

√ provision or condition is made to some extent

X provision or condition is very limited

M provision or condition is missing but needed

N provision or condition is not desirable or does not apply

Space is provided at the end of each checklist for writing in additional items. It is desirable that the provisions or practices of the school should be described as completely as possible.

#### **EVALUATIONS**

Evaluations represent the best judgment of those making the evaluations after all evidence (including results of observation of the school and discussions with the school staff, consideration of ratings on checklist items and data presented by the school, and experience of evaluators in other schools) has been considered. Evaluations should be made first by members of the school staff. These evaluations will be checked by members of the visiting committee at the time the school is visited. They are to be made by means of the rating scale as defined below.

- 5.—Excellent; the provisions or conditions are extensive and are functioning excellently.
- 4.—Very good;*

a. the provisions or conditions are extensive and are functioning well, or

- b. the provisions or conditions are moderately extensive but are functioning excellently,
- 3.—Good; the provisions or conditions are moderately extensive and are functioning well.
- 2.--Fair;*
  - a. the provisions or conditions are moderately extensive but are functioning poorly, or
  - b. the provisions or conditions are limited in extent but are functioning well.
- 1.—Poor; the provisions or conditions are limited in extent and are functioning poorly.
- M.—Missing; the provisions or conditions are missing and needed; if present, they would make a contribution to the educational needs of the youth in this community.
- N.—Does not apply; the provisions or conditions are missing but do not apply or are not desirable for the youth of this school or community. (Reasons for the use of this symbol should be explained in each case under Comments.)

^{*} If, in making the self-evaluation, members of the school staff wish to indicate which of the alternatives given for evaluations "4" or "2" applies, they may use "4a" or "4b," "2a" or "2b."

# Statement of Guiding Principles

A competent staff is one of the indispensable elements of a good school. Such a staff should not be merely a collection of individually competent persons. It should be a cooperating group having common purposes and motivated by common ideals. Each member of such a staff should give evidence of awareness and understanding of educational problems and should show continuous professional growth. Before election to the staff, each member should produce evidence of adequate preparation for his particular task and possession of such personal traits as are requisite to teaching and to associating with youth. Diversity of preparation and viewpoints is desirable for a well-rounded staff, but its members should have the ability and desire to work together cheerfully, harmoniously, and efficiently for the good of the school and its pupils.

In the selection of individual staff members, attention should be given to teaching ability, personality, health, and character. Each staff member should have broad general scholarship, extensive preparation in his special field, professional competence, and reasonable social development.

The tens digit changes 1 in 8 + 6 and in 5 + 7, thus, it must change one in 18 + 6 and in 45 + 7. Absorbing these ideas you easily moved on to single columns. Then upon learning the rule of "carrying" you proceeded without too much trouble to the addition of several columns. Let's observe the following example:

Adding the units column gives you 23. The 3 is put in the units column and the 2 which is a tens is carried to the next column, the tens. By adding 2 to the tens column we are in reality adding 20. Adding the tens we get 16 (actually 160). We put the 6 in the tens position and carry 1 to the hundreds column. What are we really adding when the 1 is carried? Do you see that by carrying the 1 to the hundreds we are adding 100? Adding the last column you get 17. Thus, the answer to this addition is 1753.

#### SUBTRACTION

Subtraction is the inverse of addition. One who knows the addition wable should have little treable in solving simple subtraction problems. To subtract 5 from 8, you ask yourself what number added to 5 will give you 3 ..., thus, 3.

Many students have trouble with "borrowing". Let's use "436 = 148" as an example and illustrate "borrowing" by showing all the work.

You would start this problem

by saying 8 from 6, 6 is too small so borrow 1 from 3 making it 2 and adding it to the 6 asking it 16. Then, 8 from 16 is 8. I from 2, and then by "borrowing" we get 4 from 12 is 8. When, 1 from 3 is 2. Answer is 288. There are many things in the above method that often bothers thinking students. They would inquire... if I add a to 6 would I not get 7 instead of 16? How can this be clarified? We must go back to our number system...the 1 we see taking is in the tens column and is then cotually a 10 and adding it to 6, we do get 16. Similarly, torsowing the 1 off of the 4 in the hundreds column you are borrowing 100 and adding it to the 2, which is really 20, you get 120.

Perhaps, by writing the numbers as sums you will understand the borrowing method a lit le between. Using the above problem as an example:

#### MULTIFLICATION

Usually in the third or fourth grade you learned these tables as fir as the 12s. This was not really necessary. If you knew from 1 to 9 you could han he any number. For example:  $8 \times 426.$ . Since  $6 \times 8$  is 48, we put the 8 in the units place and hold the 4 for the tens. Then,  $8 \times 2 = 10$  and the 4 is 20, we put the 0 in the tens place and hold the 2 for the hundreds. Finally,  $8 \times 4 + 2 = 34$ . Thus, the answer is 3408. Or putting it a little differently, it would be done as follows:

$$(8 \times 6) + (8 \times 20) + (8 \times 400) = 48 + 160 + 3200 = 3408$$

To go on to any multiplication presents little difficulty. Take for example, 426 x 138

The Eight multiplies as in the previous example. The 3 in our multiplier, 138, is in the tens place so it is really 30. The product is 12780. The 1 in the hundreds place is a 100. loo x 426 = 42600 and the sum of these products is the answer, 58788. Usually the zeros at the end of the number are dropped for simplicity.

#### DIVISION

Division is the inverse of multiplication. It is a shorten form of subtraction. Many can see how multiplication is a shorten form of addition but few have h.d. it explained how division is a quicken subtraction. If you want to divide 56 by 7 you were told to ask yourself what number multiplied by 7 gives 56 ... obviously from the multiplication table 8. Suppose you wanted to divide 258 by 72 using subtraction.

Since we were able to subtract 72 three complete times, the answer of "258 + 72" is 3 and a remainder of 42.

If the divisor has more than one digit we called this long division, for example, 14950 446

The aboved method is familiar to all who have studied Arithmetic. Let's do the problem by repeated subtraction and compare this to the method we have learned in our elementary schools.

Thus, it can be seen that we had to take three (46 x 100), then  $\underline{\text{two}}$  (46 x 10) and finall,  $\underline{\text{five}}$  (46 x 1) or we had to take 325 x 46 to get 14950. In other words,  $14950 \div 46 = 325$ . NOTE The method that the Calculator uses to solve division is by this repeated subtraction method. Multiplication is done by repeated addition. If it is possible get a demonstration of how to multiply and divide on a Calculator.

Problems: Divide 63452 by 396. (a) first by the usual long division method. (b) try to do it by repeated subtraction. (c) try to see the relation between "long division and repeated subtraction.

#### DECIMAL SYSTEM

Before proceeding let us try to understand our number system a little better. It is called decimal because it is based on ten or powers of ten. Take the number 3487. From what we have learned about the position of numbers, the 3 stands for 3000, the 4 for 400, the 8 for 80 and the 7 for 7.

thus, 300 + 400 + 80 + 7 = 3487Now, since  $10^3 = 1000$ ,  $10^2 = 100$ ,  $10^1 = 10$  and  $10^0 = 1$ I can rewrite the above number as a power of 10

$$3(10)^3 + 4(10)^2 + 8(10)^1 + 7(10)^0$$

We now have the number 3487 written to the power of our base, 10.

To write a number that is in decimal notation to the power of ten requires a knowledge of negative exponents. The following values will be given as true.

$$10^{-1} = \frac{1}{10}$$
 or .1  $10^{-2} = \frac{1}{100}$  or .01  $10^{-3} = \frac{1}{1000}$  or .0001

The above values need to be known in order to write a number that is a decimal. Using 32.586 as an example. We will first write it as a sum of whole numbers and fractions.

then, as a sum of the powers of ten,

It should be noted that it is written is successive descending powers of ten. Always have the power of ten in succession even when there are zeros in the number. Writing 60.03 as a power of 10.

#### NUMBER SYSTEMS AND NUMBER BASES:

Our number system to the base 10 need not be the only system. Any number may be used as a base. As mentioned previously the base "10" came into use because of the correspondence with the digits on our hands. If we fully understand the decimal number system it is somewhat easy to deal with numbers of other bases. We are going to select a different base and follow a procedure of developing this system similar to the one given beginning on page 1. Later you are going to be assigned a number and you will have to use a similar process to develop a system with that humber as base.

Let's chose the number "8" as the base of our new number system. We can even give this system a name. Let's call it the "octary" system.

#### OCTARY SYSTEM

This system has eight symbols: 0, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7. With these eight symbols we can represent any amount, however large.

### Changing a decimal number to "Octary"

If we want to resent a number in the "octary" system we have to write this number as a poxwer of "8". Let's use 428 to illustrate the methol. Since we have to represent 428 as the sum of the powers of 3 we calculate the value of some powers of 3.

Method:  $8^3$  is too large. We take  $8^2$  or 64 and see how many times it is contained into 428...6 and a remainder of 44...5 or 8 is contained into 44...5 and a remainder of 45...4 Or 1 is contained into 45...4

or, 428 in the decimal system is equivalent to 654 in the "octary" system. We usually represent this as:

$$(428)_{LO} = (654)_8$$

. Working out another example should help to clarify things.

$$(705)_{10} = (?)_{8}$$

Note that they are written in the descending powers of 8 the same way that we wrote the numbers as the descending powers of 10.

### Changing an "octary" number to a decimal:

If you understand what a number written to the base is this will be rather simple. Let us illustrate with the octary number 4203.

$$(4203)_8 = (?)_{10}$$

Simply write this as a power of "8"  $4(8)^{3} + 2(8)^{2} + o(8)^{1} + 3(8)^{0} = 2688 + 128 + 0 + 3 = 2819$ 

or, 
$$(4203)_8 = (2819)_{10}$$

#### BUBTRAUTION:

Since substraction in the inverse of addition we can use our addition table to solve subtraction.

To subtrees 6 from 12 you must ask yourself what number added to 6 will give you 12. We can readily do this on the table. Find 6 in the vertical column, rove horizortally to the right until 12 which is found in the "4" column.

Thus. 12 - 6 = 4.

or trying 3 from It ... Did yoy get 6?

Subtracting larger number will necessitate "borrowing". Forrowing in the "octary" system is done in the same manner as it is done in the decimal.

METHOD: Since 6 is too small, "borrow" making it 16 = 7 = 7. The 5 has become a 2, and is too small. Borrowing we get 12 = 4 = 6. Thus, 3 = 1 = 2. Thus the answer is 267.

#### MULTIPLICATION

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#### DIVISION

Division is the inverse of multiplication. In the "octary" system as in the decimal, if you want to divide say 36 by 5, you must ask yourself what number multiplied by 5 will be 36. The answer can be found by consulting your multiplication table. There we can see that  $5 \times 6 = 36$ . Thus, 36 + 5 = 6.

Let's solve one a little more difficult, for example,

432 + 6

METHOD: first you think what number times 6 is glose to 43... 6 x 5 = 36. Thus, 6 goes into 43... 5 times and a remainder of 5. The remainder of 5 is put along side the next number 2. Then, 52... 6 = 7. The answer is 57...

This can easily be proved by multiplication.

Let's try one with more than one digit in the divisor. For example: 17570 ÷ 46

METHOD: Trial dividing.. 4 into 17 goes about 3. Putting the 3 over the 5 you multiply 3 by 46 giving 162. Subtract 162 from 175 is 13. Bringing down the 7 and trial dividing 4 into 13 gives us 2. Multiplying 2 by 46 is 114. 137  $\sim$  114 = 23. When the 00 is brought down we have 230. 23  $\Rightarrow$  4 = 6. Then 4 x 46 = 230. Subtracting there will be no remainder. Thus, 17570  $\Rightarrow$  46 = 326.

It would be interesting to solve this problem by repeated subtraction. Refer to the section on page 7 and try to solve this using the octary system.

Here is how you start:

If there are reaminders it can be written as a fraction in the same manner that was done in the decimal. In the next section there will be more on fractions.

EXERCISE: Divide the following. Prove by multiplication.

FRACTION3: These may be difined as parts of the whole.

They represent a division. The upper number called the numerator is the dividend and the lower number called the denominator is the divisor.

We can have fractions in the octary system. The rules that you learned in Arithmetic will be the same if you have to use octary numbers.

First, let us see how to change from one system to another.

Here are some examples. From these see if you can devise the method
