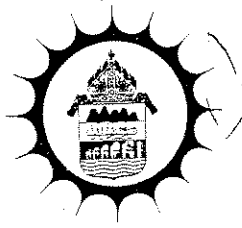

## MICHAEL PETERSON ORDAINED PRIEST

Among those ordained to the priesthood for the Archdiocese of Washington this spring was Fr. Michael Robert Peterson, who was ordained by His Eminence, William Cardinal Baum on Saturday, May 6, at St. Matthew's Cathedral. During the two and a half years of his residence at the Abbey while studying for the priesthood, Fr. Peterson got to know not only the members of our monastic community but also many of our friends and acquaintances. We accordingly wish to take this opportunity both to wish Fr. Peterson every blessing as he begins his priestly ministry and to inform our readers about the interesting and challenging way in which Fr. Peterson hopes to combine this with the healing ministry he has already practiced for some years as a psychiatrist.

Born in 1943 in Seattle, Washington, Fr. Peterson did his undergraduate studies at Stanford, graduating with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1964. From there, he entered the Medical School of the University of California at San Francisco. After receiving his M.D. in June of 1968, he served for a year as a medical intern at the University of Washington Hospital in Seattle and afterwards was for six years a commissioned officer of the U.S. Public Health Service, serving much of that time as a resident in psychiatry at the Langley Porter Neuropsychiatric Institute in San Francisco and as a research scientist at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Maryland.

During these years, when much of his time was spent serving the emotionally disturbed, Dr. Peterson came more and more to see that many of his patients' needs were spiritual and not simply medical in a narrow sense of that term. The possibility of serving such persons as an ordained minister of the Church as well as a physician came to occupy much of his thinking about the future, especially if that service could be extended in a significant way to those who were themselves priests, brothers, and sisters. Dr. Peterson was accordingly accepted as a candidate for the priesthood for the Archdiocese of Washington and was given permission to reside here at the Abbey while pursuing his seminary courses, many of which were given at the nearby De Sales Hall School of Theology.

During his seminary years, Dr. Peterson was not only a student, but continued his psychiatric practice and also taught courses in the Department of Psychiatry at Georgetown University, at Mount Saint Mary's Seminary in Emmitsburg, Maryland, at the Washington Theological Union in Silver Spring, and at Loyola College in Baltimore. He received the ministries of reader and of acolyte at conventual Mass at the Abbey on May 1 and May 29, 1976, and was ordained to the diaconate by Bishop Thomas Lyons on March 26, 1977, at St. Thomas the Apostle Church. In January of the present year Dr. Peterson took up residence at St. Bernardine's Rectory in Suitland, Maryland, on property adjacent to the Saint Luke Institute which he is founding and whose nature and purpose will be described in the following paragraphs.

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During his years of medical practice, Fr. Peterson came to see that the disease of alcoholism and other drug dependencies spare priests and religious no more than they spare laymen and laywomen; it was equally clear that the vast majority of those suffering from these diseases receive little or no adequate treatment. Although there are no good statistical data about the extent of this problem among priests and religious in the United States, the National Clergy Conference on Alcoholism has estimated that approximately 6000 priests, 1000 brothers, and 8000 sisters are affected, of whom scarcely more than ten percent are in some stage of recovery. With the full support of Cardinal Baum and other members of the hierarchy both in Washington and elsewhere, Fr. Peterson has therefore assembled a professional staff and is going ahead as fast as financial support permits to provide an innovative and complete health care center for the treatment of alcoholic priests, brothers, and sisters. (He also is setting up a similar, though smaller facility at Marsalin Institute in Holliston, Massachusetts, a center founded and directed by our Fr. Jerome Hayden until his death in July of 1977. Marsalin's Board of Directors see this as an excellent way of carrying on the kind of apostolate to which Fr. Jerome devoted so much of his time and energy for many years.)

In the statement of founding principles of the Saint Luke Institute, Fr. Peterson speaks of those coming to the Institute as being received with a love, warmth, and true concern akin to that described in our own Benedictine Rule, in the chapter on the reception of guests: "All guests to the monastery should be welcomed as Christ, because he will say, 'I was a stranger, and you took me in.' Show them every courtesy, especially servants of God and pilgrims. . . . The greeting and farewell should be offered with great humility; with bowed head and a prostrate body all shall honor in the guests the person of Christ, for it is Christ who is really being received."

The healing process is seen by Fr. Peterson as involving six stages, of which the first is an individual's recognition that he or she is an alcoholic. Because the religious superiors of such persons may at first have difficulty learning how to help the person through this most difficult moment, members of the staff of the Saint Luke Institute will be available to travel to the

diocese or religious community to assist at this time of decision. At the center itself, every attempt will be made from the very beginning to improve the physical health of the guest. For this, there will be an acute detoxification medical unit, as well as a transitional detoxification area, and the availability of a physician and registered nurse at all times for the medical care of the guest.

Following this second stage, physiological renewal, begins the stage of psychological focusing, which has two facets: participation in the excellent programs of Alcoholics Anonymous in the Washington area, and individual and group therapy programs conducted by the professional staff at the Institute. Next comes the fourth stage, educational focusing, which will include not only education at the Institute about the disease of alcoholism but also continuing education in theological issues and updating in methods and approaches to pastoral ministry. Fr. Peterson feels that the many theologians who teach in seminaries and schools of theology in the metropolitan area will provide an excellent resource group for lecture series and workshops.

As the end of the recovery period nears for each guest, he or she will be encouraged to leave the Institute during the day to take an active part in some area of ministry in the Washington area: hospital ministry, campus ministry, teaching, parish work, and the like. This fifth stage will then be followed by a program of reintegration of the guest into his or her religious community or diocese. In order that this goal may be most satisfactorily attained, there will be an active communication between the staff of the Institute and the guest's religious superior or Ordinary throughout the recovery process. Furthermore, a member of the staff will accompany the guest at the end of his or her stay back to the religious community or diocese so as to assist further with this final stage of reintegration.

Clearly, this is a significant undertaking, aiming to alleviate the suffering of some of the workers in the Lord's vineyard and to restore them to the full exercise of their vocation of helping bring in the harvest.
