I have a meeting on Tuesday, August 25 with Tim Quinn and Andy Lisenzimmer.

I met on Tuesday, August 18 with Eishop John Vlazny, the new Ershop of Winona and Bishop Robert Brom, Bishop of Buluth.

Bishop Brom had indicated a need on his part to talk to both of us about the Adamson situation and I welcomed that opportunity.

Bishop Brom made it very clear that what he indicated would have to be held in some confidence, though I am able to communicate this verbally to our attorneys, but the material may not be used other than as background information for ourselves.

Bishop Brom told me that at the time Adamson moved to the Archdiocase he had indicated to Bishop Watters that it was grossly unfair not to inform me of what Bishop Watters knew about Father Adamson. At the time Bishop Brom was Vicar General of the Diocese of Winona. Sishop Watters' response to that was that if I needed to know more about Father Adamson I should get it from the Consultation Services Center where Adamson had been a client. As Bishop Brom pushed the matter, Bishop Watters became angry.

Bishop Watters further went into what Bishop Brom describes as more and more a state of denial about the whole question and he really believes that Bishop Watters at this point has convinced himself that there was no injustice in his not giving us more information than he did.

Bishop Brom believes that Bishop Watters has convinced attorney Hull of this whole question and that Hull is in a sense, a victim of Bishop Watters rather than the other way around.

The most encouraging part of the conversation was that Bishop vlazny has told Hull that he is to withdraw any cross-filing against the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis. Bishop vlazny also is persuaded that he must either replace Hull as attorner for the diocese, or if that is not possible, obtain the services of another attorney to whom he will turn over the major responsibility for the pursuit of the Adamson case.



Efforts to relive the past or to plan for the impossible are unhealthy. I am concerned about your inactivity and the effect it has on your own sense of self-worth.

Your personal situation is a complex matter, I know. But as I said when we first met and I repeated more emphatically in March, it will not be possible for you to continue in the priestly ministry. I understand very well and appreciate the fact that you are not now functioning as a priest. But that is not enough. It is time for your to apply for laicization. I understand very well and appreciate the fact that you are not now functioning as a priest. But that is not enough. It is time for your to apply for laicization. When we met on March 4, I asked you to initiate the process. I have not heard from you since then, and I am requesting that you take the necessary steps immediately.

Tom, neither I nor any diocesan bishop will be able to license you for ministry in the future. That is a heavy price to pay for past mistakes, I realize, but any further delay only exacerbates the situation. It would be clearly irresponsible on my part to sustain or encourage any unrealistic expectations on your part. Please understand that.

Tom, you continue to have my prayerful support at this time. But I find no justifiable grounds for allowing your present status "in limbo" to continue. I look forward to hearing from you before the end of the month. God bless.

Kind greetings to you on this Good Shepherd Sunday !

I have you letter of April 18th and will attempt to respond to it as weell as giving you some update of my activities and efforts since our last visit.

I am grateful that the Riedle lawsuit has been settled and that the finalization of it has been announced publically. I thank you for your special effort in helping to promote the closing of that lawsuit. The other lawsuits remain and we all pray that they will get resolved as soon as possible. In correspondence this week from my attorney, Ted Collins, there does not seem to be any timetable on these other cases nor does there seem to be much happening at the moment. Hence there is very much which remains unsettled. In view of that it does not seem to be the time to make final decisions which have far-reaching effects on my present and future life.

As I mentioned in our last visit. I am in the fifth year of dealing with the lawsuit crisis. It has been a daily pressure. I do not think I have been unrealistic at any time about the consequences of my actions, the effects of the extensive and repetitive publicity, the many many who have shared in the pain, nor any other phase of the impossible process. At the same time I am not unaware of your responsibilities and concerns.

Since our visit on March 4th, as suggested, I have consulted with my regular legal, spiritual, and psychological advisors about many aspects of my life. I will be meeting with all of them again during the coming week. I have had some limited discussions with my family and friends conceaning what the future holds for me.

After making several additional applications I have been able to obtain some part-time work which is proving satisfactor thus far. It was good just to pass the scrutiny of the application process.

Also I have been able to increase my volunteer work, mainly with aiding the elderly in this area. I planned and was set to move in with an elderly couple at the beginning of April. The week before the planned move the woman had a serious stroke and probably will never return to her home. A daughter has come from Denver to help with the care, etc. It would have been a good situation for me and would have been a substantial savings in rent, etc.

Since our last visit I have experienced some physical medical problems which need attention. I pray that they will not prove to be too serious. I have arranged for a general checkup at Mayo Cliric for next monéth (All my medical history, records, examinations, etc. have been with Mayo). It has been exactly five years since I have had any medical checkup so I am past due. I also have not had an eye examination nor my reading glasses checked for five years so that is also overdue. The staff doctor who directed my last two general examinations, in 1978 and 1983, is William W. Douglas. He again will be in charge of the upcoming examination. You have my permission to check with him or to examine any of my past or current medical records.

I know these are very busy days for you with the Confirmation schedule and many other things on your appointment calendar. I will call within a few days to see if we can schedule a meeting time within the near future.

Thank you for your care and kindly continue to keep me in your daily prayers.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Father Thomas Adamson of Eau Claire, Wisconsin, was examined at the Mayo Clinic in May, 1988. He has a history of borderline elevations of his cholesterol, recurrent tendonitis at the right Achilles' insertion, vaque aching in his elbows after pushing a car in early February, 1988 and probable acute right renal colic in mid-April, 1988.

On physical examination he was a pleasant, outgoing, enthusiastic man who looked generally well. He weighed 193 pounds. He had a rightamblyopic eye and plantar thickening in areas where his plantar warts have been treated.

An excretory urogram showed no evidence of renal stones or other pathology. Mild degenerative changes of his lumbar spine were apparent. X-ray of the right ankle and foot showed an Achilles' spur with possible calcification in the associated bursa. I discussed injections of this area as an option if it becomes painful in the future. His plasma glucose was elevated to 118 mg/dL. He has a strong family history of diabetes. I advised him to continue his weight reduction to 180 pounds, recheck his blood sugar twice a year and avoid sweets and carbohydrates as well as alcohol. His cholesterol was 243 mg/dL, total with an HDL cholesterol of 38 mg/dL. I discussed the general principles including weight reduction and avoidance of cholesterol containing foods.

The remainder of his tests were normal including a rest electrocardiogram, chest x-ray, urinalysis, differential blood count, screening hematology, fecal hemoglobin, total thyroxine, serum sodium, potassium, calcium, total protein, alkaline phosphatase, GO transaminase, bilirubin, uric acid, creatinine, albumin, triglycerides and HDL cholesterol. A refraction was done while he was here.

Father Adamson was dismissed home with the following diagnoses: probable recent renal stone; plantar warts; right Achilles' tendonitis; PLAINTIFF'S EXHIBIT mild hypercholesterolemia; amblyopic right eye; and mild hyperglycemia.

Dr. Wm Douglas is aware of my legal entanglements and we discussed any possible relationships to my physical well-being.

The most unsettling experience since our last visit was a visit from a feature reporter named Robert Ehlert and a photographer from the Minneapolis Star and Tribune. It happened that I was showering when they arrived the first time and I did not admit them. They returned to my apartment twice more that same day. I never met them face-to-face and made it clear that I was not interested in an interview and that I had NO comments for them. Their persistence annoyed me greatly and the whole experience caused a resurgence of explosive feelings in areas which I thought I had put to rest. The possiblity of another feature article continues to bother me.

I have taken on another part time job, minimum pay but enjoyable so I am staying quite busy. I plan to move to another apartment a short distance from here at the end of the month. It is equally adequate to this one but considerably less expensive. I will give you my new address when I complete the move. My phone number should remain unchanged.

I trust that the Study Days, THM anniversary celebration, and the ordination will all be pleasant affairs. I enjoyed your column in the June Courier: On the other hand I was quite surprised by the strong and negative language of the WHEREAS'S in the Proposed Resolution # 3 on Priestly Morale from the May meeting. I wonder.

Thank you very much for coming to visit with me here in Winona this past Friday, August 25. I admire and appreciate all your efforts to pull your life together in spite of the continuing pressures and disappointments. You continue to have a very special remembrance in my prayers.

During our time together, once again I requested that you make application for a Decree of Laicization. This is my third request and I am hopeful that this time you will be willing to lend me your cooperation. I am asking you to request Father Donald Schmitz's assistance in this effort before Wednesday, September 13. It will take some time, but Don is familiar with these procedures.

Furthermore, the permission to celebrate private Mass which Bishop Watters gave to you a few years ago is now withdrawn effective immediately. You may not administer any of the sacraments nor are you to function as a minister of the Eucharist. You may not function as a priest in any public capacity. Please do not dress as a priest nor present yourself in any circumstances as a person working in public Church ministry.

At this time I am giving this directive as an individual precept as part of my responsibility to foster the good of the Church as well as your own good. You know that you are most welcome and encouraged to worship in the Catholic community but, for obvious reasons, you can no longer lead the people in worship.

Finally, from September through December of this calendar year, we must begin a time of disengagement from the Diocese of Winona. Please let Father Mahon know your financial situation in terms of monthly living expenses. Now that you are earning some salary, you should be able to meet some of these obligations on your own, but I want to

offer assistance for awhile so that you will have time to re-assess your living situation when all diocesan financial support is withdrawn.
