4/10/74 The problem is one of sexual identity with a recent incident that caused the Bishop to threaten him with removal from his parish and a hint of suspension. He is generally an open, warm, concerned person. His emotional life seems to be somewhat limited altho' his vacations are obviously an enjoyable time for him. A couple of adolescent experiences and I mentioned to him that he should consider the hurt that had come from them in his own life and how he might be introducing the same hurt into another person's life at even an earlier age. One priest and one serviceman relationship, two highschool incidents. I said that we would look at four or five things. One, was to increase the fear around the risk taking that he was doing in order to get this gratification; two, to realize that this is an island in his personality and to distance it even more; three, to look at the impulsive quality and that he does not intervene any rationalism between the stimulus and the response; four, that we should look at the personality configuration and his emotional limitations may be part of this. He is also a perfectionist and somewhat scrupulous. Five, that this has been a decreasing problem and we should accelerate that decrease; and sixth, he introduced the idea of a spiritual component in the picture. I said that we would work for 5 or 6 weeks on one of these dimensions or another and then look at

8/22/74 The experience in the East was painful in that it took so long and it was so regimented. I told him that one of our jobs would be to sift what insights he had received and see which of them were valid. I asked him to keep a log of feelings ~~experiences~~ he might have around his experiences now. We said that we should continue to look at the spiritual life as one of the supports in handling his difficulty. We should also make the counseling arrangement an opportunity for accountability. It looks like he will maintain his parish and that the Hartford experience was some kind of a trade-off on this.

9/74 Things have gone well for the three weeks. I advised him to have a regular confessor, to work on his attitude of absolute ~~abstinence~~ abstinence, to continue the balance in his life between work and relaxation, to be aware emotional experiences and try to log them, and to continue to sift the Hartford insights. He seems to be doing well.

10/1/74	Things continue to go well and I rescheduled for one month from today. The two or three things that we concluded should be done were the following: 1) that he should set up a regular, probably quarterly, spiritual direction appointment with Fr. Jensen. 2) he should come to know objectively who he is by looking at his real, ideal, and as-others-see-it self. I told him that I would be willing to do some psychological testing and probably offer him an Adjective Test list the next time he came in. He is doing well.
11/5/74	Things were still going well. He had not moved on the spiritual direction problem. We talked about his retreat and what might be gained from spiritual direction. I tried to make a distinction between counseling and spiritual direction in that our relationship should work itself out of business and the other should be continuous. He had an experience of anger to CCB teachers who refused to work on a unit on penance. We looked into this to find out what his alternative responses could be. We talked about his tendency to dominate and how he had been checked on this by the priests on the staff. He took the Adjective Test List and we can share those test results next time.
12/5/74	He continues to do well. I told him that our relationship might cease when he set up a firm relationship with a spiritual

to indicate a dominate cerebral leader type. He saw that his emotional side was less developed and I mentioned that his experience might be a way that he handles his emotions inappropriately. He said that having the relationship with him was a check on his balance behavior.

Dear Father Pierre,

I thought I would write a few lines to you and give you a few more of my thoughts and feelings following our telephone conversation yesterday. I realize the possibilities of some of my notions being a little narrow or rationalized but feel that I ought to express them anyhow. If I can work this borrowed typewriter.

One of the difficult things has been the lack of spiritual activity and direction at this place. There is a Catholic chaplain who comes on Wednesday and says Mass on Sundays but that is it. From the beginning it seemed to me that my problems were at least as much spiritual as psychological and I still think so.

The security and lack of personal freedoms has stunned me and I find ~~the~~ difficulty even with therapy because of the structure of everything. When they take your billfold, license, money, and the basic freedom to move about on one's own it really does something to you. Most of the people who are here come in not being able to function at all on the outside and I feel very different from that. I don't know what the sudden denial of freedom does to one's basic identity and personality but I find it too much too sudden. Little things like bed check every two hours at night, signing out to go out on the grounds, and never being able to leave the grounds, also make life here very difficult. All doors are locked at 8:00 p.m.

The persons I live with are in their late teens or early 20's and for the most part seem to have had drug problems. All the activities, socials, classes, etc. are directed more to their age. The uncouthness and vulgarity around the clock are unbelievable. Many are very content here and have been around for months and months. Some don't know what they would do on the outside.

The meetings with one's doctor are very sparse. — Never more than three times a week. For example, I saw my doctor on Thursday morning and that is it until Monday morning. I am free in between to walk the grounds, read, go to recreation and sports, or whatever. I don't think I need these things in such a confined environment. The doctors have all the answers about this total therapy but I don't but it.


It is nearing three months that I have had these special problems of mine on my mind almost around the clock. It will be five weeks that I have spent in this place. Some of it has been very helpful, e.g., the realization that I never want to be in a place like this again and a few new insights into myself which have come in ~~in~~ the doctor sessions.

Some funny things do happen and I pray that I won't lose my sense of humor.

Many thanks for your time and understanding. I hope some thing can be worked out when I return to Minnesota in a week.

This really frightened me, wondering what was going to happen there. Bishop Watters has now asked one of these men to stay on at St. Francis and help out until I return.

I still hope to return to your office and spend some time with you when the doctors are ready to say that that is the next step.

Many thanks for your willingness to listen and for your concern. I will be in touch with you.

1/14/75 He had moved to the Cities and had begun studies at the University. I told him that I thought this was too severe for the stage that he was at. Let that circumstances made it happen this way and that he should not take that into himself. We saw two things that we might work on especially his feelings about the Diocese and not becoming estranged from it and secondly, not to let this set back question his whole effort at coming away from his difficulties. He was caught in pressure being placed on the Bishop by a member of the family of priests who had been involved and had recently ended up in Guest House as a result of heavy drinking. He has handled it quite stably so far. He gets quite tearful when he talks about losing the parish because things had been going so well there.

1/23/75 He is still doing well even tho' he stopped in to the parish to help the new pastor get appointed. He sees his studies as somewhat in limbo but we talked about them as a sabbatical of sorts. I tried to help him adjust some of his thinking to be \_\_\_\_\_ at it rather than resentful about the past or remorseful about cooperating in the decision to leave. I told him that he had to think of his work and how he should reenter. I have always supported him in feeling that the present sacrifice was beyond what he

Dear Bishop Watters,

I am writing to report to you concerning the counseling which Father Thomas Adamson has been involved in with me since coming to live at St. Leo's parish in St. Paul and to recommend that serious consideration be given to his re-assignment within the Diocese of Winona.

Father Adamson has been most faithful to our counseling relationship and honest, open, and cooperative throughout his months in St. Paul. He has managed the stress of adjusting to parish life in a diocese other than his own and to his academic program at the University. I am satisfied that his personal maturity has grown considerably during the past several months and that he has maintained a vital spiritual life and fulfilled his priestly responsibilities faithfully.

His greatest growth is in the area of an understanding of what he must do in order to maintain his personal well-being and his priestly effectiveness. I am satisfied that he is committed to both and that he is capable of following through on his convictions.

I do think that there should be some maintenance of an occasional counseling relationship after he has returned to the Diocese of Winona. He should see a counselor on a schedule of once every six to eight weeks. I believe that he is also interested in establishing a continuing relationship of spiritual direction with a priest of his choice.

Father Adamson has not engaged in any of the behavior which precipitated his need for counseling during the past twelve months. In addition, during this time he has borne the heavy cost of the consequences of his former behavior and I feel it is unlikely that he will regress to this behavior in the foreseeable future. I would recommend that an attempt be made to find an assignment for him which would combine a stable parochial residence and apostolate with that of an involvement in a form of marriage counseling.

Dear Father Pierre,

Thank you for your letter regarding Father Thomas Adamson. I appreciate your efforts to help him and I know that he is grateful to you for your help.

As you know, Father Adamson came to Winona shortly after Easter and asked about a pastoral assignment in the diocese of Winona. I had to reply to the effect that while I was as deeply concerned as ever about him I also had to be equally concerned about other basic considerations regarding the laity and the entire body of priests.

While I do not question your evaluation regarding the progress Father Adamson has made, I must also add that I am convinced that he doesn't even begin to appreciate the numbers of people in at least five different communities across the entire diocese who have finally pieced together incidents occurring over a fifteen year span and who now openly raise questions about the credibility of all priests. Obviously, I am writing to you in confidence. You would only have to struggle through the painful sessions I've had with heart-broken and bewildered parents who only know have come to discover the source of some of the problems of their sons.

And this is not just my own opinion; I felt I had to ask for a recommendation from the members of our Priests Personnel Board and I asked it on the basis of each priest's personal acquaintance with the case and his individual opinion of what the pastoral impact reassignment in the diocese of Winona might have. The unanimous recommendation was to the effect that Father Adamson should be encouraged to receive all the help he needs and at the same time that he honestly face the fact that he cannot accept an appointment to a parish in the diocese now or even in the immediate future.

I realize that this is a difficult decision for Father Adamson to accept. Perhaps it would be helpful if I discussed this with you or with you and Father Adamson together. I could arrange for a couple of hours on Monday, May 5th in the morning or early afternoon or on Tuesday evening, May 6th. If neither of these times are convenient, please let me know and I will try to arrange my

Last week I spoke with Mrs. John Riedle. She told me about her son, Greg, and about your work with him at the correctional facility.

I told Mrs. Riedle I would write to you about Father Thomas Adamson because you were concerned about his involvement with Greg, and whether or not Father Adamson had sought treatment for his problem.

My last contact with Father Adamson before Mrs. Riedle called was in February of 1981. He had been in treatment with me prior to that time. The treatment centered on his sexual behavior and was motivated by his own concern to deal with his problem and by the pressure he was receiving from church authorities to do so.

Since February 1981 Father Adamson has seen Dr. Joseph Gendron, a Minneapolis psychiatrist and consultant to us here at the Consultation Services Center. Father Adamson has seen him on a quarterly basis for maintenance and preventative therapy. To my knowledge, Father Adamson has been able to manage his problem with the assistance of Dr. Gendron since terminating his therapy with me early in 1981.

I am sure if you would like to contact Dr. Gendron, he would be glad to offer you more current information about Father Adamson's adjustment at this time.

If I can be of any further help, please feel free to contact me.

Thomas Adamson is a 57 year old priest who was admitted for evaluation of his increasing depression and sexual identity issues. This gentleman has recently had some difficulty relating to other men and this has brought up the issue of his sexuality and the control of this. This, in coming up again, has been severely depressive for him. He has begun doubting himself, functioning less fully and finds himself preoccupied, low mood, sleeping poorly and functioning generally less well than he has been able to.

Mental status reveals a man of middle age, quite tense, guilty, unhappy and very stressed by his trouble with sexuality. He responded well to supportive encouragement, seems willing to work more openly on the sexual issues and his thinking was clear. Showed no signs of psychosis but was certainly measurably depressed.


