- You will note later -- let me just -there is a letter granting a dispensation, I think is the word --
  - That's correct.
  - What is a dispensation? Q.
- The canon law of the church says that a man who is illegitimate should not be ordained. Now, Father Leu was adopted. We never could establish whether he was illegitimate or not, so at the end, I granted a dispensation from the law because he was an adopted child, he was raised by good parents in a good family. There seemed to be no dangers connected with that of scandal or anything like that. So at the time, then, I granted a dispensation so that he could be ordained.
  - Did somebody recommend to you that you grant a dispensation?
  - Yes. It was recommended by the P.M. Chancellor, Bishop Dingman, of Des Mojines 1982s at that time our Chancellor. Monsignor Bright COURT seminary, I think, somewhere in there indicated

that this was a procedure that could easily be I think Monsignor Dingman's problem was that had he been born of an adulterous union or had he been born of what they call sacrilegious would be, say, a priest and a lady, that those would be reserved to the Holy Father, but there was never any evidence of that. In fact, he may have been born legitimately, as far as we could determine.

- When you say those matters would be reserved to the Holy Father, in other words, the Holy Father could only grant a dispensation if that was the case?
- It was reserved to the Holy See, at least.
- And it's your understanding that you had the authority, then, under canon law to grant a dispensation under the circumstances you had before you.
