Most Rev. and dear Bishop:-

You asked me to comment on G.M.'s note as also on G.M. himself. I think the double request can be treated as one, because G.M.'s note reveals himself. The immaturity that we laugh off in a child but which is so distressing in a man, becomes very embarrassing when it involves in a priest the sense of responsibility. We sanctioned G.M.'s going to California only after asking him to check with Your Excellency as it was Your Excellency who had directed him here. We deliberately left his return indefinite because we are convinced that the best possible solution that is available for this particular dangerous type is parental proximi-

ty as long as one # both parents are living.

We are fully convinced from our wide experience that this type of aberration is not curable whether the indi vidual is already insane or becomes insame as a penalty for his activation as regards to the innocents. (He violates the temple of God) God destroys, affectively a rational entity when takes from that entity the power of self-control. I believe that is the ba sic reason why Doctor B. at Seton Institute was not disposed to keep him there. He knows in his heart that this condition is incurable. An article written by him in "Jubilee", last year, indicates his opinion that men of this class are not morally responsible and naturally no Institute wants to get loaded with the incurable. One of the startling characteristics of this class is that they themselves do not take the situation seriously. One I questioned a year or so ago, believe it or not, was in boy work and intended to return to boy work. He said his victims had been to confession and had a greed that this ended the responsibility/

I feel so keenly about the terrible devastation these men accomplish in starting innocent boys towards a life career of abnormality that I personally wish that the Holy Father would make a penalty for them that would "ipso facto" bar them for life from the care of souls. They are dangerous, always daragerous and whenever we have gone against conviction and approved their activation, we have had uniformly cause to regret. "The dog returns to his vomit". That is why I was happy to find G.M. set upon returning home to his parents. In the proximity of his parents, his brothers and sisters, there should be a maximum sanction psychologically for him to obey the laws of God and a minimum of expense

for the diocese.

I only wish the Hierarchy would provide me with what I have wanted for years, i.e. an Island whereon these most contagious lepers could be cared for with a maximum of charity including all of legitimate psychiatric treatments and yet a minimum of contact with innocent souls.
