Dear Howdy:

Thank you for calling me the other day, and I am glad to hear that you are well and thinking about your future and not about the recent events of the past. I am sorry to hear that you need money, and here is the best we can do. The school has given you your pay check for September, that is, 1/12 of the salary of \$10,300 that you would be paid for this academic year. Enclosed is another check, that which you would have received for October. This is the last payment that St. George's School can give you. I have already given you \$200 from my discretionary fund, a sum that need not be returned, the school will waive your debt of approximately \$65, and the school will pay for your moving expenses of \$590.91. Furthermore, the school has got to pay something extra to those teachers who have volunteered to take over your courses. Under the circumstances, I think the school is being generous, and if you find yourself hard pressed in the future I suggest that you consider selling your Porache.

I do hope that all goes well in the future. Quite obviously, as I have said before, I feel strongly that you should not be in a boarding school and that you should seek psychiatric help. Please do not return to St. George's until one generation has gone through, that is, not for another five years. Also, I have a request from the family in Scranton that you do not attempt to communicate with them or their son.

I am glad that you have talked to Bishop Selden, and please do not hesitate to call on me for help or advice. I wish you well, and I am sorry that you had to leave.
