

27 FOREIGN STUDENTS VISIT REISTERSTOWN

REISTERSTOWN — Twenty-seven foreign students reached Reisterstown at noon Saturday to spend the July 14 to 17 weekend with families in the Owings Mills-Reisterstown area. They are among the 250 international students who will visit in the Baltimore area.

Altogether about 650 youths from foreign countries are touring the nation in 18 chartered buses, visiting scores of communities under the American Field Service International scholarship program. These young people have spent the past year attending high schools throughout the United States while residing with American families.

This wind-up tour is planned to acquaint the students with the industrial, agricultural, scenic and cultural resources of the United States and give them an opportunity to meet a cross section of its citizens. While in the Baltimore area the 250 boys and girls will be guests of families in Baltimore City, Parkton, Essex, Towson, Dundalk, Belair, Catonsville and Reisterstown. After the 23-day tours they will return to their native countries.

Girl Has Close Call

Mary Jane Cardwell, 13, Glyndon, narrowly escaped death by electrocution last week when a radio to which she was listening fell into the tub while she was taking a bath at the home of her uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Russell, Old Court Road, Randallstown. Mrs. Russell, hearing the child scream, ran upstairs and jerked the wire from the tub and carried her to a bed. She called Dr. Charles Williams, Pikesville, who treated the child for shock. Police and the ambulance driver assisted with the administration of oxygen at the Russell home and en route to University Hospital, Baltimore, where she remained overnight. The child continues under the care of Dr. Williams. It is reported that 110 volts of electricity were passing through her body and one more minute of shock would have been fatal.
