Six Others to be Ordained June 13 Ordinandi **Jubilarians**

Four Seattle University Jesuits will celebrate the 25th anniversary of their ordination to the priesthood Sunday, June 14. They are the Revs. Gerard M. Evoy, vice president for university relations; Engelbert M. Axer, associate professor of philosophy; Vincent M. Conway, university librarian, and William M. Weller, assistant professor of philosophy.

There will be a reception for the four jubilarians Sunday, June 14, from 2 to 4 p.m. in Bellarmine Hall, Seattle University campus. Father Evoy will offer a solemn Mass at Our Lady of Mt. Virgin Church at 11 a.m., Saturday, June 13, for all four priests. Father Axer will serve as deacon and Father Weller as sub-deacon.

Fathers Conway, Evoy, and Weller were ordained at the same time at Santa Clara, California, by the late Arch-bishop John Mitty of San Francisco. Father Axer, a native of Germany, who en-tered the Society of Jesus in Holland, was ordained at St. Mary's, Kansas.

Father Evoy attended Seattle Prep and has two brothers who are Seattle-area physicians and another who is also a Jesuit priest. He served as pastor of Mt. Virgin Parish for seven years and taught at Seattle Prep. He came to Seattle University in 1957 from St. Francis Xavier Church in Missoula, Montana.

After his ordination, Father Axer taught at Seattle University, then Seattle College, in the language and philosophy departments. He earned his doctorate in philosophy in 1949 from Georgetown University and taught at Sophia University in Tokyo from 1949 to 1955 when he returned to Seattle. He serves as faculty representative to the Alumni Association.

He entered the Society of Jesus in 1928, received a master's degree in history from Loyola University of Chicago in 1936. He has been on the faculty at Seattle University since 1941, and for the past ten years, its librarian.

Father Weller's first assignment as a priest-was assistant to the pastor at St. Leo's Parish, Tacoma. He was dean of students at Gonzaga University for five years, and prefect of

All will receive the holy oils of ordination from the Most Rev. Bernard J. Topel, Bishop of Spokane, at St. Aloysius Church in Spokane. They will be among the 13 members of the Society of Jesus in the Oregon Province who will be ordained this year.

Father Andersen, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Niels J. Andersen of Seattle, was born and raised in St. Joseph Parish. After graduating from St. Joseph Grade School, he attended Seattle Preparatory High School where, in his senior year, he was elected student body president.

Father went to Gonzaga University for one year and then, in 1951, entered the Jesuit Novitiate at Sheridan, Ore. After four years of study at Sheridan, and three years at Mount St. Michael's in Spokane, Father Andersen joined the faculty of Bellarmine High School in Tacoma.

While at Bellarmine, Father taught Latin, English, history, and religion and in his spare time directed the drama productions and helped coach athletics. In 1961 Father went to Alma College, Los Gatos, Calif., to study sacred theology. After ordination he will return to Alma for a final year of the-

Paulists Elect New Superior General

NEW YORK (NC)-The Rev. John F. Fitzgerald, C.S.P., is the 12th superior general in the 106-year history of the Paulist Fathers.

The Boston-born priest who for the last six years has been pastor of St. Paul the Apostle parish in Los Angeles was elected June 1 to the Paulists' top office at the triennial general chapter of the congregation

Father Fitzgerald succeeds Father William A. Michell, C. S. P., who has been the superior general since 1952. Father Fitzgerald was elected for a six-year term.

An alumnus of Boston College. Father Fitzgerald was ordained in Rome in 1933. He made his studies for the priesthood at St. Paul's College and the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C., and Gregorian University in Rome. He formerly was director of the Newman Club at the University of Southern California, Los Angeles.

Father Fitzgerald has four sisters who are Sisters of Charity serving in Halifax, N.S.

Billy Graham Backs Bishop

SAN DIEGO (NC) - Baptist evangelist Billy Graham said here he completely supports Bishop Fulton J. Sheen's criticism of the U.S. Supreme Court's rulings against prayer and Bible reading in public

Graham made the statement at a news conference. Auxiliary Bishop Sheen of New York appeared recently before the House Judiciary Committee.

Graham pictured school prayers as a very important part of U.S. life. He said that if the Bible is kept out of classrooms, children would begin to believe that it has been disproved and rejected.

"It is really quite incredible that in 1950 I was the 35th Negro to be ordained in this country but today there are 140 of us," he observed.


