PARISH MEMBERSHIP:

SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM:

The Sacrament of Baptism celebrates a person's entrance into the life of the Church and the community of believers. The Baptismal Team assists parents and godparents in their preparations for



the Sacrament of Baptism. Baptisms take place on the second and fourth Sundays of the month at 2:00 PM. Parents should contact the Rectory to set a date for the Baptismal Class which takes place on the first Thursday of each month at 7:30 PM, in the Parish Center. Parents of ALL children to be baptized must be registered members of the parish and attend a class before their child will be baptized. Godparents should be confirmed Catholics in good standing in the Church. The date of baptism will be confirmed at the class.



SACRAMENT OF

RECONCILIATION: PENANCE -

Celebrated every Saturday from 3:45 to 4:45 PM. Priests of the Parish are available any day (especially before Holy Days and First Fridays) to celebrate this Sacrament with you. Please call the Rectory for an appointment.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE

Engaged couples are asked to arrange an appointment with one of the priests or deacons of the Parish at least SIX months prior to the desired wedding date. Reservations must be made by the couple ONLY.



SACRAMENT OF THE **ANOINTING OF THE SICK:**

Celebrated at a Mass by the community twice a year, in the spring and the fall. If it is an

emergency or if a person cannot attend the communal celebrations, please call the Rectory. Every Saturday morning at the 9:00 AM Mass, after Communion, those who are entering the hospital in the coming week can be anointed. Inform the celebrant BEFORE Mass begins.

Please contact the Rectory if you would like Eucharist brought to a member of your family who cannot come to Church for any reason.

A MESSAGE FROM MSGR. JIM WEBSITE: msgrlisante.org

Dear Friends:

I had a call from **Bishop Murphy** this week. And we discussed future assignments. He has asked me to become the Pastor of **Our Lady of Lourdes Parish** in Massapequa Park. I accepted the assignment and look forward to a new beginning getting to know the people of this parish dedicated to Our Lady. Please pray that I'll do a good job.

At the same time, the Bishop also shared with me that he is appointing **Monsignor Frank Maniscalco** to become the 6th Pastor of **St. Thomas the Apostle Parish**. I know Monsignor Maniscalco is delighted to be given a chance to lead this great parish. Please give him your enthusiastic support, and help him as you so often helped me.

A little bit about Monsignor Frank Maniscalco. As many of you know, he has been assisting us here at St. Thomas for over ten years. During those years he was working in Communications for the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops in Washington, D.C., Monday through Friday. Then he'd head up to St. Thomas to help us out on weekends. I know many of you enjoy his short Masses! And his very intelligent homilies. That brightness is a special gift he has. In fact, he's got a Doctorate from Fordham University. He's a good man, and a smart one!

In his many years of service to the Diocese of Rockville Centre, Monsignor Maniscalco has worked as an Associate Pastor at St. William the Abbott Parish in Seaford. Then as diocesan Director of Religious Education. Then as Editor of The Long Island Catholic, before heading to Washington, D.C. for thirteen years to assist the American Bishops. For the past year, he has lived here at St. Thomas as a resident Priest, while acting as Respect Life Coordinator for the diocese. I've had the privilege of knowing Monsignor Frank for over twenty years. He is a genuinely good guy. He's kind and he's prayerful. He's knowledgeable and he's generous with his time and talent. He knows this community by observing so much of our life together over these past twelve years. I think you will find him a very dedicated Pastor. I should also mention that as a man who advises the Bishop on governmental concerns, I think he'll be equally open to being a voice for justice in the civic community. And at this point in our community, that's very important.

My good-bye Mass will be held at the main Church on **Sunday, June 22** at 12 noon. A parish reception will follow in Monsignor Joseph A. Smith Auditorium. Please try to come if you can. And we'll also, on that date, welcome our new Pastor here at St. Thomas the Apostle.

Even with these changes, life goes on. And we need to get on top of some special financial concerns. So by now you should have received the folder encouraging you to secure a memorial in support of the new **Church** and **Chapel organs**. Please think seriously about helping us out. The organs are in place and they are a major improvement. Now let's get them paid off! Thanks.

Chaircouple **Frank and Lucille Cazzetto** have also begun the organization of the **2008 Catholic Ministries Appeal**. Our parish goal is slightly under one hundred thousand dollars. Please pray and consider how you might get involved in this important charitable work.

You know I like to thank people here. So this week, I want to give special thanks to **Gary Nudelman** of *Turnpike Cleaners*. We've been doing our annual vestment cleaning recently and bringing our parish vestments over to Gary Nudelman. He cleans everything for St. Thomas the Apostle, and he does it all for free. Thank you Gary and all the good folks at Turnpike Cleaners!

Let me make clear a change in the Holy Week schedule. We normally have a communal **Penance Service** on the Monday of Holy Week. This year, we're joining the rest of the diocese in another kind of approach. Instead of one hour in the evening, we're offering continuous confessions from 3 p.m. until 9 p.m. Priests will be in the Church and available to hear your confessions for six hours. Please find the time on Monday to come in and prepare for Easter by embracing this healing sacrament.

On the welcome home side of things, I'm happy to tell you that **Father Matthew Blockley** will return to us during Holy Week from his home in Manila. We warmly welcome this good priest back to his St. Thomas the Apostle family.

SHARING OUR BLESSINGS

One of the most familiar Gospel passages is the story of the Good Samaritan. It is an example of kindness, of generosity and of compassion, one that models the need to give without restraint or restriction. "Whatever else you spend I will repay," says the Good Samaritan to the innkeeper. It is the very essence of open-ended giving that we are called to emulate.

What is often overlooked about this parable is that it is also about courage. Since the Samaritans and Jews had no interaction with one another, the Samaritan broke social barriers to offer his help. The rigid class and religious constraints of the day took second place to love for neighbor. The Good Samaritan conquered his fear of censure or reprisal and had the courage to care and the courage to give.

Too often each day, even for our best intentions, we operate out of fear. Fear of what people will say, of making ourselves vulnerable, of "outside the box" thinking. We are afraid to increase our weekly offering in case it impacts our lifestyle. We are afraid that being active in the parish would seem ridiculous to our friends. We are afraid that our gifts aren't "sacred enough" to be used in church; that if we can't sing in the choir, teach in Religious Ed or be a liturgical minister, our gifts aren't useful. We are afraid that St. Thomas doesn't need our talents or that someone else would do it better.

Too often we are satisfied to do good works which, though worthwhile, don't really cost us anything. Ones that require no risk, no sacrifice, no courage. As we enter Holy Week, though, we are called to a journey that requires all of those traits. On the road to Calvary nothing can be held back, there is no room for complacency or fear or limits. We are challenged to share our blessings in new and creative and, yes, even risky ways and *become* the Good Samaritan we have only read about before.

Disturb us, Lord, when we are too well pleased with ourselves, when our dreams have come true because we have dreamed too little; when we arrived safely because we have sailed too close to shore. Disturb us, Lord, when with the abundance of the things we possess, we have lost our thirst for the water of life. Stir us, Lord, to dare more boldly, to venture on wider seas, where storms will show your mastery, where losing sight of land, we shall find the stars. We ask you to push back the horizons of our hopes and to push us into the future in strength, hope, courage and love. Amen.





Finally, during April, the students will be participating in the annual Social Studies Olympiad exam competition. This exam, administered by the local chapter of the National Social Studies League, includes a variety of multiple-choice questions on ancient, medieval, and modern history, politics, economics, and geography. 
Gospel Matthew 26:14--27:66 or Matthew 27:11-54

This gospel is a reading of the passion (or suffering) of Christ. On this Sunday we are reading it "according to Matthew." We see Jesus betrayed by two of his friends, Judas and Peter, and by the crowd. We see him mocked and beaten by the soldiers who laughingly "honor" him as King of the Jews.

Wounded, crowned with thorns, and dying a little more each step of the way, Jesus carries his cross to Calvary. His suffering is so great that he wonders if even God has left him to die alone. Still Jesus willingly gives up his spirit. With the centurion we pray: "Clearly, this was the Son of God!"

Discussion Questions for Gospel

Jesus offered his entire life and his entire self to the Father, including his suffering and death. He did this voluntarily. Even though he was God, he chose "the lowest place" out of love. We, like Jesus, suffer because we are human. People still suffer, here in our own country and around the world. Can you name some of the ways and some of the reasons why people suffer today? What does Jesus want us to do about human suffering? (Think about the parable of the Good Samaritan.) Think of one way your and your group could help lessen human suffering in some way. Then do so, in the name of Jesus.



ΗΟLΥ WEEK ΑΤ ST. THOMAS

Palm (Passion) Sunday

Today is the sixth and last of the Sundays of Lent. We know it also by other names. It is called Palm Sunday because the first thing that we do when we gather this day is to take up palms and tell the story of how Jesus once came into the holy city, Jerusalem, riding over a carpet of branches, cheered by people waving branches. Today is also known as Passion Sunday because the gospel story read today is always the account of Jesus' passion as told by Matthew, by Mark, or by Luke. Today also marks the beginning of the days we call Holy Week.

The Easter Triduum

The three days -- Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday -- are more like one long day commemorating the paschal mystery of Christ's dying and rising. The Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday begins the Easter Triduum, the most sacred moment in the church's life. The Rubrics (the rules of conduct for liturgies) in the Sacramentary tell us that only one Mass may be celebrated in a parish on Holy Thursday. This Mass is to be in the evening. On Good Friday, the Celebration of the Lord's Passion should only be done once. The sacrifice of the Mass is not celebrated on Holy Saturday; a Mass is celebrated as part of the Solemn Vigil at night. As there are many people at St. Thomas who wish to gather to pray together during the mornings of the last three days of Holy Week, we will have Morning Prayer on each of these days. Holy Communion may <u>not</u> be distributed at Morning Prayer. It may be distributed only at the main liturgy of the day. Morning Prayer usually lasts 25-30 minutes. Please plan to join us in Morning Prayer for any and all of these three days.

HOLY THURSDAY

Morning Prayer 9:00 AM in the Church

Holy Thursday brings the end to Lent. On this night we begin the Three Days that are the center of our year. These Three Days we call the Easter Triduum. We should try to make these Three Days different from all the days of the year. Although we are only required by the Church to fast on Good Friday, we are invited to fast from Holy Thursday night until after the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday. Try to make Good Friday and Holy Saturday free for prayer and reflection and preparation and silence. The Church is getting ready. Make plans to take part in the various liturgies and other gatherings from now until after the Vigil on Saturday night.

The Mass of the Lord's Supper 7:30 PM in the Church



A family of St. Thomas Parish carries in the sacred oils that were blessed at St. Agnes Cathedral by Bishop Murphy that morning. Bells are rung throughout the entire singing of the "Gloria," including bells brought by people attending this liturgy. After the homily, the priest who is presiding washes the feet of twelve parishioners. Following communion, the Blessed Sacrament is carried through the church in procession. It is then brought to the altar of reservation (the Holy Family Altar). Following a period of prayerful silence, the congregation may depart in silence. But since adoration takes place at this time, parishioners are invited to "watch" in front of the Blessed Sacrament until the conclusion at 10:30 PM with Night Prayer. You may attend at your own convenience. The altar in the main church is stripped immediately after mass.

NOTE: The singing of the "Gloria," at the liturgies on Holy Thursday and the Easter Vigil, is probably the most joyful sound at any liturgy in the church year. At St. Thomas, the full choir sings and the assembly joins in the refrain. The church bells ring throughout, and the altar bells are also rung during the refrain.

Again this year, we would like to invite you to ring bells too, during these times. If you have small bells at home, please bring them to the Liturgy on Holy Thursday night and to the Easter Vigil. You would then ring them during the **refrains** of the "Gloria," during these liturgies. The bells should have soft sounds (not of the cowbell type) and should have a muffler such as a cloth, so that they are not heard at other times during these liturgies.

GOOD FRIDAY

Morning Prayer 9:00 AM in the Church

Celebration of the Lord's Passion 3:00 PM in the Church After the reading of the Passion and a short homily, ten general intercessions are offered. Then there is the Veneration of the Cross, where all are invited to venerate by kissing, touching, or genuflecting before the cross. Communion is distributed with hosts consecrated at the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday. After the liturgy, all leave in silence.



Walk to Calvary on the Way to the Cross 6:00 PM at the Church

The Knights of Columbus will again sponsor a processional march called "A Walk to Calvary on the Way to the Cross." This will take place beginning at the church with the gathering at 5:45. It will go through the streets close to the church, while participants will say prayers and sing hymns. All are invited to join. It is expected to end at 7:00 at the Church, in time for participants to gather for –

Evening Prayer & Veneration of the Cross 7:30 PM in the Church Evening Prayer from the Liturgy of the Hours, "The Prayer of the Church" will quietly take place and be followed by Veneration of the Cross. Communion will <u>not</u> be distributed in the evening. You are asked to remember that this is a very sacred time. It is important that we show respect by our complete silence throughout.



THE EASTER VIGIL 8:00 PM in the Church

At the Easter Vigil – We gather in the church in darkness, but a new fire is lit and the light from that fire is passed from one to another of the whole assembly as we light the whole church with our candles. (Candles are distributed as you enter.) We recount salvation history in the readings from the Old Testament. Again, as on Holy Thursday, bells are rung (including yours, if you have brought any) during the entire singing of the "Gloria."

After the homily, the Celebration of the Sacraments of Initiation takes place. This is where the catechumens renounce evil, profess the faith of the Church, are baptized and anointed. All of us renew our baptism. Easter begins and we are ready for 50 days of rejoicing. The liturgy continues with the Liturgy of the Eucharist and concludes with the choir singing the "Hallelujah Chorus" from *The Messiah* by Handel.



EASTER SUNDAY

Mass on Easter Day is the most splendid and exuberant celebration of the Church year. For this is the Sunday of Sundays, the center and foundation of our faith. As Saint Paul said, "If Christ be not risen, your faith is vain" [I Cor. 15:14, 17]. And families who attend Mass on Easter Day join millions of Christians all over the world in joyous affirmation of our redemption through the love of Christ. At Easter Mass, we traditionally renew our baptismal vows and accept the challenge to integrate the meaning of Jesus' death and resurrection into our own lives; to live without judgment, with forgiveness and with complete faith in eternal life. Although the Easter Vigil and Mass fulfills the obligation for Easter Mass, the Easter Day celebration is a highlight that many will not want to miss, and it is permissible to attend both and to receive communion at each.
