Under the circumstances, I feel that I should repeat the directions I gave to you in December 2002:

- 1. You may not celebrate Mass publicly (this includes public concelebration) or administer the sacraments.
- 2. You may not wear clerical garb, and you may not present yourself publicly as a priest.
- 3. You may not participate in the annual convocation and assemblies for priests.

Once again, I appreciate your cooperation in abiding by these directives and I encourage you to continue to lead a life of prayer and penance as reparation for your past misconduct.

I am writing to you once again relative to Father Francis Sierra, a retired priest of the Diocese of San Diego.

With this letter I am sending on to you a copy of the Settlement Agreement entered into last month with

When you review the enclosed documents you will see that the release includes the Diocese of Pueblo, the Sons of the Holy Family, as well as Father Sierra.

I have enclosed all of these documents for inclusion in Father Sierra's file. The settlement reached was for \$59,600.00. However, this does not include the fees for the attorney, Mr. Timothy Schimberg, who represented the Diocese of Pueblo. Nor does it include the fee of \$1,667.50 for Judge Neighbors of the Judicial Arbiter Group Inc. who negotiated the settlement.

Also, could I ask for your comment and assistance in this matter? I have also been asked to send a copy of the settlement agreement on to Father Sierra himself. Also, since the Diocese of Pueblo has settled a legal claim, which obviously is of benefit to him, I have been asked to inquire whether Father Sierra himself would be in a position to see to some possible financial reimbursement to the Diocese of Pueblo. I fully realize that this is a matter of some delicacy and so your considered comment would be very much appreciated.

Could I respectfully request to hear from you in the weeks after Easter about this?

- 2. You may not wear clerical garb, and you may not present yourself publicly as a priest.
- 3. You may not participate in the annual convocation and assemblies for priests.

I appreciate your cooperation in abiding by these directives and I encourage you to continue to lead a life of prayer and penance as reparation for your past misconduct.

I am responding to your inquiry regarding Father Francis Sierra, a retired priest of the Diocese of San Diego.

The diocese was informed of allegations of sexual misconduct involving minors against Father Sierra by the Archdiocese of Santa Fe on November 12, 1992. Father Sierra went for an evaluation at Saint Luke Institute in Suitland, Maryland on January 17-22, 1993. Father Sierra participated in a residential treatment program at St. Luke's from February 24, 1993 to July 27, 1993. Father Sierra then returned to San Diego and took up residence in a Catholic retirement home that includes a section for priests.

Given that Father Sierra was faithful to the aftercare treatment program set up by Saint Luke, Bishop Brom granted Father Sierra limited faculties to celebrate Mass and hear confessions of adults only at the retirement home and at the house of a group of contemplative sisters. Father Sierra has faithfully abided by these conditions.

Msgr. Mark Plewka, Chancellor in Pueblo, CO, called to inquire about the status of Fr. Sierra on account that allegations dating back to the 1950's had now surfaced there.

I told him that Fr. Frank has been in retirement for quite some time and his ministry restricted.

This led Msgr. Plewka to conclude that we had reason to restrict Fr. Sierra's ministry so he asked if we were aware of any allegations to which I answered in the affirmative.

I suggested that if he needed any further details that he contact you.

Dear Father Frank:

Congratulations on the good report you received from St. Luke's which indicates your fidelity to your aftercare program.

I have visited about your report with Dr. Valcour and he agrees with the following extension but still limitation of your faculties:

- 1. You may continue to supply for Mass at Our Lady of Guadalupe Parish, Otay, and may accept other offers for Eucharistic supply, but this should not extend to other sacramental or pastoral ministry in the parishes.
- 2. You may serve as chaplain to the Missionaries of Charity for Mass and provide the sacrament of reconciliation if the sisters request this for themselves, but not others.
- 3. You may offer Mass and hear the confessions of residents at Nazareth House.

Consequently, while you may make yourself available to supply for the celebration of Mass you should not take on supply in a fuller sense, e.g. for a priest on vacation, or in any situation that would require further ministry. Moreover, your faculties for hearing confessions are limited to the Missionaries of Charity and the residents at Nazareth House.

I am grateful for your cooperation in reference to your health and priestly ministry.

Fr. Sierra began ministry in the Diocese of San Diego in 1970, and retired in 1988. Since retirement, he had been engaged in only limited ministry.



"What really grinds me is when parents of victims don't come out and say, 'That's enough. Ya Basta.' I would do everything in my power to throw light on it," she said.

Recovery road

"My life is recovery - from alcoholism from drug addiction

... and from sexual, physical, emotional and spiritual abuse. I eat it, live it, drink it, and talk about it."

Bernadette Stella See wrote those words to her brothers and sisters as part of her road to recovery. A road she still travels.

During therapy, she discovered she had been sexually abused as a young child. One of her abusers, she said, was her narish priest.

When she was in elementary school, her father would drop her and her older sister off before 7 a.m. at Holy Cross School in Santa Cruz, N.M. During the winter, one of the teachers would open her classroom for the two and go back to her residence until school started.

The young assistant pastor would come in and send See's older sister on an errand. Then he would tell See, who was 7 at the time, to sharpen pencils.

While she was doing so he would fondle her. This was repeated throughout the winter.

"When the abuse is going on, you don't breathe. You leave your body," she recalled, adding that is when she started swallowing air.

For as long as she can remember, See has had a terrible problem with uncontrollable burping, which experts tell her can be a physical manifestation of abuse.

She had other problems: She never enjoyed sex, got hooked on prescription drugs, developed a drinking problem and even abused – both physically and emotionally – her own children.

She tried to kill herself in 1989 after a confrontation with a coworker over her burping problem.

That's when she saw a psychologist, who for the first time asked if she had been sexually abused. Then she began having flashbacks.

She reluctantly admitted herself in 1990 to a residential treatment center. And after a month there, she knew she had to confront the church and her abuser.

Late last year, she said, she contacted the priest, who'd left the diocese, by telephone, and he admitted abusing her.

See went to Rome in December to see a friend ordained and was able to hand a letter to Pope John Paul II during a special audience for the deacons' friends and family. The letter told of her abuse and asked him to declare a worldwide day of prayer for victims and abusers.

She also saw then-Archbishop Robert Sanchez earlier this year and wrote him a letter, saying he'd done too little, too late, "and it's time for you to step down."

She also met with Chancellor Wolf. Wolf said he contacted the diocese to which the priest had moved, and the priest has been sent elsewhere for treatment.

See said she has made amends to her children and is thankful to the church for paying for counseling — for herself, her husband and her children.

"I think it's important the cycle of abuse stops here now."

Also the archdiocese has paid for the woman and her family's counseling. That's all she wanted. She is not suing. My questions are:

My questions are: // Has the Archdiocese of Santa Fe apprised the Diocese of San Diego of the allegation against Father Sierra? If so, when and what action, if any, was taken? Have there been any allegations against Sierra in California? What have Father Sierra's duties or ministries been in the Diocese of San Diego? Has he worked with children? Has he been removed from his duties? Whas he been sent for evaluation and treatment of sexual addiction, etc ... If so, when and where was he sent? Has he completed treatment? I called his church, Our Lady of Guadalupe in Calexico, and was told that Father Frank is in Washington visiting his brother, who is ill? Does that mean his evaluation and treatment have been postponed? Until when? I would like to talk to him if you can put me in touch or give him my name and toll free telephone number 1-800-641-3451 ext. 3585. Mention to him that the woman says he admitted the abuse to her in a telephone conversation late late last year. Is this true. Did he admit the abuse took place? He also mentions having

In follow up to our conversation, I am accepting your resignation ad tempus indeterminatum from all priestly ministry, effective immediately, with the exception of the private celebration of Mass.

I am directing you to evaluation at St. Luke's Institute, after which I will be in contact with you.

I am also inviting you at this time to present whatever you know about this matter to Msgr. Dillabough, whom I have asked to look into things during my absence this week.
