Dear Jack

I'm writing rather than calling so you can have time to evaluate my letter and respond at your convenience. I worry about your work overload.

Returning here seems to have been the right decision. Stomach and allergy problems under much better control.

I've delayed this letter thinking each day the long overdue report from Connecticut would arrive. Finally it has.

Also the loan from the Archdiocese came (for the "expenses") and I have repaid the 3 people who loaned me originally. I am not at ease to be unable at this time to repay Monsignor Murphy and hope he understands that I never in my life owed money before or ever borrowed - except a car loan.

I've heard no more from anyone about my propose to offer a safe - house to "ware-housed" priests. I assume the hesitation is about me, not the conce. I enclose two quotes and refer you to "The Broken Heart" The medical consequences of Loneliness. My millionaire founder of Quest House is well-diagnosed to Guarding. Shall I forget it? Would you prefer I not ask?

I am anxious that public charges might be brought against me. Have you heard any more from the victims or lawyers?

Because of the seeming eagerness of the USCC to make it easier to jail and dismiss I live in fear of that eventually. Do you think it will happen?

As you know, the Institute suggests a neurologist work up to rule out stroke. I intend to do that but they require that I pay till and then get reimbursed by Cluegg Fund. I can't afford that right now.

I had hoped that I had room and board till was going to St. Ann's would be diverted to me here but that hasn't happened. Soops thinks I'll won't even sustain me in a rented bedroom in this shared residence so I may have to move out soon. This is the second month without room and board assistance. Don't get me wrong. I am grateful that I get anything.

You may recall that Dr. James Shantz sent you a letter 2 yrs. ago saying that I should not work anymore. (You gave it to Bishop Hughes who never responded).

Despite this I have been looking for work. At 63 yrs of age, with an intractable prostate, silly allergies (e.g. dust) and a "past" (whom shall I put down as a past employer who will receive me? You?) a suspicion of Alzheimer's, and available only for an interview (awaiting the review board and Cardix approval), facing lumbar operations and needing a nicotine-free, dust-free, fat-free environment I am not exactly prime candidate for anything.

What would the Archdiocese respond to a request for a recommendation?

Chancery, bantayad, cashier, are possibilities.

You laughed when I suggested moving to Mexico or Costa Rica but it might be worth considering. It might be cheaper and it might all the concerns of the victims.
