REV. MONSIGNOR ISAAC BRENT EAGEN
1929-1997

Monsignor Isaac Brent Eagen, priest, educator and ecumenical leader, served the Diocese of San Diego and the University of San Diego throughout a long, illustrious career. He became USD's first vice president for mission and ministry in 1993; he was chancellor of the Diocese from 1968 to 1989, and he was pastor of the Mission Basilica San Diego de Alcalá from 1971 to 1992.

Monsignor Eagen held numerous pastoral and civic offices, including chaplain of the San Diego Chargers. He served on the boards of Catholic Community Services, the San Diego Organizing Project, the Academy of Our Lady of Peace, the Mercy Hospital Foundation, the Foundation for the Children of the Americas and the American Heart Association.

I. B. Eagen was the son of James and Stella Eagen. He was born Dec. 14, 1929, in San Bernardino, Calif. He was an alumnus of St. Bernardine High School and Loyola University, where he earned a B.A. in philosophy and an M.A. in English and education. He entered St. Francis Seminary in 1948 and was ordained in 1956 by Bishop Charles Buddy. That same year, he was asked to teach religion at Cathedral Girls High School.

In 1960, Father Eagen joined the faculty at the San Diego College for Men, where he taught theology, speech, English and American literature. He also taught medical ethics at the Mercy College of Nursing and religion at Our Lady of Peace High School.

In 1964, Monsignor Eagen was named the college's director of school relations. He helped found the California Conference of Catholic Colleges, and he played an integral role in the 1972 merger of the College for Men and the College for Women into the University of San Diego. In 1980, USD awarded him an honorary doctorate, and in 1993, after 25 years as a member of the USD board of trustees, he was named trustee emeritus.

In all his priestly duties, Monsignor Eagen made ecumenism a primary pastoral priority. One of his many innovations as a USD vice president was the institution of the All-Faith Service, a liturgical celebration each February featuring clergy from many religious denominations.

Monsignor Eagen sought to imbue Christian principles into every facet of campus life. In the last year of his life, he established an "Ethics Across the Campus" initiative aimed at reaching every student, professor and employee at USD. "This important project will help our university determine how we put our ethical values into practice," he said.

Monsignor Eagen's numerous honors include: the Regional Brotherhood Award from the National Council of Christians and Jews (1971); Honorary Chaplain of the U.S. Navy (1986); the "Man for All Seasons" Award from the St. Vincent de Paul/Joan Kroc Center (1989); the Medal of Honor from the Daughters of the American Revolution (1993); the Diocese of the San Diego Unity Award for Ecumenical and Inter-Religious Affairs (1993); and the Ecumenical Council of San Diego County Unity Award (1995).

CITATION

In recognizing individuals from the community who represent both significant achievement and noteworthy exemplification of values, the University of San Diego is pleased to single out a person who, in addition, has unselfishly contributed to the well-being of the University itself. Monsignor I. Brent Eagen is just such an outstanding person.

A native son of California, Monsignor Eagen pursued studies at both Loyola University of Los Angeles and St. Francis Seminary in San Diego and received priestly orders in 1956. Early in his career he became involved in education, earning a Master of Arts Degree from Loyola, and teaching at Aquinas High School, San Bernardino and at the University of San Diego, College for Men. In 1964, he was named Director of School Relations for the College for Men and provided significant progress in this vital aspect of the development of the University. He brought vigor, enthusiasm and new insight into the special role then emerging for the University in the community of San Diego, the Far West, and the larger community of Catholic higher education. When called to new responsibilities in the Diocese of San Diego, he never forgot nor ceased to emphasize the special and larger tasks which are an integral part of the mission of the Church and of the University. He continues to serve as Member and Secretary of the Board of Trustees, University of San Diego.

Monsignor Eagen has served the Diocese of San Diego as Chancellor since 1968. His work in this capacity has won him the respect of his bishop, his brother priests, the laity, and the civic community of San Diego. Twice honored by the Church, first as an Honorary Prelate, and then as a Knight in The Equestria Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem, he serves as Pastor of California's First Mission Church, the Basilica of San Diego de Alcala. His civic achievements include endeavors with the National Conference of Christians and Jews, the Community Board of Mercy Hospital, the Mayor's Crime Control Commission, and the San Diego Ecumenical Conference.

Priest, teacher, administrator, man of God and Country, all of these tell a part of the whole that constitutes the life and continuous efforts of Monsignor Eagen. In their coming together in a single life they emphasize that we indeed

have an individual who makes manifest to all the goal of the University to commit itself and its students to the ideals of a "liberal education which emphasizes the potentialities of men and women as human beings and creatures of God." It is therefore with a sense of justifiable pride that the University of San Diego confers on Isaac Brent Eagen, the degree of DOCTOR OF HUMANE LETTERS, *honoris causa*.

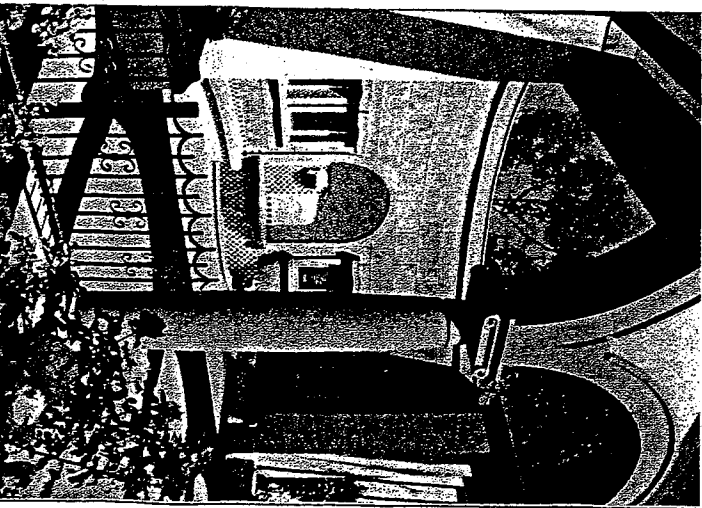
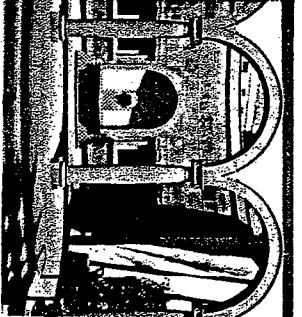
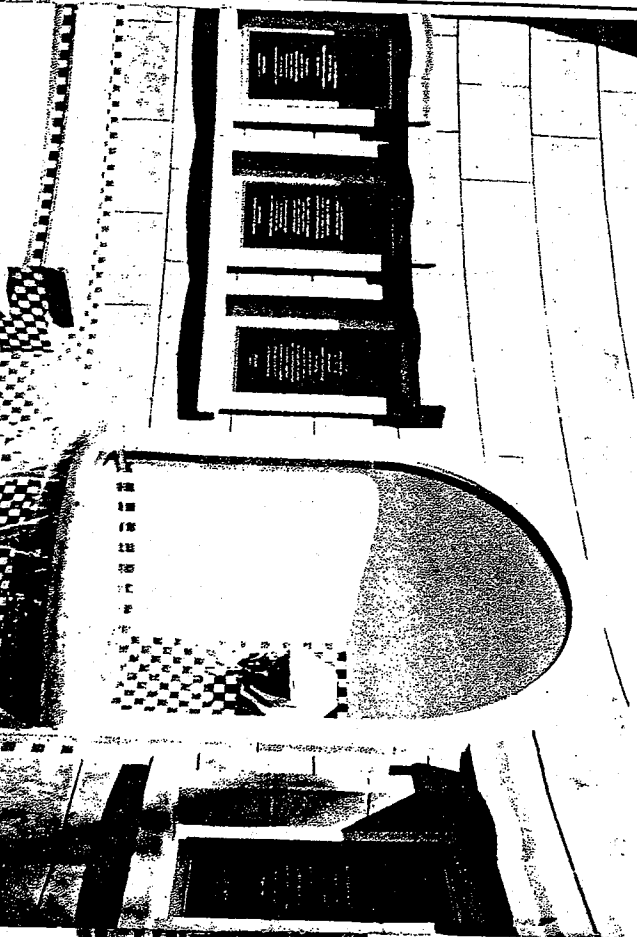
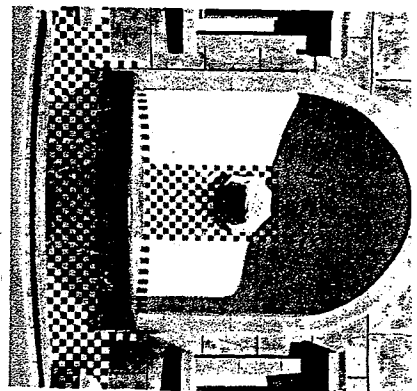
The Plaza

A permanent memorial to honor the late Monsignor I Brent Eagen, USD's first vice president of mission and ministry, who passed away on October 14, 1997, was dedicated on December 6, 2000. Monsignor Eagen was an advocate of fitness and a healthy lifestyle. He was an avid tennis player, sports fan and chaplain for the San Diego Chargers for more than 20 years. To honor his beliefs, a committee headed by members of the USD Board of Trustees developed and raised funds for the memorial.

The Eagen Plaza is the focal point for the east campus, connecting the new Jenny Craig Pavilion with Torero Stadium, Cunningham Baseball Stadium, the soccer and playing fields, the upper mesa facilities and the east campus dormitories. As the entry to the stadium and pavilion, the plaza looks west across the campus and Mission Bay to the

Pacific Ocean, and serves as a multipurpose site where public events may be held. "Monsignor Eagen was such an integral part of the university. He served in one capacity or another for some 35 years — on the faculty, as an administrator, as trustee, as vice president. So many people wanted to have a permanent, public remembrance," says trustee Patricia Howe, who spearheaded the creation of the plaza. "The plaza is not only accessible to members of the campus community, but to those in the larger community whom he touched."

A landscaped meditation space is part of the permanent memorial. It stands at the east end of the plaza outside the Jenny Craig Pavilion, and includes writings from six major faith traditions in celebration of the monsignor's belief in reaching out to people of all faiths. These writings are included within this booklet.

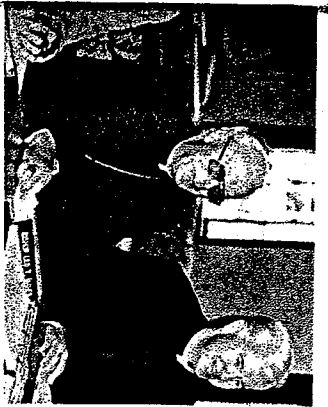

Monsignor I. Brent Eagen left

lives of thousands of San Diegans who knew him as a parish priest, university educator, civic leader and chaplain of the San Diego Chargers football team. His untimely death on October 14, 1997, was a loss to the entire San Diego community, especially to those at the University of San Diego, where his presence was felt almost daily for over 40 years.

Monsignor Eagen began his relationship with USD in 1956 as a student at Immaculate Heart Seminary. He joined the faculty of the San Diego College for Men in 1960 and taught theology, speech, English, and American literature. He served the university for the rest of his life—as teacher, director of school relations, trustee and vice president for mission and ministry. In 1968, Monsignor Eagen was named chancellor of the Diocese of San Diego. He later was assigned the pastorate of the Mission Basilica

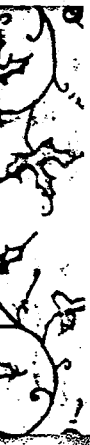


San Diego de Alcalá, where his many projects included a highly successful fund-raising campaign for a much-needed renovation of California's oldest mission. Monsignor Eagen left the mission in 1992 to become vice president of mission and ministry at USD. This newly created

position was his to conceptualize, a task he took very seriously. Ministering to people was a constant reminder of why he chose a religious life. It was something he did very well—and always with compassion, understanding and deep humility.

Monsignor Eagen created USD's All-Faith Service, an event in which people of many faiths join to share their diversity and express their concerns and values. Clergy from many religious faiths are invited to the service, which has become an annual celebration of the common goals and humanity of diverse faith traditions.

Throughout his life, Monsignor Eagen reached out to those in need of his wisdom, deep faith and spiritual guidance. After Monsignor Eagen's passing, one of his longtime friends spoke eloquently about his life: "He was a servant of God, of the Church and of the people," said Rabbi Wayne Dosick, an adjunct lecturer in USD's theological and religious studies department and a friend of Monsignor Eagen's for 22 years. "He brought a sense of goodness, compassion, faith and love to the community."

All God's Children: Religion, Divorce, and Child Custody

Many young Americans, married and marriageable, are turning to more traditional or fundamentalist religions. Religiosity and ultra-strict morality often leads to attitudes that alter decision-making in marriage, divorce, and the disposition of the children of divorce. Judgmental pastoral counseling may affect these decisions even more. This paper discusses these issues, emphasizing the need for forensic psychiatrists involved in the custody arena to be aware of the religious, spiritual, irreligious, or even anti-religious feelings of the battling partners. It also presents detailed information about the four major American religions (Roman Catholicism, traditional Judaism, Mormonism, and Islam) that have specific doctrine, protocols, or customs affecting decisions in marriage, divorce, and child custody and visitation. This information is presented from the viewpoint of a child advocate. Mental health experts consulting in child custody must understand the backgrounds of the battling parents, including the religious pressures that will may adversely affect their interspousal disputes, particularly those over child custody. The experts must also recognize the attitudes of the religious communities in which the custodial parent may reside after divorce. Those attitudes may be rejecting of the children as well as of the divorced parent(s). Mental health experts may have a better chance to reach agreement between the battling parents if the experts reverse the historic reluctance of psychiatrists to evaluate and discuss the religious feelings and beliefs of their forensic evaluatees.

Countless explanations have been offered regarding the upsurge of the strong fundamentalist religious beliefs to which more and more Americans have been attaching themselves. Definite, right-and-wrong moral codes, as promoted by many fundamentalist or ultra-orthodox churches, may be very appealing to many people in today's era of doubt and near constant social change. Many of those churches provide services that deliver emotional highs via charismatic means, rather than the sober rituals characteristic of the more familiar mainstream faiths.

Regardless of the reasons for this religious revival, the fact of its existence is unquestionably an increasingly important aspect of contemporary American life.¹ The comfort and security felt by many who adhere to those doctrines often promise to relieve

anxiety regarding difficult or threatening choices in life, such as the possible break-up of a marriage and the disposition of the children. The growth in numbers within those religious groups has been enormous over the past 15 or so years. However, adherents of even the strictest religious groups divorce, too, and they fight over custody and visitation of their children.

All of these contemporary religious trends may also be significant to judges and the lawyers appearing before them, as well as to the divorcing couple. Thus, these trends may influence judicial decisions regarding the disposition of the children of divorce. Forensic psychiatrists and other mental health experts involved in the struggles over child custody will need to know all the factors that may influence the combatants and, quite possibly, the decision-makers as well. Not the least of these factors are the parents' religious orientation and religious dedication. As will be seen, knowledge of these factors will also provide clues to the eventual fates of the fought over children,

which is the most important concern of the child-advocating forensic expert.

Surveys indicate that most Americans consider themselves religious to some degree, if not particularly devout or observant.² Many who declare themselves as religious do not belong to any organized religion. A recent nationwide poll conducted jointly by the Scripps Howard News Service and Ohio University indicates that one of nine Americans answer "none" when asked their religious preference.³ Nonetheless, they may express a belief in God or some Higher Power, or they may have developed strong feelings of spirituality without a particular religious or denominational direction. Further, many people who acknowledge some affiliation do not practice the rituals of that religion, including attending religious services. But somehow, they are all religious to some extent or in some personal if not denominational way. If they are affiliated, it may be with a new denomination, or a non-Western one, or they may simply express that they are "spiritual," a term with as many personal definitions as adherents.

Importantly, the poll reported that single adults who have no children are more than twice as likely to be religiously indifferent as married people who are raising or who have raised children. Only 8 percent of married-with-children households are not involved in organized religion, compared with 18 percent of adults who are childless and single.

These findings tend to emphasize the important influence religious beliefs may have in the lives of parents and the likely effect of that influence on decisions to divorce and possibly to fight about the custody of the children. The religious revival, however, does not only affect the religious. Secular parents, too, follow personal moral codes that may be quite as strict in many ways as those formalized by the devout. For example, those who have lacked organized religious upbringing may have been influenced by the religious attitudes of their peers or by other role models in their early lives. They may "find God" or convert to an orthodox religion later in life. The tenacious religious experiences of converts are not a cliché. Also, intermarriage is now a social norm in the Western world. In almost any case, deep religious feelings in either of the battling marital partners will affect both partners' thoughts, feelings, and attitudes toward staying together, separating, divorcing, and deciding what to do about the children.

Even though one spouse may be less religiously

observant than the other, not observant at all, or frankly anti-religious, each of the divorcing partners, as well as their families, lawyers, and judges, and especially their mental health counselors, must strive to understand all of the possible forces acting on both spouses. Some of those forces are often based upon religious doctrine long thought of as forgotten or unimportant. Too many cases have shown that these influences are anything but unimportant.

Historically, psychiatry and religion have been perceived as poles apart and, in fact, often mutually hostile. Characteristically, psychiatrists have not often investigated the religious beliefs and feelings of patients or of subjects for forensic evaluation. Times have changed, however. Many religions have established training programs in pastoral counseling and psychology in their own seminaries. Priests, ministers, rabbis, and other religious counselors have adopted tenets of psychodynamic psychology in their own attempts to work with their parishioners, which has aided many pastoral counselors in their constructive efforts. Because of their own strong belief systems, some of these counselors may guide their troubled congregants into paths that might adversely affect decisions regarding their children. On the other hand, religious counselors may not be able to achieve a peaceful, reasonable settlement of divorce and custody issues because of the rigid beliefs of one or both combatants.

Many forensic psychiatrists continue to ignore the significance of the religious beliefs and practices of the people they examine. Given that those beliefs can affect decisions regarding the children of bitter divorces, examiners can no longer disregard those issues. All mental health experts called to evaluate custody and visitation battles should determine the parents' religious attitudes and considerations, as well as those of any pastoral or lay counselor who may have advised one or both partners. It also might not be a bad idea to determine the attitudes of the lawyers involved or, if possible, the (potentially rigid) religious beliefs of the judge hearing the case if it goes to court.⁴

Religion, Parents, Counselors, and Judges

Divorce is a weighty topic for most people, regardless of their religious beliefs or lack of those beliefs. Divorce is, of course, always hard on the children. Rigidly moralistic stances of some devoutly religious, combating parents, at times strengthened by their

about the alleged immorality of the non-religious spouse or from the secular spouse about the so-called religious fanaticism of the more pious partner. What the mutual deprecations of the battling spouses do to the torn children, as expected, is disastrous. This leaves any mental health counselor involved in the custody arena with a most difficult but nonetheless mandatory task—to get the couple to understand and recognize the damage done to their children through these attitudes.

On the other hand, pastoral counselors have often provided considerable good for their clients. Religious counselors who express support and encouragement can be tremendously helpful, especially when they combine that support with genuine understanding of the emotional needs of the embattled couple and their children. Such an approach offers those parents a respite from those dreadful, self-punishing, guilty/rageful obsessions. It offers the possibilities of compromise and reasonably civil relationships with the opposing spouses, with the added blessing of backing from a person whose religious authority and moral values are beyond question.

Homosexuality

Although this article will subsequently address specific protocols and doctrines affecting divorce and child custody promulgated by four specific major American religions, the issue of homosexuality as a determining factor in custody disputes tends to sweep across most religions. Certainly, the feelings and beliefs about homosexuality described herein are often perceived as such within the four specific religions to be described later, but they will not be discussed separately in those sections.

The very inclusion of this issue in a discussion of religion is controversial because there are many who believe that religious doctrine and scriptural references may actually be misused to disguise basic, underlying homophobia and associated biases. Nonetheless, we should not ignore the strong possibility that deep religious beliefs may exacerbate the already pervasive prejudices against homosexual men and women in our society, particularly with respect to child custody and visitation. Certainly, many religious counselors and clergymen believe that homosexuality represents a sin of one degree or another. For example, there may be an expressed semblance of tolerance toward homosexual individuals, especially if the clergy are satisfied that the homosexual feelings

remain only that and do not progress to overt homosexual relations. Other clergy of varied religions (and many of their parishioners) believe that the very existence of those feelings is inordinately sinful. On the other hand, some clergy even promote the acceptance of homosexual ministers and homosexual marriage. The issue of how to regard homosexuals and homosexuality is an unsettled one within many religions and among many people who declare no denomination whatsoever; it has often become quite divisive in liberal as well as fundamentalist denominations.

When a homosexual parent makes manifest peace with his or her sexual identification some time after marriage and child bearing or rearing, divorce often follows. The other spouse usually harbors a deep sense of betrayal, perhaps even more so than divorcing spouses may feel in situations that do not include homosexuality. The sexual capacity and identity of the "betrayed" spouse is often threatened by virtue of the other spouse's favoring a mate of his or her own sex, and those feelings of threat usually give rise to intense rage, deepened by religious expressions of the sinfulness of homosexuality. The heterosexual spouse's perception of sinfulness and, of course, the associated rage are compounded if the homosexual spouse has actually developed a homosexual relationship. As with an extramarital heterosexual relationship, adultery is an offense seen as sinful in itself in the tenets of most religions; liberal as well as fundamentalist. Heterosexually or homosexually, the marriage vows have been violated, and that is enough in many denominations to second a partner's decision toward divorce.

Often, divorces in these situations are especially bitter, because the heterosexual spouse may not want the homosexual spouse to have any visitation with the children. Visitation is probably the most common issue with which the psychiatrist will need to struggle in any religiously flavored custody battle.⁷ Visitation may be the only compromise available to strongly religiously moralistic parents, but often the "betrayed" parent, his or her religious counselor, and that parent's religious family as well will fight hard against any visitation with such a perceived sinner. Myth-based fears abound of homosexual parents seducing their children of the same sex into sexual relations. Many people, especially bitter spouses, erroneously associate pedophilia with homosexuality. Unfortunately, in my own experience in a number of

Mental health experts are occasionally consulted by the ecclesiastic authorities to determine the validity of proposed annulment requests. At times, the consulting expert may recommend that remarriage within the Church not be allowed without necessary therapy that addresses the stated grounds of the annulment request for one or both of the splitting partners.

Without a Church-sanctioned annulment, a civilly divorced Catholic individual is not deemed to be in the state of grace required to receive the sacrament of remarriage. The Church's act of rendering a marriage as never having existed allows the individual to continue to receive all the sacraments and rites of the Church, including remarriage. The other sacraments of the Church, but not remarriage, are available to the civilly divorced party, although misconceptions are still being trumpeted about that situation.

Despite fallacious references by many to the contrary, the Church does not delegitimize the children of annulled marriages, even though an annulment renders the marriage as never having existed. No penalty is applied to the children by virtue of that process. The Church also recognizes and emphasizes the joint responsibilities of both parents to continue to provide for their children, regardless of the reality of the marital rupture or, for that matter, the rupture of an unmarried relationship that bore children. Nonetheless, many harbor considerable resentment against the Church, especially by non-Catholics whose marriages to Catholics have been annulled by the Church.

A recent, very well-publicized book by Sheila Rauch Kennedy, the annulled ex-wife of Rep. Joseph P. Kennedy II,¹² displays the author's wrath at having been told, as she perceives it, that the marriage (via a Catholic ceremony) to which she had devoted 17 years never existed. Moreover, despite the Church's assurances to the contrary, she feels strongly that the entire procedure does place the legitimacy of her children into question. On the other hand, the Church believes that not acknowledging that the marriage had taken place frees the partners from recriminations and also allows them to get on with their lives, including the possibility of getting married again. But feelings of rejection, hurt, and rage are hard to eliminate.

Early in 1997, in response to its recognition of the marked increase in numbers of Catholics who divorce, the Pontifical Council on the Family issued

new instructions and guidelines for priests in order to improve their pastoral counseling efforts with parishioners who have troubled marriages. The goal was to preserve the marriages. Even during the early stages of an annulment proceeding, counseling clergy attempt to determine if the marriage can be saved. The 1997 guidelines also urge priests to remind Catholics who remarry without annulment that they are "... living in a state of sin."¹³

Roman Catholic priests who counsel their parishioners take varying approaches to the issues of marriage, separation, and the disposition of the children of broken relationships. Even before a custody battle may develop, a conservative priest might recommend that the "wronged" partner in the broken marriage should be awarded custody of the children because he or she was morally more correct than the allegedly erring spouse. A basic Church view is that the parent with higher moral practices and standards (presumably the practicing Roman Catholic parent) is better for the child. At times, counseling such as that can lead to a custody battle. By and large, most Church authorities agree with the civil law that the best interests of the children should be the guiding principle. However, the definition of "best interests" may differ from priest to priest, just as it is known to differ from judge to judge. Now that the Church faces severe shortages of American applicants for the priesthood, priests from different countries who come here to serve bring with them their own cultural and traditional backgrounds and biases.

Many dioceses sponsor family service agencies staffed by professional counselors. These counselors are probably well-trained in understanding the emotional needs of their clients and are most likely also aware of the specific aspects of Roman Catholic thought regarding the children of broken families. To facilitate resolution in custody disputes affecting Roman Catholic couples, all mental health evaluators involved in these battles should ask permission to talk with the involved parish priest, then talk with another priest, and then, if at all possible, discuss the situation with the counselors at the local Catholic Family Service Agency. The priests certainly will not violate the confidences of the confessional; however, more often than not, their pastoral counseling took place at home or in the parish offices. Experience shows that many priests are grateful if a caring, sensitive, and capable mental health counselor comes

sufficient assurances of those changes, the LDS Church may welcome the offender back into its ranks.

By and large, at least officially, the congregation strictly directs its compassion toward the "wronged" partner. Likewise, the bishops and the congregation tend to favor strongly those who they feel were wronged in the marriage insofar as the disposition of the children of the divorce is concerned.

After the divorce of their parents, most Mormon children live with their mothers. This is similar, in fact, to the statistic reflecting the disposition of the children of divorce in general, but specific theological and social factors contribute to this occurrence within the LDS Church. Many of those issues center on the Mormon philosophy regarding the role of women. Most women are reared from childhood to maintain only domestic existences. The *Encyclopedia of Mormonism* acknowledges, "Severe personal and economic consequences usually accompany divorce among Latter-Day Saints. LDS women are often not well-prepared to support themselves and their children, and men may pay little in child support or alimony" ²⁰

The kind of extremely restricted gender roles dictated by such expectations has led to more than economic consequences for divorced Mormon women; many experience extreme feelings of helplessness and abandonment when their husbands leave. If a Mormon woman has been trained and conditioned since birth to be strictly a wife and mother and to lead an exclusively domestic existence, her entire sense of identity could be shattered by a marital break.

Subsequent to recovery from divorce-centered overt depressions, divorced Mormon women may need continued support because of their lack of any identity other than that of a wife. Even with the good will of their community, often including financial support if needed, the ex-wives' anxiety levels may rise markedly, and the children will probably become anxious as well. Anxiety, of course, is more contagious than the measles, and the children may develop behavioral or other problems. The mothers, who may feel relatively helpless to begin with, may have little capacity to deal with their children's problems, and further deterioration of the family may result.

The children of divorced Mormon parents often feel alienation because of the congregation's attitudes toward them as well as toward the divorced mother. Even if the custodial mother is perceived as the

blame-free marital partner, the fact that a divorce has occurred often casts a cloud over her acceptance by the community, and that cloud hangs over the children as well. Although the victims of divorce are said to be accepted by the doctrines of the LDS Church, the unofficial cloud may still affect them because of the degree of anxiety their divorces may create in their still-married peers. The fear that "There but for the grace of God go I" can be exceptionally strong in LDS wives because of their upbringing allowing little other ambition or opportunity than happy domestic lives. Frequently, the divorced custodial parents' often realistic perception of non-acceptance in their community leads them to leave the LDS Church. ²¹ Further increased anxiety is the generally expected result of leaving the only community they had ever known. Their anxiety, as well as the separation of the children from their own longstanding, familiar community, of course, also adversely affects the children.

In summary, the LDS Church's strong beliefs in lifelong fidelity and mutual love, and its denunciation of anything that breaks up a household, may in fact create increased problems for some of its members. There is a definite, frequent, almost compelled tendency in troubled LDS marriages to stay together for the sake of the children or for the sake of maintaining fellowship with the Church. That may create a household that rears children who are adversely affected by one or both parents' frustration. Likewise, the need for a remarkable amount of emotional support is the rule whenever there is a breakup of a Mormon family. Much of that emotional support must be directed toward the children. They are, as always, the major victims of divorce.

Traditional Judaism, Divorce, and Children

This section does not describe the practices of Conservative or Reformed Judaism, whose members comprise the majority of American Jews. Obviously, it also does not describe the practices of unaffiliated or non-practicing Jews, who may outnumber all others but who may still feel a sense of Jewish identity. This discussion refers solely to the practices and doctrines of Orthodox Judaism, the most traditionally observant branch of the Jewish religion. Orthodoxy has attracted a large following of young American Jews, which is almost a reflection of the increasing numbers of young Christian people attracted to the more fundamentalist Christian religions. ²² Although

To begin the ritual of the *Get*, the *Bet Din* convenes to hear the cases presented by each side. At times, the *Bet Din* will recommend that no divorce be granted or that the couple seek psychological counseling if they have not already done so. However, more often than not the determination of true mutuality of the decision by both partners is the major factor that influences the decision of the *Bet Din* to grant the divorce.

Unlike Roman Catholic annulment proceedings, an application for a *Get* does not have to be preceded by a civil divorce. Obviously, a civil divorce is necessary for legal purposes in most countries, including the United States, and the *Bet Din* insists that one will follow if it has not already been sought. In a non-theocratic land, the *Bet Din* needs to ensure that civil law will provide the supplemental force necessary to maintain the agreed conditions of the *Get*. In Orthodox Judaism, a couple that obtains only a civil divorce is considered as still married. If the ex-wife remarries without having been divorced via a *Get*, her subsequent children are considered to be *Momzerim* (illegitimate), although any subsequent children of the remarried father are not, because the father's children putatively come from a known father. The children of the divorced mother may come from unknown fathers, according to tradition long antedating blood type and DNA studies.

Sometimes, Jewish men may refuse to give their wives requested religious bills of divorce. This is a rare problem, but in contemporary Britain those situations have created enough of a scandal to lead at least one rabbi to shame those men publicly from his pulpit and on the internet by posting their names on his synagogue's Web site.³⁰ Other rabbis are joining him in his crusade. Many of those shamed men use the enticement of a *Get* to extort large bribes from their wives before they will agree to allow the divorce. The wives may obtain civil divorces but they would

not be able to remarry in the Orthodox faith. Of course, they could remarry within a Reform or Conservative Jewish community, but doing so would usually create enormous intrafamilial and related social problems.

The wives whose husbands refuse to grant them *Gets* are known as *Agunot*, or chained women. Because of the wives' fears of the *Shandeh* that the Orthodox community will consider their future children as *Momzerim* if they result from subsequent civil, Reform, or Conservative marriages, they may have no recourse but to agree to the extortion in order to protect their children. *Momzerim* will not be allowed under Jewish law to marry anyone other than other *Momzerim* or converts to Judaism. They are not allowed to marry within the accepted Orthodox religious community.

In Britain, a support group, *Agunot Anonymous*, was founded to help the country's "chained women." According to *The Times of London*, "... about a hundred men and women chained themselves outside the office of the Chief Rabbi, Dr. Jonathan Sacks, in protest at the religious divorce laws. He announced earlier ... that an additional person would be appointed to his religious court ... to find a solution, but so far no loophole has been discovered ..."³¹

Except in ultra-Orthodox communities, the *Bet Din* usually has little to say about the disposition of the children of the divorce, other than paying strict attention to the regularity of the father's child support payments to the expected custodial mother. In Jewish law and tradition, the mother is considered to be the mainstay of the Jewish home. The pre-nuptial agreements, known to the *Bet Din*, demand that the ex-husband support the ex-wife and the children. The agreements indicate that most of the time Orthodox Jewish children will automatically revert to the woman's custody, as is also most common in secular divorce.³²

Traditionally observant fathers rarely fight for custody, although, given the rare situation of an Orthodox wife's infidelity, they might choose to fight. In that situation, or possibly others in which the father might also have increased rage and resentment against his wife, he may decide to fight for custody. Within the religious community, the mother's adultery or other grievous offense might result in the *Bet Din's* backing the father's claims, but these are rare instances. In such rare cases, the *Bet Din* generally examines quite closely the motivations for paternal

jurisdiction over marriage, divorce, child custody, and all people who live in or who even visit Israel, whether they are citizens or not. If they are divorced Jews, they are obviously safer having obtained a *Get*. The U.S. State Department has issued a warning: "In some cases, Jewish Americans who enter Israel as tourists have become defendants in divorce cases filed against them in rabbinical court by their American spouses Jewish American visitors should be aware that they may be subject to involuntary and prolonged stays in Israel if a case is filed against them in a rabbinical court. This may occur even when the marriage took place in the U.S. and/or the spouse seeking relief is not present in Israel. Americans have been detained in Israel for prolonged periods while the Israeli [rabbinical] courts consider whether such individuals have sufficient ties to Israel to establish rabbinical court jurisdiction"²⁹

creating some of the same trends affecting the children that will be described later in this section.

Traditional Muslim practice is also currently being shaken in America by a movement that threatens to divide Islam here. *Sufi*, as it is called, is a spiritual path emphasizing Islam's mystical inner dimension. It seeks inner knowledge gained by veneration of teachers and saints, meditative chanting, and other practices that both orthodox and American modernist Muslims reject as heretical.⁴² If, as some experts believe, the reaction against *Sufi* creates more traditional, fundamentalist practices in American Islam, many of the situations characteristic of middle eastern Islam will become even more commonly seen here, with definite strains on the American Islamic family.

Although the *Koran*, the Islamic scripture, calls for respect and, on occasion, even reverence toward women, especially mothers, the role of men in traditional Muslim life remains dominant to an extent that sometimes appears totally incomprehensible to contemporary Western minds. In the West, with its ongoing feminist revolution and demands for equal rights and respect, the concepts represented by Islamic law and tradition often appear quite alien. Much of what has been considered characteristic of Islamic thought and practice, however, is really not specifically Koranic but, rather, is cultural. It often reflects the attitudes of the middle eastern areas from which the religion arose and where it remains most prominent.

For example, many of the burdensome, restrictive aspects referable to Muslim women, supposedly attributed to Islam, are only theoretically and possibly distantly based on the *Koran's* statements that women are weaker and must be protected and even sequestered, as well as valued. Many Islamic authorities recognize such male-imposed attitudes as primitive attempts to maintain power over women who are kept uneducated and otherwise demeaned. It is necessary to understand the differences between actual Koranic doctrine on the one hand, and possibly power-based practices such as these on the other, when so many Muslims now live in the West where they marry and divorce, where they have children, and where they may fight over them.

Newspaper articles often relate tales of one or the other Islamic parent, usually the immigrant father, kidnapping the children. The father may take them back to his middle eastern homeland where his rights

are probably deemed paramount, more so via the national culture than by the *Koran*. If the mother flees with the children for fear of the father's abducting them, the mother and children usually go into hiding. Both situations, of course, are dreadful for the children. Nonetheless, custom may tend to stimulate its adherents to such occasional rash acts, especially when the adherents live in a Western community that perceives their laws, customs, and the practitioners themselves as so very alien.

Little intercommunication seems to develop between Muslim immigrants and their new Western neighbors, especially among the women. Newly transported followers of Islam tend to dwell in close-knit, extended family circles, and often they resist any penetration by Western influences. It takes little imagination to consider what a divorced Muslim wife must face in her society and in ours, isolated to such a great degree from most people who might otherwise be able to offer emotional or other support. The stresses on a Muslim single mother in America are enormous.⁴³ Ordinarily, she would lean on her own family for financial and emotional support, but if she has emigrated to the West with her husband, and if her family is "back home," there is little support for her to find here. Many immigrant Muslim wives have limited education, or if they have been educated, they may have limited capacities to seek gainful employment in Western society. The distant fathers provide some financial support, as dictated by Muslim tradition, but the level is ordinarily not high. According to Western standards, it may not even be barely adequate. At least relative poverty is inflicted upon many divorced Muslim wives and the children in their households. Without an active family or social support system available to the divorced immigrant Muslim mother in America, life becomes very hard.⁴⁴

Social welfare and law enforcement personnel involved in tracking fathers delinquent in support payments rarely have contact with the immigrant Muslim community because the frightened abandoned wives will not accuse their non-paying ex-husbands or shame them by complaining to secular authorities. Additionally, as will be seen, legally those men may not be ex-husbands because many simply divorce according to Islamic law, not civil law. The effects on the children reared by such single mothers can be awful, with anxiety levels high throughout the household.⁴⁵

needs of the child. That responsibility rests with the mother in most cases, unless the religious court or the local *Imam*, the ecclesiastic authority, determines that she may be unfit. Generally, the mother will have residential custody of the children and will see to the children's care, education, and medical services, usually as dictated by the father. He has legal custody of the children and is actually their legal guardian. He has full responsibility for their welfare in every non-emergency matter, and he makes choices regarding the children's education and non-emergent medical care. The mother must abide by the father's choices. The father can also sign marriage contracts for his children, regardless of their ages. The mother is simply a loving caretaker, and it is possible that she can lose that position as well if she remarries and the ex-husband determines that he wishes to take the children.

Visitation by the noncustodial parent, that is, the father, is simply not a problem that creates controversy. Under Islamic law, the father can see his children at any time, and often there is an expectation that the father will see the children daily in order to supervise their discipline and to teach a trade to his sons. Visitation procedures, as prescribed in the few Western civil divorce proceedings affecting Muslim families, are often ignored.⁴⁹ The divorces may be respected, the instructions disregarded. In practice, the fathers usually spend more time visiting with their sons than with their daughters. Most schools of Islamic jurisprudence state that male children are to remain in their mother's custody until they are pre-pubertal (some say until they are seven or nine years old), and then they will revert to the custody of the father. Girls will stay with their mothers until they begin to menstruate or, according to other Islamic jurisprudential opinion, until they can begin to experience pleasure in sexuality. Then they will stay with the father and his family until they get married. The father and his family are deemed to be the girls' best protectors against the seemingly constant possible threat of sexual violation. In those cases in which kidnappings by the father occur, the children involved are usually male. If they are female, they may have already been promised by the father in marriage to equally young male children still living in the Middle East.

One particular sticking point is the right of the mother to gain access to her children once the father has assumed physical custody and has taken the chil-

dren to his home. If the father's home is across the seas, international court disputes provide little encouragement for mothers. If the father's family is in the same Western country as the mother, there may be a chance that civil law may force the allowance of visitation, although the forbidding of such visitation on religious grounds is a very rare phenomenon in any event. More often, it is based upon the same angry, resentful sources as in other cultures, which are seen so frequently in our society and in its courtrooms. In middle eastern cultures, even when shifted to the United States, the force represented by angry Islamic fathers is generally overwhelming to that minimal power manifested by the divorced mother.

Conclusion

Despite any doctrinal or other differences among disparate cultural, religious, or ethnic groups, the underlying feelings giving rise to the dissolution of marital bonds and to battles for the children may be seen as reasonably similar throughout the world. The feelings such as rage or defensiveness that universally give rise to custody and visitation battles, however, may be emphasized and accentuated by the tenets of the specific religious doctrines to which the battling parents adhere. The parents' untenable underlying emotions may be masked by those same doctrinal tenets. The combatants cling to religious doctrines at times so as not to have to face those underlying factors.

The forensic psychiatrist or other mental health expert who becomes involved in dealing with difficult divorces or custody or visitation battles will always need to look beneath a number of cultural carpet corners to see the underlying dynamics swept there. Those universal feelings of anger, hurt, and betrayal are givens, whereas the actual religious or cultural distinctions may represent significant barriers beyond which helpful counselors may or may not be able to go. If the counselors are able to get to the underlying emotions with the parents, better chances develop of resolving the disputes without the need for destructive court trials. But that goal is made much harder to reach if the forensic expert lacks the knowledge or the appreciation of the religious beliefs of the parents who may hide behind them. Furthermore, the forensic psychiatrist may be ignorant of the beliefs of whatever clergyperson or pastoral or lay counselor may have emphasized those feelings (or their own feelings) and stiffened the defensiveness of one or both parents. Historically, most mental health

vorcing party as wronged (in a moral sense) and to see their duty as lying exclusively or at least more heavily with supporting the "wronged" party's needs and wishes. In order to be effective on almost any terms, the psychiatric expert witness must ferret out this rather common tendency and attempt to assess its potential impact on the negotiations and legal proceedings.

With important variations, all faith groups share a strong stance against the occurrence of divorce itself. They tend to impose a requirement that spouses attempt to find remedies, including both religious and secular counseling, for their failing marriages. There are preparatory requirements and even specific calls for assessments before the ceremony of marriage is permitted. Goldzband includes fascinating descriptions of procedures for reconciliation available in Islam and Judaism. Experts can expect to be called upon at different stages of the reconciliation attempt in the evolving divorce process. Often, every opportunity for reconciliation will be exhausted. But the consultant who identifies that a possibility of reconciliation remains viable will be able to appreciate its possible covert effects, along with more obvious ones, as well as any potential for its success. Although not specifically mentioned by Goldzband, the potential value of a reconciliation attempt appears implicit in his account and worth considering, especially in cases marked by religious overtones.

Regardless of the particular denomination or sect involved, a person's religious feelings may bring out emotional vulnerabilities, with adverse impact on his or her role in the negotiation process. For example, an adult might be so guilt-ridden or a child so fearful as to compromise competency to participate appropriately for their roles in custody negotiations. Surely, a forensic psychiatric expert is particularly qualified to observe and evaluate this possibility, but only if the appropriate index of suspicion is present. When an important area of competency is found wanting, it is the duty of the expert to insure that the situation is resolved lest the outcome prove to be unjust.

Specific Suggestions

Goldzband's suggestion that the psychiatric expert witness consider what clergy have to say is certainly well taken. I would emphasize it to the point of urging that the expert explicitly undertake to identify and seek out any clergy person who may be influenc-

ing any of the parties involved, including the children. This includes clergy who are working out of church-related agencies but separately from places of worship, and may even include professional pastoral psychotherapists in solo practice or in practice with an agency outside the religious sector.² The consultant needs to understand not only what the influence of the clergy person might be on the positions the parties are taking but also the goals they are pursuing and their potential impact on outcome, broadly considered.

As Goldzband also suggests, the consultant should delve deeply into what the parties themselves profess to believe. Varying degrees of intensity will have to be taken into account within the same faith, and content will differ both within and across denominational lines. In some situations, there may be questions about the parties' consistency over time or even of their veracity. Since control over their children is at stake, some will try to lie about various issues, including their own religious beliefs. Indeed, the combination of such a lie's potentially powerful influence and its low risk of being discovered might render this temptation quite irresistible for some individuals. Once again, Goldzband's point needs to be extended somewhat. Similarly, since decision-shaping beliefs in areas usually seen as touching only on religion (values, for example) can have a strong impact,³ I submit that the consultant needs to include them, as well, in the examination of divorcing spouses.

Another suggestion is that although he does not state it explicitly, some of the little-known aspects of Islamic religious/cultural customs that Goldzband describes are important enough to constitute warnings for the consultant to give directly to the secular divorce court. These include especially the tendency for recent women immigrants to respond with extreme isolation to their experience of being uprooted, even keeping their children home from school to assuage their own loneliness. Further, the paper includes a detailed list covering nearly four pages of Islamic legal provisions that the expert would do well to ponder, considering how they may apply to any given case. Finally, the tendency of fathers to renege on their support obligations while mothers remain silent for religious as well as psychological reasons also exists as a more universal concern to which consultants should not be blind. Recognizing that Islamic law's hidden provisions may have significant

Survey of Forensic Psychiatrists on Evaluation and Treatment of Prisoners on Death Row

Psychiatrists have debated their role in evaluating prisoners accused of capital crimes and in treating prisoners on death row when restoration of competence would result in execution. Despite debate, there are no previous surveys of psychiatrists' opinions on this issue. We sent an anonymous questionnaire to all board-certified forensic psychiatrists in the United States. Of the 456 forensic psychiatrists identified, 290 (64%) returned the survey. Most respondents supported a role, in at least some cases, for psychiatric evaluation of prisoners accused of capital crimes. Respondents were divided on whether or not psychiatrists should treat incompetent death row prisoners if restoration of competence would result in execution. Attitudes about the ethical acceptability of capital punishment were associated with views about the psychiatrists' role but were not determinative in every case.

In the United States, citizens have passionately debated the legitimacy of capital punishment.¹⁻³ Psychiatrists also have disputed their role in death penalty cases since both psychiatric evaluation and treatment of condemned prisoners can raise ethics dilemmas.⁴⁻¹² Since the 1986 Supreme Court ruling that execution of an "insane" (incompetent to be executed) inmate was not constitutional,¹³ professional debate has intensified on the issue of evaluation of competency to be executed and its potential consequences. In particular, psychiatric treatment of an incompetent-to-be-executed death row inmate

can result in restoration of competence and thereby place the individual one step closer to execution. In considering whether to participate in evaluation and treatment of death row prisoners, psychiatrists, particularly forensic psychiatrists, have struggled with issues of personal and professional ethics. Medical ethics in the United States as promulgated by the American Medical Association (AMA) takes the position that it is unethical for any physician to directly participate in an execution.¹⁴ In addition, the current opinions of the AMA Council on Ethical and Judicial Affairs (CEJA) of the AMA Code of Medical Ethics suggests that physicians "should not" treat an incompetent death row inmate for competency restoration unless the death sentence is commuted or the inmate is undergoing extreme suffering.¹⁴

Among psychiatrists, forensic psychiatrists arguably have the greatest expertise and experience in the criminal justice arena. The debate among psychiatric and legal experts over the appropriate roles of psychiatrists in capital case evaluations has been intense,^{4-12, 15, 16} but the attitudes of forensic psychiatrists have never been sought. The one known prior survey of psychiatrists only asked whether evaluation of competence to be executed and treatment of incompetent death row prisoners were ethics

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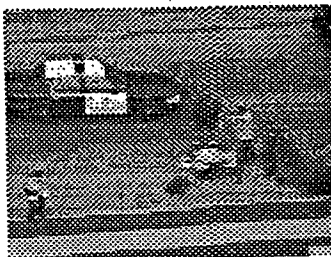
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Shots Fired At Granite Hills High School

Suspect Reportedly In Custody

Police believe that a possible second suspect is at large and may be in possession of

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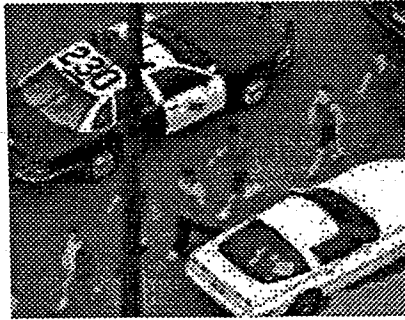


a handgun or rifle. Area residents were urged to stay indoors.

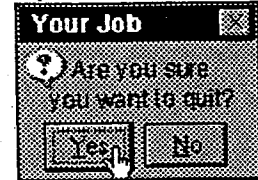
Granite Hills High School students were evacuated to Kennedy Park across the street. Parents were instructed to pick up their children at the park.

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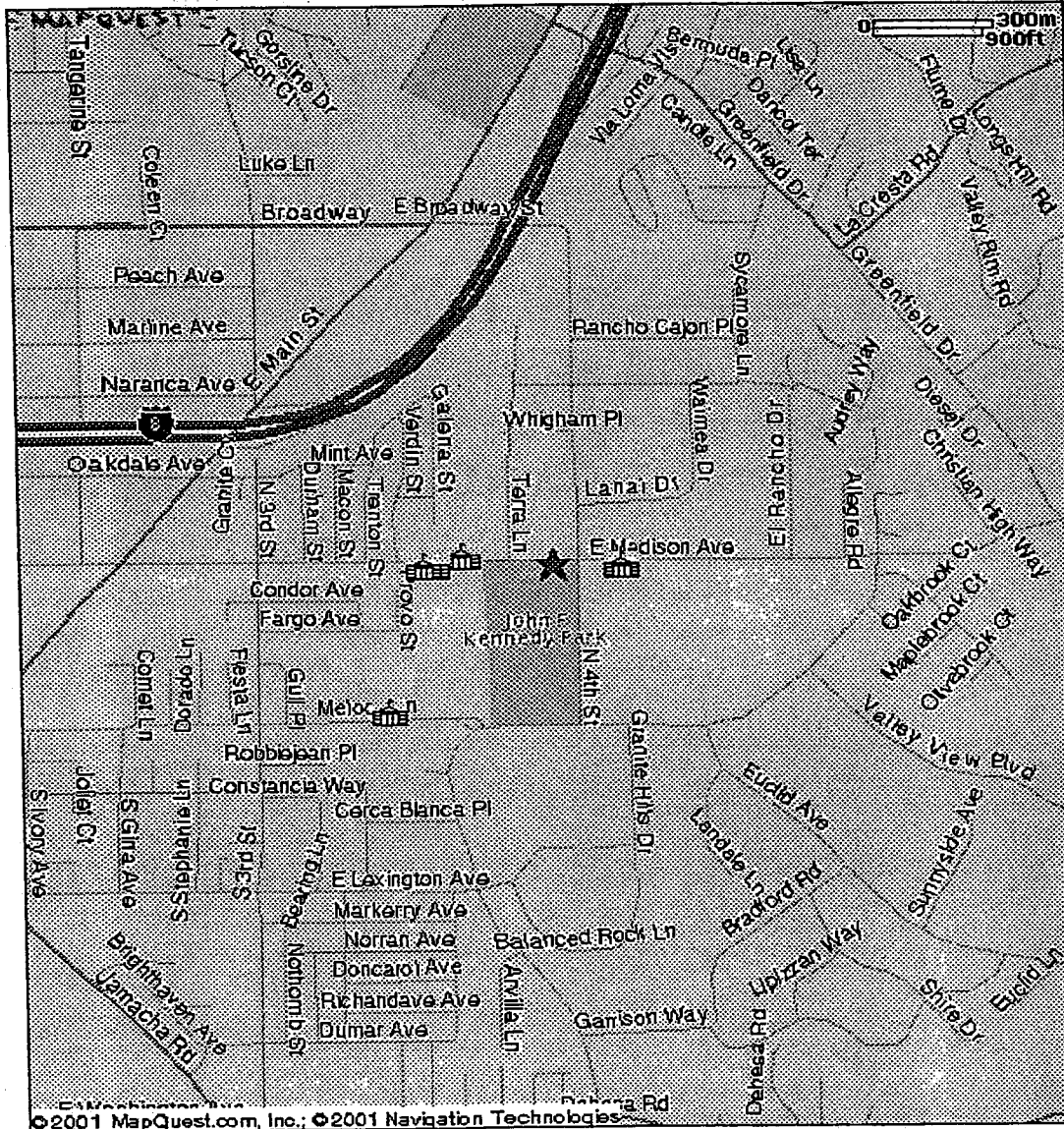


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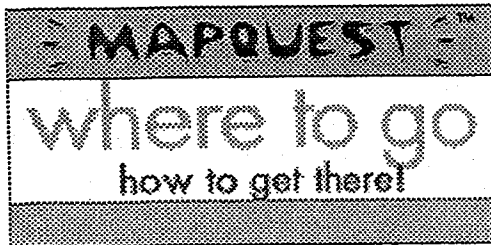
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To the memory of Reverend Monsignor I. Brent Eagen

Homily for I.B. Eagen Funeral on October 19, 1997

As we pray our good-byes today, we remember, we have some regrets, but, also, we rejoice.

Bishop Brom imposed his hands on the head of a priest who had served his three predecessors, one of whom, Charles Francis Buddy, 41 years before had laid on hands in similar fashion, praying, "Believe what you read, teach what you believe and put into practice what you teach." The words of Bishop Brom, however, were the prayers for the dying: "Accept your servant Lord into the place of salvation for which he hopes. Free your servant Lord from every pain and suffering. Free your servant Lord as you freed Moses from the hand of Pharaoh. Free your servant Lord as you freed Susanna from false witness. Free your servant as you freed Lazarus from the bonds of death." "Amen, Amen," was the response of the one this city had come to know fondly as just I.B., Msgr. I. Brent Eagen. His breathing labored, his soul at peace, prepared and packed with grace he awaited his next journey. It wouldn't be long in coming and he would begin spending his time in heaven doing good on earth.

"I remember, I.B." I said, "how well your prayers work. They got the Chargers to a Super Bowl." "One of my only regrets," he responded. "I only prayed to get us to the Super Bowl. I forgot to pray to win it."

Today, we remember how many times this pastor had lead a community in prayer, in celebration of the Eucharist, how many times he poured the waters of baptism. He recently commented after welcoming one such newborn into the Christian community, "You realize you're getting old when you start baptizing the grandkids of people you married." We remember the marriages and burials of family members and friends here today. We remember how he was a shepherd carrying out with prudence and love an exhortation to dialogue, to collaboration and prayer with the followers of other religions and other Christian Traditions to recognize and promote the spiritual and moral values that are common to us all who pray to the same God who leads us all to rest. Our interfaith and ecumenical leaders are a tribute and reminder of how foreign to the mind of Christ is any discrimination or harassment of anyone because of race, color, condition of life or religion. We remember all this but also there are regrets.

We regret that all of us didn't have the opportunity to pray with him, his illness so fast moving. But he knew those who begged God for more time, more time to pastor. He was so at peace with God. I regret that as a true pastor and fund raiser, he didn't allow me to take up a collection today.

More than the regrets though, we rejoice that his prayer book is a lasting legacy of this good shepherd. We rejoice in knowing that whenever we walk into his beloved Mission or Founder's Chapel, that this priest who wants us all to pray, yes even for victory, is in the hands of God who calls the souls of the just, who chastised a little, are greatly blessed because God tried them and found them worthy.

Oh, his life as a priest was lived out with numerous titles, honors, and roles, Knight Commander of the Holy Sepulchre, Honorary chaplain of the Navy. He had his own gifts and talents, his own foibles and ways that we all recall—his favorite toast. "Salud, pesetas y amor y el tiempo para gustarlas", and his habit of eating everything on his plate as his mother taught. But one such practice I remember especially was how he always insisted on holding the door for everyone. He was always the last to enter. Sometimes, I would purposely try to hold the door for him but finally gave up. Yes, we remember today a priest who understood Paul's words proclaimed in our midst: "None of us lives for one self, none of us dies for one self.." We remember a priest who served the civic leaders of this city as a trusted collaborator and outstanding citizen. We remember how he served to open doors for the elderly by forging ahead in building low cost senior housing, put food on the plates of the homeless and hungry, promoted the health care for the indigent.

I regret that he will no longer open the door or make the toast. I regret more that his never failing effort on behalf of Catholic Charities, and Vincent de Paul, Scripps-Mercy, senior housing will rest now without one of its strongest voices.

Still I can rejoice in the legacy this priest servant for others has left us to use our time, talent and treasure for others. I rejoice in his last act of service, asking that instead of flowers, contributions go toward USD scholarships so that the next generation might benefit from the gift of an education rooted in Catholic values that of its very nature, insists on service.

One last memory of another of IB's traits was his ability to remember names. Uncanny. If in conversation he couldn't remember someone's name, it would drive him crazy until he remembered name, address and times shared together. Perhaps it was the teacher, the historian in him, but he traveled the world and knew and remembered people, made good friends. We used to kid him how his latest trip was always the best and Bishop Maher used to say that IB met a cousin every place he went. For an only child that was quite a feat, especially in Russia.

We remember through the words of our gospel when Jesus arrived at the home of Martha and Mary and found his friend had died, he wept. There was that human compassionate Jesus who teaches us by example that we who are sad and weep at the loss of our friend may also rejoice because like Lazarus our friend is free, death has no hold. I picture Jesus as having the same kind care for Lazarus, Martha and Mary as I remember IB having for his friends, both old and new. By his very presence he taught us what it is to love, to delight in another, to be with others—it didn't matter if it was just on the phone, at a party, a change of command, fund raiser, bridge table or tennis court.

I regret that this good teacher will not be there anymore to offer the good counsel he gave to USD, the diocese, to me and all who called him friend. I rejoice that he teaches

us still to put into action what we teach by loving, forgiving and setting free those who remain in our world bound up by little deaths each day.

So, IB, I rejoice that this time your last trip indeed is your best. As he prepared for this final journey, he said to us gathered around his bedside, "I wish I could let you know what it is like—but I'll just have to meet you there."

Monsignor I. Brent Eagen, Priest of God, you have reminded us of the mission entrusted to us all, especially to us your brother priests, to bring Christ the teacher, pastor and servant to our world. Your love for priesthood and your very life is something for which we can only say, "thank you", and move now to the altar to remember the greatest act of love, the love of Christ who brings us together as nothing else can, the love that alone gave meaning to your years as a priest of Jesus Christ. We go to the altar to remember, to offer our regret for our failings in love and to rejoice in thanksgiving for you, our brother, our friend, our priest.

...saying that he "contributed significantly to accomplish the mission of Christ in this portion of the Lord's vineyard."

Was ordained in 1956

Monsignor Eagen's life story reads like a testimonial for the Roman Catholic Church. He was the only child of two devout Catholics and graduated from a Catholic high school in San Bernardino in 1947. He studied at Loyola University, a Catholic school in Los Angeles, and attended two seminaries — St. Francis and Immaculate Heart in El Cajon.

He was ordained in 1956 at St. Joseph Cathedral in San Diego and served as a priest there for six months before moving to a parish in San Bernardino.

In 1960, he joined the faculty of the San Diego College for Men, a predecessor of the University of San Diego, and later served as its director of school relations. In 1968, he was named chancellor of the San Diego diocese, a top administrative post he would hold until 1989.

In 1971, he also returned to parish work, taking over as pastor of California's oldest church, Mission San Diego de Alcalá. For many years, he juggled the dual jobs of chancellor and parish priest. He also helped raise millions of dollars to restore the mission.

On the last day of 1992, Monsignor Eagen left his beloved parish. With the new year, he took over a new challenge — USD's vice president for mission and ministry.

His USD roots ran deep. He was instrumental in merging the men's and women's colleges into the Catholic university. He served as a trustee from 1968 to 1993, when he was named trustee emeritus. In 1980 he was awarded an honorary doctorate by USD.

But there was more to him than the official jobs.

His gentle, dignified presence became a familiar one throughout San Diego — at religious gatherings, civic dinners and gala fundraisers. A colleague estimated yesterday that his phone card file — and Christmas list — included some 1,300 names.

As Sister RayMonda DuVall, executive director of Catholic Charities, put it: "He fit in every arena." DuVall remembered how he made people feel special, taking the time to write a personal note or field a telephone call, even when he was busy. He was, she added, "such a wonderful representative of our church, our mission."

"I.B. was out there all the time — community events, political events, interreligious events," said Rabbi Wayne Dosick. "In many ways he was the spokesman for the church."

The rabbi from North County remembers getting a call a few years ago from his longtime friend about starting an interfaith service at USD.

That annual all-faith service was begun in 1994, with nine faith groups represented. "The entire credit for that goes to him," Dosick said.

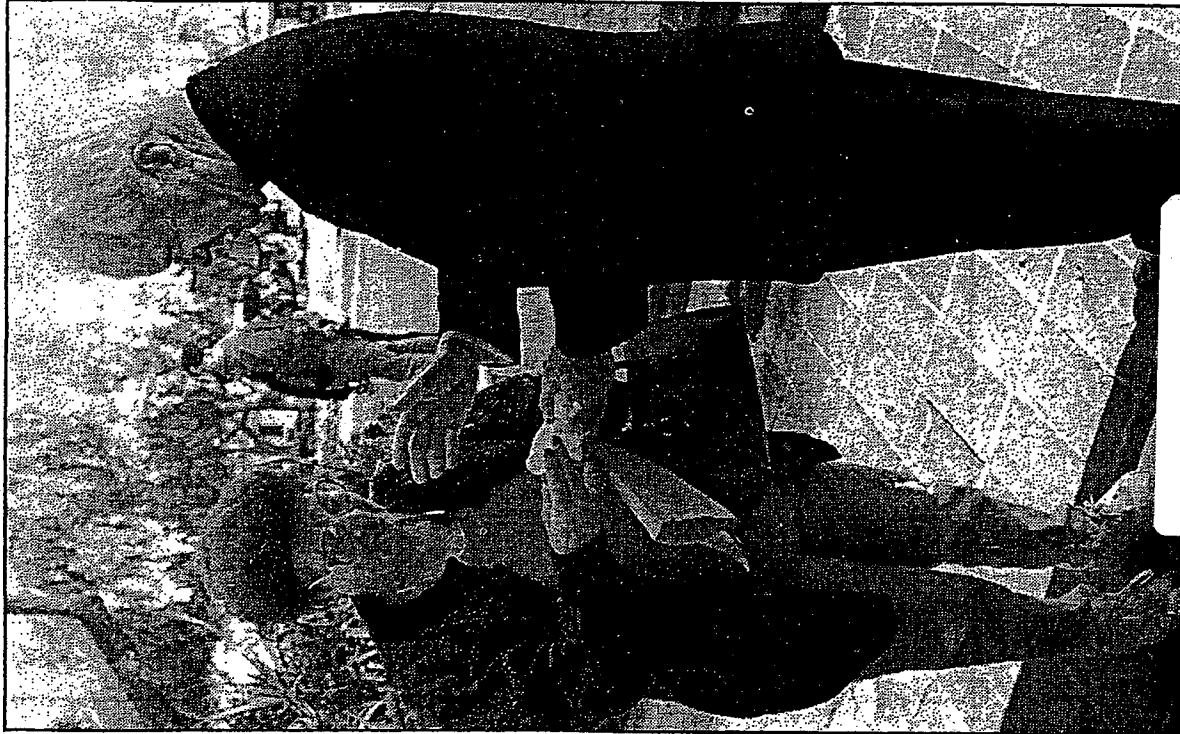
The Rev. Glenn Allison, executive director of San Diego County's Ecumenical Council, recalled his commitment to ecumenism, of "creating unity among the common human family."

Chargers' enthusiastic chaplain

"And he did it graciously," said Allison. "That's the word that comes to mind when I think of I.B.: graciousness, full of grace."

The Rev. Akio Miyaji, of the Buddhist Temple of San Diego, was struck by the priest's deep respect for religions. "It is for us a great loss," said Miyaji, who participated in the first all-faith service at USD.

Monsignor Eagen also was an enthusiastic chaplain to the San Diego Chargers. In the final seconds of the AFC Championship game in 1995, he found himself on the sidelines saying Hail Marys for victory.

"I pray to win," he said, laughing afterward. The Chargers beat the Pittsburgh Steelers.

As for his fans, they go beyond the religious community.

Among his honors: a Christian Unity award from the Ecumenical Council, a regional Brotherhood award from the National Conference of Christians and Jews, honorary chaplain of the Navy, "Man for All Seasons" from the St. Vincent de Paul-Joan Kroc Center, and a Medal of Honor from the Daughters of the American Revolution.

There will be a visitation from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. Saturday in Founders Chapel on the USD campus, with a prayer service at 8:30 p.m.

On Sunday, visitation will continue from 1 to 3 p.m. in USD's Immaculata, followed by the funeral Mass at 4 p.m.

Burial will be Monday in San Bernardino at Mountain View Cemetery, where his parents also are interred.

Monsignor Eagen is survived by an extended family, which asks that donations be made to USD's James and Stella Eagen Endowed Scholarship Fund, which was established in 1989 to honor the memory of his parents.

Monsignor Joseph Brennan was in the same seminary class with Monsignor Eagen, they were ordained together and had been buddies ever since. Brennan was at his bedside Tuesday night, praying, when Monsignor Eagen died.

"He had a great sensitivity toward people," Brennan said yesterday from his Long Beach home. "Almost like he had a television antenna, sensing when somebody needed help or when somebody needed a kind word. He was, I would say, the essence of what a priest should be."

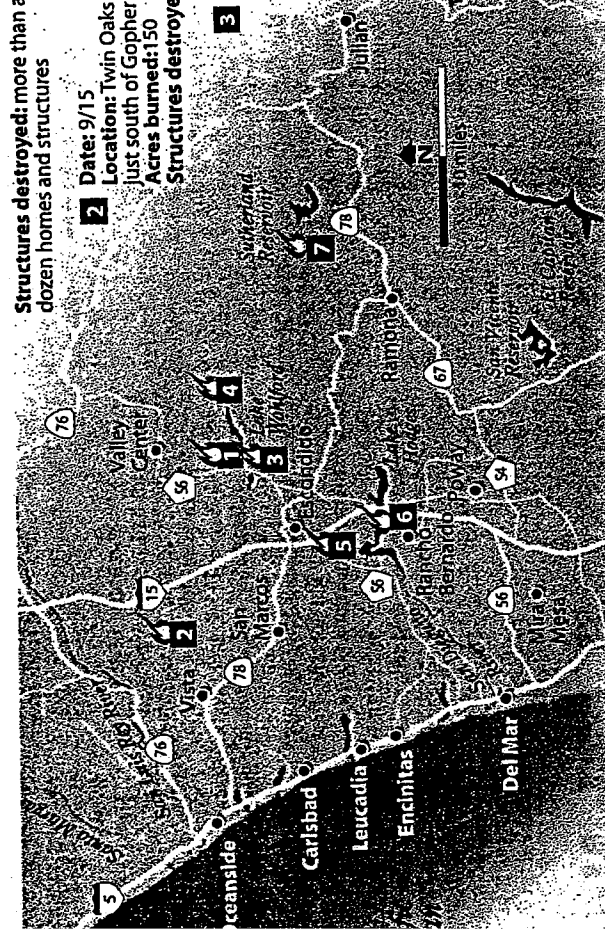

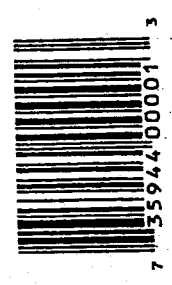

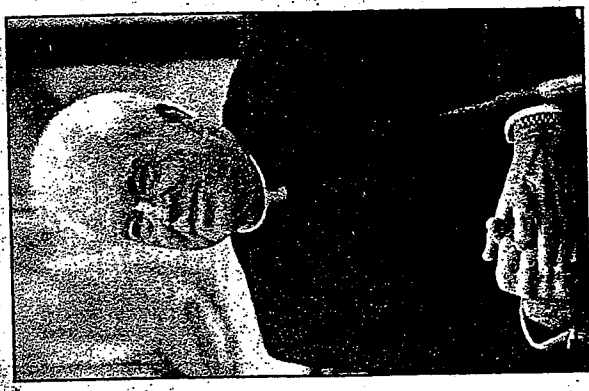

USD vice president who simply wanted to be a parish priest

On Tuesday night, two months shy of his 68th birthday, Monsignor Isaac Brent Eagen died at Mercy Hospital from complications resulting from pancreatic cancer. He had undergone surgery last week for the cancer.

Yesterday, a chorus of friends echoed the same refrain over and over. Kind. Gentle. Spiritual. Caring. A man of God.

"The death of Monsignor Eagen is an irreplaceable loss to the university," said Alice Bourke Hayes, president of the University of San Diego, where he served as a vice president for the past four years.

Bishop Robert Brom of the Roman Catholic Diocese of San Diego expressed "deep appreciation" for Monsignor Eagen's four-plus decades of ministry.

He loved the Chargers, people and playing tennis. But most of all, Monsignor I.B. Eagen loved being a Roman Catholic priest. "I really wanted to be a parish priest," he once said. "I didn't want to be an administrator. I didn't want to be an educator. I wanted to be a parish priest."

In his 41 years of ordained life, Monsignor Eagen was all three — and more.

He also was a community leader who, at last count, served on nearly two dozen boards; a champion of religious unity, who began an annual interfaith service at the University of San Diego that brought together religions ranging from Buddhist and Baha'i to Muslim and Christian; and he was honored by so many groups that even close friends lost count.

Committed to the community

Monsignor I.B. Eagen left a personal mark on the lives of thousands of San Diegans who encountered him as a parish priest, university educator, civic leader and chaplain of the Chargers. But his death this week at age 67 was also a loss for the broader San Diego community, whose spiritual and civic life was enriched by his energetic presence.

Monsignor Eagen's many contributions to San Diego included a major restoration of the Mission Basilica San Diego de Alcalá in Mission Valley. Established by Father Junípero Serra, the mission played a pivotal role in California's history, serving as the springboard for European settlement of the West Coast. As pastor of the mission for more than two decades, starting in 1971, Monsignor Eagen

raised millions of dollars to refurbish its historic structures.

His commitment to San Diego's spiritual nourishment included an annual interfaith service that he founded at the University of San Diego, bringing together Christians and Jews, Buddhists and Muslims. As a result, he was a beloved figure among adherents to every religion practiced in San Diego.

An avid tennis player, his Saturday mornings on the court took precedence over everything but weddings and funerals. It was a sign of both the respect and affection with which Monsignor Eagen was held that his many tennis partners never challenged his calls on whether a ball was in or out.

It is, for example, battering an ancient distinction: the difference between traded and nontraded products. Trade traditionally involved mainly farm goods, manufactures and raw materials: corn, cars, oil and the like. Most services (from schooling to surgery) were nontraded. But this distinction is breaking down.

Since 1980, exports of U.S. "services" have grown more than twice as rapidly as exports of goods. In 1996, service exports totaled \$237 billion; that was 39 percent of goods exports of \$612 billion. And increasingly, service

He's been saying it a lot lately, most recently on his tour of South America. President Clinton wants to "give people the tools to succeed."

Growing up, I remember my parents telling me, "You can do anything you set your mind to," and "If at first you don't succeed, try, try again." They were teaching me the importance of persistence.

I never recall them saying that Presidents Eisenhower or Kennedy or Johnson would be giving me the tools I needed to succeed.

What could President Clinton possibly mean? Back in the days when most graduates of institutions of higher learning were supposed to be reasonably conversant with philosophy (defined as "a discipline comprising as its core logic, aesthetics, ethics, metaphysics and epistemology"), such notions that government held the tools for success would have been a cause for some derision.

Now, Clinton is taken seriously when he says such things.

In an era in which big government is supposed to be over, it appears that it is just beginning. Call it the era of the big tool shed, leading to home improvement.

What do human beings lack that government must give them in order to succeed? More than anything else it is freedom ("the absence of necessity, coercion or constraint in choice or action").

Freedom should not be confused with license ("a freedom that allows or is used with irresponsibility; disregard for rules of personal conduct").

USD SIGNS DUAL DEGREE ACCORD WITH TOP MEXICAN UNIVERSITY

Starting in January, "international business education" will take on a new meaning at USD. Instead of spending a semester or a summer earning credits in a foreign country, a group of graduate students in the School of Business Administration will have an opportunity to earn two concurrent advanced degrees: one from the United States and one from Mexico.

USD officials will meet at the Alcalá Park campus Dec. 1 with representatives from the Graduate School of Business Administration and Leadership of the Instituto Tecnológico y de Estudios Superiores de Monterrey System (ITESM). The two delegations will participate in a San Diego signing ceremony for a new USD-ITESM dual/double degree program.

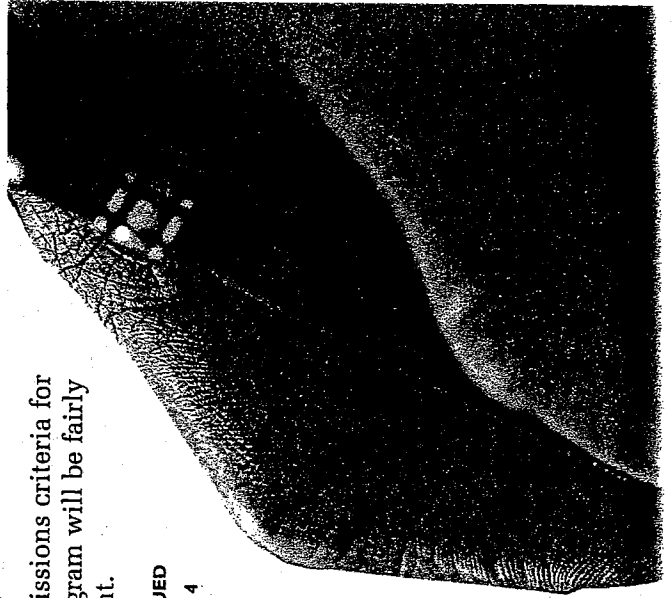
Students in the two-and-a-half-year program will spend at least one year at USD and at least one year at any of ITESM's 26 campuses, which are located throughout Mexico. Upon successful completion of the program, graduates will have earned a master's degree in either international business or business administration from USD and a master's degree in either business administration, marketing or finance from ITESM.

The dual/double degree program came about four years after USD and ITESM first began collaborating on educational exchange ventures, according to Gregory Gazda, director of USD's

"We believe this new program will produce the next generation of NAFTA executives," Gazda adds. "Its graduates will have knowledge and experience matched by few others. They will speak and understand both languages. They will grasp both cultures. They will know the practical realities of how business is done in Latin America and in the United States."

Admissions criteria for the program will be fairly stringent.

the university's M.I.B. program. "ITESM is one of Latin America's premier university systems, and we already had a student and faculty exchange program going," says Gazda. "Two of our business faculty, Denise Dimon and Ellen Cook, have taught courses at ITESM's Monterrey campus.

SCHOOL OF LAW OPENS NEW CLINIC

The School of Law opened a new Land Development Clinic this semester, bringing to eight the number of clinics offered as part of its clinical education program. The new clinic provides law students opportunities to work on land use cases and issues, either by assisting in a government office or private law firm, or by working with property owners.

"It's exciting," says GiGi Hummer, a third-year law student who spent seven years in the real estate industry before entering law school. She works in the code enforcement unit of the San Diego City Attorney's office. "I do a lot of field work, interviewing witnesses, that sort of thing. I go to court all the time. I love my job."

The clinical education program draws students who have a passion for an area of the law, and allows them to develop their lawyering

skills as they learn about their chosen area. In addition to the land development clinic, the law school operates clinics in mental health, environmental law, immigration, children's advocacy, public interest law, civil law and criminal law.

The land development clinic opened with five students and is expected to expand to 10 students per semester, says Susan Quinn, director of the clinic. This semester's students are working in "placements," or internships, with the City Attorney's office, the City Council, the County of San Diego and private law firms, where they confront issues such as multispecies conservation, parking and traffic issues, and code enforcement regulations.

"The students are getting important experiences," Quinn says. "They make a lot of contacts in the community and develop an understanding of the entire field."

Third-year law student Scott Quattromani gained a broad perspective from two placements he experienced this semester, a short-term assignment for the City of San Diego's land use and housing committee, and a longer assignment with a private law firm.

"I got to see how political the process of development on a large scale is," he says of his assignment with the city, through which he sat in on presentations concerning large developments and briefings between

UNITED FRONT OPENS MULTICULTURAL CENTER

It was no coincidence that the official opening of a new multicultural center contained within the renovated headquarters of United Front, a campus coalition of eight culturally diverse organizations, was scheduled during Homecoming weekend, the largest alumni gathering of the year.

"Alumni who were involved in United Front as students say the organization was like a family to them," says Guadalupe Corona, who this year became the United Front's first full-time adviser. "We want to bring them, and all alumni, back into the mix."

United Front christened the multicultural center on Nov. 14 with an open house for the entire USD community. The center, part of this year's expansion of the group's headquarters in the Hahn University Center, will serve as an educational clearinghouse, with books, videos and other materials relating to issues of cultural diversity. United Front assumes a number of other responsibilities, from fostering communication between its member groups and presenting multicultural events on campus to providing students with leadership opportunities and helping them explore career options. This last category, United Front leaders say, is where alumni and friends of the university can offer needed assistance.

"We hope the university's graduates will act as mentors and provide internships and job opportunities for current students," says Corona. "The connections that alumni have with civic groups and businesses can play an important part in exposing students to future opportunities."

In addition to operating the multicultural center and publicizing the educational and social events of its member groups, United Front this



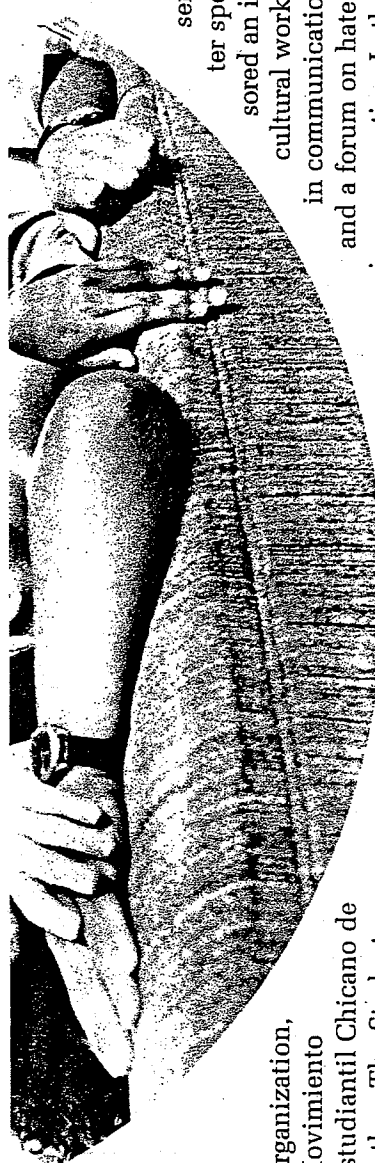
CAREER ACHIEVEMENT AWARD NOMINATIONS SOUGHT

VAN GOES NATIONAL

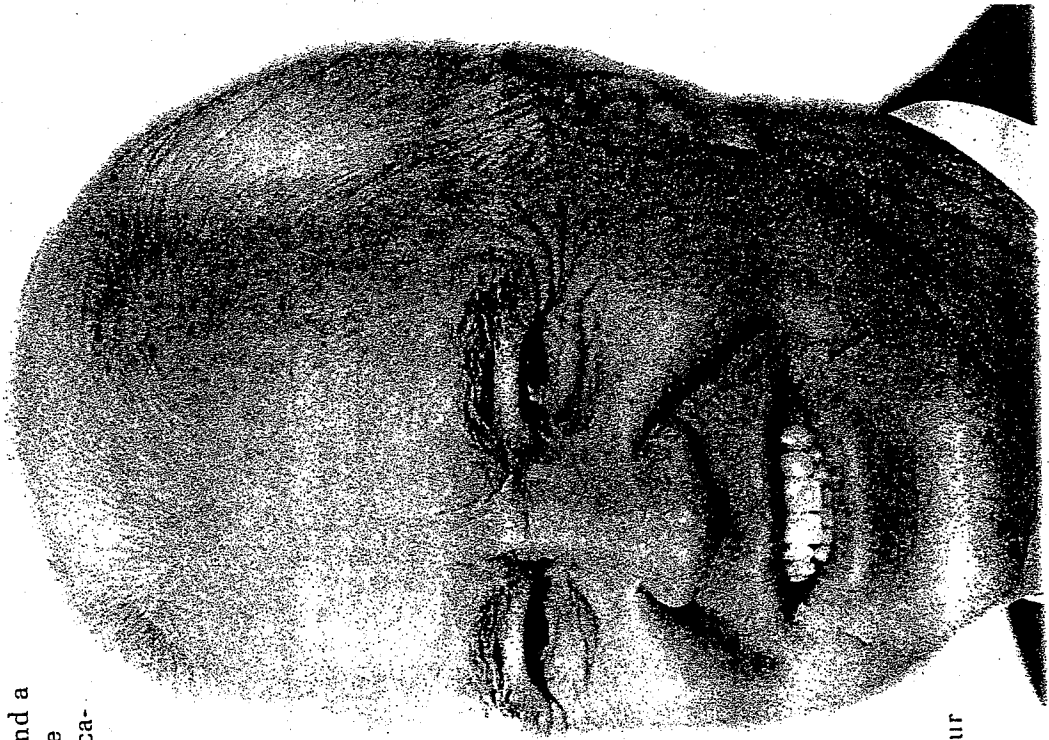

Monsignor Isaac Brent Eagen, USD's first vice president for mission and ministry and a member of the board of trustees since 1968, died Oct. 14 at the age of 67 of complications arising from pancreatic cancer.

Monsignor Eagen never passed up an opportunity to serve USD. Just before his death, the former pastor of the Mission Basilica San Diego de Alcalá helped the university one last time: He provided guidance on organizing his own funeral, including selecting hymns close to his heart for the Mass.

The result was a splendid celebration of a spiritual life. An estimated 1,500 mourners filled The Immaculata Church on Oct. 19 for a Mass concelebrated by Bishop Robert Brom and nearly 100 other priests. Two of Monsignor Eagen's colleagues, Rabbi Wayne Dosick and USD President Alice Hayes, delivered the readings, and brother priest Monsignor Daniel Dillabough delivered the homily. BASEBALL UMP TALKS ABOUT LIFE BEHIND THE MASK

The title of his autobiography came to Dave Pallone while he relaxed on a beach in Spain. The veteran National League umpire, reflecting on his 10 years with Major League Baseball, hit upon the phrase "Behind the Mask."

His experiences were so varied — working home plate the night Nolan Ryan rang up his 4,000th strikeout, fighting with Pete Rose and throwing him out when Rose shoved the ump, and being the third-youngest umpire in major league history — that Pallone figured someday he should write them all down. He didn't anticipate, however, that within months of the vacation he would lose his job and have even more incentive to chronicle his life.

The *New York Times*'s bestselling autobiography, *Behind the Mask: My Double Life in Baseball*, offers a revealing look at

the majors through the eyes of a gay man. Pallone visited Alcalá Park in October — during World Series week, in fact — to share his story. He was invited by the Associated Students social issues committee.

Pallone told the group gathered in the Hahn University Center Forum that a *New York Post* article on Sept. 15, 1988, publically outed him as a gay man. The next day he was asked by baseball officials to take a two-week leave of absence. The veteran umpire was scheduled to work his first World Series in those two weeks. Just over a month later, Pallone was informed his contract would not be renewed.

"When March 1, 1989, came around I had nowhere to go," Pallone recalled. "For the first time in 10 years I wasn't going to Florida for spring training. Where does a 35-year-old man with no college education go?" Today, Pallone makes his home in Colorado, but spends a good part of the year traveling the country speaking to corporate and university audiences about the realities of sexual orientation. His message hit a special chord at USD, where the fall semester was marred by a few incidents of discriminatory graffiti. Pallone's advice to the students and university employees in the audience was simple.

"Speak out," he said. "Stand up, for what you believe in when you hear something that is clearly

Applicants must have enough fluency in both English and Spanish to take courses in both languages. They also must have two years work experience in business.

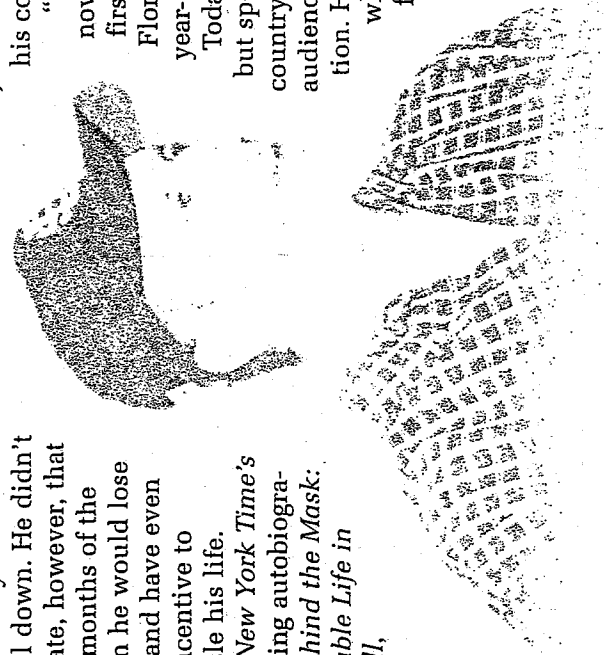

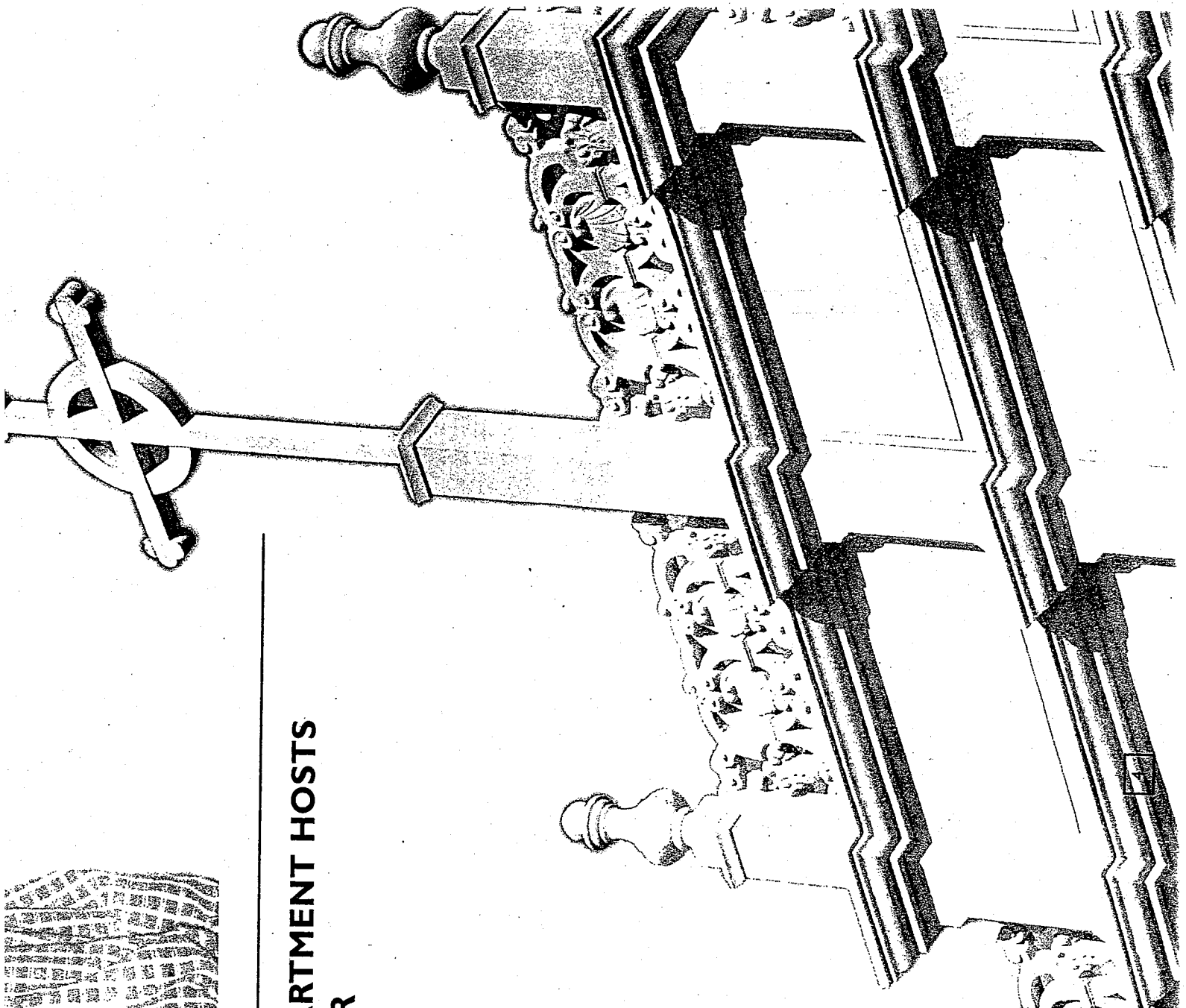

RELIGIOUS STUDIES DEPARTMENT HOSTS DISTINGUISHED SCHOLAR

Bernard Cooke, a distinguished theologian working in his field since 1960, will join the theological and religious studies department starting in February. He is the 1998 scholar chosen to hold the Knapp Chair of Liberal Arts, an endowed position funded by a \$1.7 million bequest from the estate of Mary and Churchill Knapp.

The chair is rotated each spring semester among departments in the College of Arts and Sciences. As part of his work on campus, Cooke will teach a sacraments class to graduate students and an undergraduate course on the theology of salvation, deliver public lectures and continue his research on the theology of the Holy Spirit.

Cooke is currently a part-time faculty member at the University of the Incarnate Word in San Antonio, Texas. He and his wife, Pauline Turner, also a theologian, have lived in Texas for five years. Turner will join Cooke at USD and teach undergraduate courses in feminist theology.

Many of their colleagues in USD's religious studies department met the couple last summer at a conference held at Alcalá Park. During the event, Cooke and Turner were jointly awarded the College Theology Society President's Award for their lifelong work in religious studies and ministry.

COACHES CORNER Sue Snyder: "Born To Coach"

In her eighth year as head coach of the USD women's volleyball team, Sue Snyder has built one of the most respected and successful programs on the West Coast. Since her arrival in 1990, she has averaged 21 wins a season, finished second three straight years in the very competitive West Coast Conference, earned one WCC Coach of the Year honor and sent her teams to postseason play the past four seasons.

The path that led to this successful career can be traced back to her youth in nearby Escondido, Calif. As an athlete at San Pasqual High School, Sue knew she would one day end up in teaching and coaching.

"Coaching has kind of been in my family line," she says. "My dad

was a high school coach in different sports, so I grew up wanting to be a high school teacher and coach."

Snyder attended San Diego State University, where she majored in physical education and starred on the volleyball team for four years. She was team captain and competed in two NCAA Final Fours, twice being named to the West Regional All Tournament team. The pinnacle of her playing career occurred in 1985-86 when she played on the U.S. National Team. The loyalty and competitive spirit she displayed earned her the USA Player's Award. The intensity and competitive fire she had as a player is a key ingredient in her successful coaching style today.

"I think the underlying theme is my competitive nature," says Snyder. "I make my players learn how to compete in every drill and every practice, in the hope it carries over so that they will compete in life."

This coaching philosophy has paid dividends in 1997. Through the team's first 24 matches, the Toreros were 21-3 and riding a West Coast Conference record 19-match winning streak. USD knocked off No. 11 Pepperdine and No. 16 Loyola Marymount on the road on consecutive nights in October and found themselves atop the WCC standings, with a national ranking of No. 21.

GIVING BACK, ON AND OFF THE COURT

Kathy Marpe, head coach of the women's basketball team, strongly believes in giving back to the community and making an impact in other people's lives. In her 17 years at USD, Marpe has instilled those values in her players, and the Toreros have responded with a variety of volunteer activities that help the community and, Marpe says, themselves.

"If you're not feeling good about yourself, volunteer and do something for someone else," says the coach. "That will not only make an impact in their lives, but yours as well."

In recent years, the women's basketball team volunteered time at the Nazareth House, visited kids at Children's Hospital, helped feed the homeless at San Diego's St. Vincent de Paul shelter and assisted with both the Senior and Special Olympics. Over the past three years, the team has conducted a free basketball clinic at the beginning of their season.

"I have always received pleasure from giving back," says Marpe. "Since I was young, I've helped with summer programs and church activities and always had an interest in helping others."

Marpe stresses community involvement not only to her current players, but to recruits as well. In filling spots on the team, she often looks for the well-balanced individual who already has been involved in some community work. Players like sophomore guard Amanda Bishop have a history of community outreach, and wouldn't think of giving up the experience.

"To see the people smile and appreciate the little we are doing just makes me feel like I'm making a difference," says Bishop.

Marpe believes that if the players work with children in the community, those kids will see that being involved is a positive experience. A prime example is the West Coast Conference's youth clinic, held during the 1996 WCC Tournament. Every member of the team assisted with teaching kids the fundamentals of basketball.

"I love working with kids," says senior forward Nailah Thompson, while sophomore guard Susie Erpelting adds, "I think it is important for children to see what they can make of themselves if they strive and work hard. If I can be a role model and they get a positive experience, then I've accomplished something."

Greer was one of the first women to become a head certified athletic trainer at an NCAA institution. For her first nine years, she was the university's only full-time trainer. With the growth of Torero athletics, USD added two certified full-time assistants to go with Greer's usual cast of student assistants.

"One of the reasons I've stayed at USD this long is the quality of kids the university gets," Greer says. "I also like the diversity. Every day is different."

Greer and her staff provide injury preven-

"My philosophy for training is to make the athletes more accountable for their weightlifting and to put more responsibility on them," Brown says. "Our programs are geared toward making the student-athlete a more complete athlete."

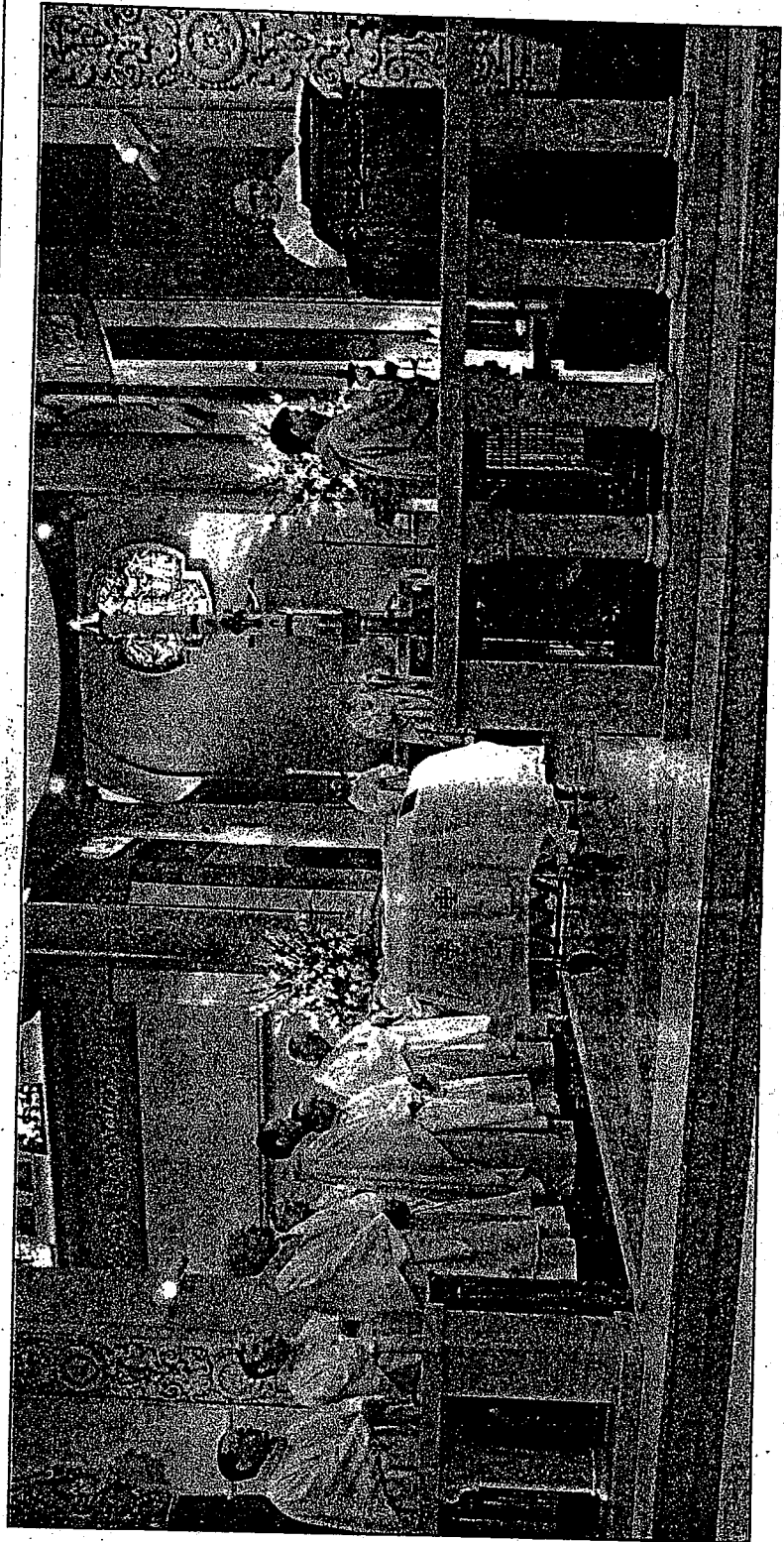
Of gangs, fairness and tough guys

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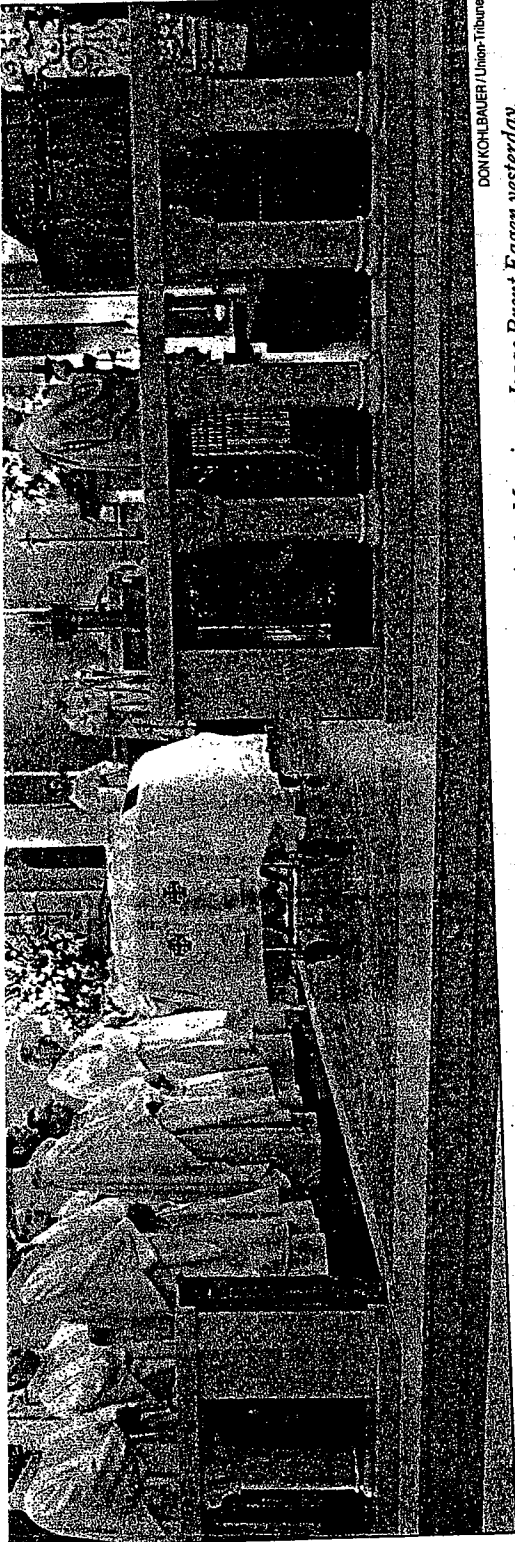

Eagen's farewell to friends

Cancer stole Monsignor Isaac Brent Eagen before he had a chance to say goodbye to many San Diegans.

But he scripted his own funeral service, so words and songs said goodbye for him yesterday.

The Mission San Diego de Alcalá, choir, which he helped form, opened the funeral Mass with "All creatures of our God and King," and closed with "Battle Hymn of the Republic," as he had requested.

Rabbi Wayne Dosick, a friend and colleague from an annual interfaith service Monsignor Eagen had started, read a passage from the Old Testament.

Author E. Hughes, former president of the University of San Diego, and his wife, Marge, were among those who carried chalices of bread and wine to the altar.

On his deathbed, Monsignor Eagen had decided it all. And to those who knew him best, the service felt as if he were there at the University of San Diego's Immaculata Church.

"He was present during that Mass," Cathy Joseph, Monsignor Eagen's executive assistant, said at a reception afterward. "It was the way he did things. He planned it all — his own celebration."

Monsignor Eagen had been in falling health in recent months, but only recently had discovered he was suffering from pancreatic cancer, Joseph said. He died Tuesday at Mercy Hospital from complications resulting from surgery.

Joseph, like many of Monsignor Eagen's friends and followers, was

stunned by the suddenness of his death. She found comfort in the thought the service had gone as he would have wanted. "He was a man of dignity and respect," she said.

For 37 years, Monsignor Eagen, called "I.B." by many, had served as a spiritual leader in San Diego. In 1960, he joined the faculty of the San

Diego College for Men, a predecessor of the University of San Diego. From 1968 to 1989, he was chancellor of the San Diego diocese. Monsignor Eagen also served as pastor of California's oldest church, Mission San Diego de Alcalá, from 1971 to 1992, when he became USD's vice president for mission and ministry.

Monsignor Eagen touched the lives of many. So the Immaculata Church filled yesterday with mourners wishing to pay their final respects.

On one side of the church, more than 100 priests sat in white robes, praying for their departed brother. Across the aisle sat Monsignor Eagen's relatives, cousins and second cousins of various ages, wearing blue and white ribbons.

Nearby were leaders of other religions who got to know Monsignor Eagen through the annual interfaith service at the Immaculata Church.

"He was nice, a great man," said Imam Sharif Battikhi of the American Islamic Services Foundation.

During the Mass, the Rev. Monsignor Daniel Dillabough recalled Monsignor Eagen as a talented spiritual leader and a great sports fan.

On his deathbed, Monsignor Eagen told those gathered around him, "I wish I could let you know what it's like, but I'll just have to meet you there," Dillabough said.

Monsignor Eagen loved to travel and his friends often would kid him about how his last trip was always his best. Dillabough said.

"So, I.B., I rejoice that this time your last trip indeed is your best," Dillabough said.

Family members were impressed by the turnout and the service itself. "I think everyone did an excellent job today," said Randy Regan, a second cousin who lives in Sacramento.

Burial will be today in San Bernardino at Mountain View Cemetery, where his parents also are interred.

Memorial donations may be sent to the James and Stella Eagen Endowed Scholarship Fund, University of San Diego, 5998 Alcalá Park, San Diego, 92110-2492. Monsignor Eagen established the fund in 1989 in honor of his parents.

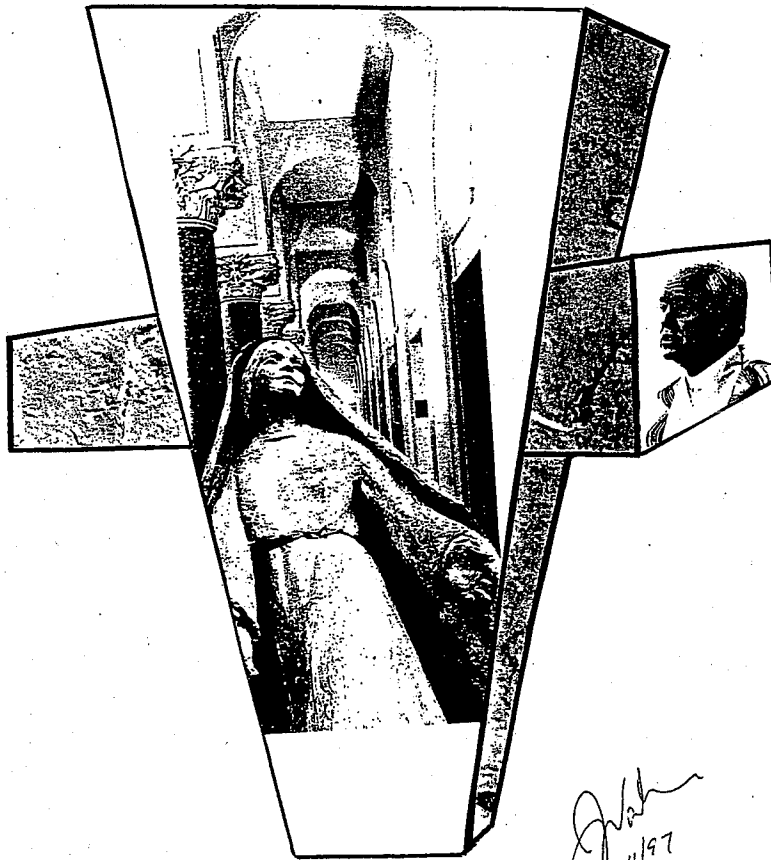

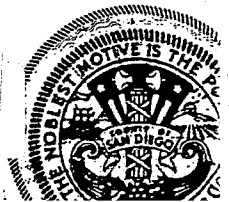

MONSIGNOR I.B. EAGEN

USD vice president who simply wanted to be a parish priest

He loved the Chargers, people and playing tennis. But most of all, Monsignor I.B. Eagen loved being a Roman Catholic priest. "I really wanted to be a parish priest," he once said. "I didn't want to be an administrator. I didn't want to be an educator. I wanted to be a parish priest."

In his 41 years of ordained life, Monsignor Eagen was all three — and more.

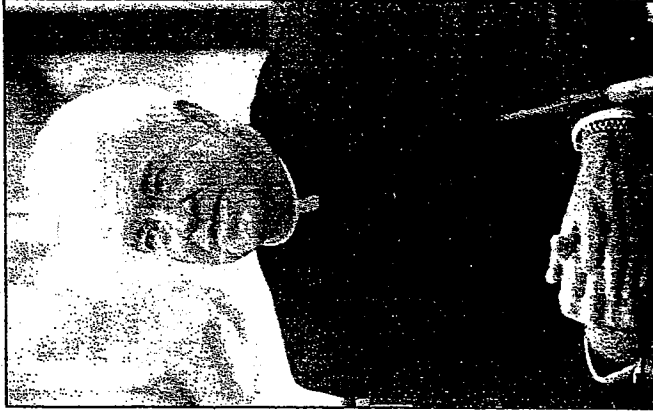
He also was a community leader who, at last count, served on nearly two dozen boards; a champion of religious unity, who began an annual interfaith service at the University of San Diego that brought together religions ranging from Buddhist and Baha'i to Muslim and Christian; and he was honored by so many groups that even close friends lost count.

On Tuesday night, two months shy of his 68th birthday, Monsignor Isaac Brent Eagen died at Mercy Hospital from complications resulting from pancreatic cancer. He had undergone surgery last week for the cancer.

Yesterday, a chorus of friends echoed the same refrain over and over. Kind. Gentle. Spiritual. Caring. A man of God.

"The death of Monsignor Eagen is an irreplaceable loss to the university," said Alice Bourke Hayes, president of the University of San Diego, where he served as a vice president for the past four years.

Bishop Robert Brom of the Roman Catholic Diocese of San Diego expressed "deep appreciation" for Monsignor Eagen's four-plus decades of minis-

try, saying that he "contributed significantly to accomplish the mission of Christ in this portion of the Lord's vineyard."

Was ordained in 1956

Monsignor Eagen's life story reads like a testimonial for the Roman Catholic Church. He was the only child of two devout Catholics and graduated from a Catholic high school in San Bernardino in 1947. He studied at Loyola University, a Catholic school in Los Angeles, and attended two seminaries — St. Francis and Immaculate Heart in El Cajon.

He was ordained in 1956 at St. Joseph Cathedral in San Diego and served as a priest there for six months before moving to a parish in San Bernardino.

In 1960, he joined the faculty of the San Diego College for Men, a predecessor of the University of San Diego, and later served as its director of school relations. In 1968, he was named chancellor of the San Diego diocese, a top administrative post he would hold until 1989.

In 1971, he also returned to parish work, taking over as pastor of California's oldest church, Mission San Diego de Alcalá. For many years, he juggled the dual jobs of chancellor and parish priest. He also helped raise millions of dollars to restore the mission.

On the last day of 1992, Monsignor Eagen left his beloved parish. With the new year, he took over a new challenge — USD's vice president for mission and ministry.

His USD roots ran deep. He was instrumental in merging the men's and women's colleges into the Catholic university. He served as a trustee from 1968 to 1993, when he was named trustee emeritus. In 1980 he was awarded an honorary doctorate by USD.

But there was more to him than the official jobs.

His gentle, dignified presence became a familiar one throughout San Diego — at religious gatherings, civic dinners and gala fundraisers. A colleague estimated yesterday that his phone card file — and Christmas list — included some 1,300 names.

As Sister Raymonda DuVall, executive director of Catholic Charities, put it: "He fit in every arena." DuVall remembered how he made people feel special, taking the time to write a personal note or field a telephone call, even when he was busy. He was, she added, "such a wonderful representative of our church, our mission."

"I.B. was out there all the time — community events, political events, interreligious events," said Rabbi Wayne Dosick. "In many ways he was the spokesman for the church."

The rabbi from North County remembers getting a call a few years ago from his longtime friend about starting an interfaith service at USD.

That annual all-faith service was begun in 1994, with nine faith groups represented. "The entire credit for that goes to him," Dosick said.

The Rev. Glenn Allison, executive director of San Diego County's Ecumenical Council, recalled his commitment to ecumenism, of "creating unity among the common human family."

Chargers' enthusiastic chaplain

"And he did it graciously," said Allison. "That's the word that comes to mind when I think of I.B.: graciousness, full of grace."

The Rev. Akio Miyaji, of the Buddhist Temple of San Diego, was struck by the priest's deep respect for religions. "It is for us a great loss," said Miyaji, who participated in the first all-faith service at USD.

Monsignor Eagen also was an enthusiastic chaplain to the San Diego Chargers. In the final seconds of the AFC Championship game in 1995, he found himself on the sidelines saying Hail Marys for victory.

"I pray to win," he said, laughing afterward. The Chargers beat the Pittsburgh Steelers.

As for his fans, they go beyond the religious community.

San Diego Mayor Susan Golding noted that he preached about com-

passion and tolerance. "He was one of our community's greatest religious leaders because he was a leader for all San Diegans, regardless of their faith," she said.

Helen K. Copley, publisher of *The San Diego Union-Tribune*, was

a longtime friend. "He was probably the most beloved person I've ever known," she said. "Everybody adored him."

Saturdays were his day for tennis. He also was a popular bridge partner, an avid traveler and a voracious reader with an extensive library.

His honors were many

Among his honors: a Christian Unity award from the Ecumenical Council, a regional Brotherhood award from the National Conference of Christians and Jews, honorary chaplain of the Navy, "Man for All Seasons" from the St. Vincent de Paul-Joan Kroc Center, and a Medal of Honor from the Daughters of the American Revolution.

There will be a visitation from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. Saturday in Founders Chapel on the USD campus, with a prayer service at 8:30 p.m.

On Sunday, visitation will continue from 1 to 3 p.m. in USD's Immaculata, followed by the funeral Mass at 4 p.m.

Burial will be Monday in San Bernardino at Mountain View Cemetery, where his parents also are interred.

Monsignor Eagen is survived by an extended family, which asks that donations be made to USD's James and Stella Eagen Endowed Scholarship Fund, which was established in 1989 to honor the memory of his parents.

Monsignor Joseph Brennan was in the same seminary class with Monsignor Eagen, they were ordained together and had been buddies ever since. Brennan was at his bedside Tuesday night, praying, when Monsignor Eagen died.

"He had a great sensitivity toward people," Brennan said yesterday from his Long Beach home. "Almost like he had a television antenna, sensing when somebody needed help or when somebody was offended or when somebody needed a kind word. He was, I would say, the essence of what a priest should be."

Committed to the community

Monsignor I.B. Eagen left a personal mark on the lives of thousands of San Diegans who encountered him as a parish priest, university educator, civic leader and chaplain of the Chargers. But his death this week at age 67 was also a loss for the broader San Diego community, whose spiritual and civic life was enriched by his energetic presence.

Monsignor Eagen's many contributions to San Diego included a major restoration of the Mission Basilica San Diego de Alcalá in Mission Valley. Es-

tablished by Father Junípero Serra, the mission played a pivotal role in California's history, serving as the springboard for European settlement of the West Coast.

As pastor of the mission for more than two decades, starting in 1971,

raised millions of dollars to refurbish its historic structures.

His commitment to San Diego's spiritual nourishment included an annual interfaith service that he founded at the University of San Diego, bringing together Christians and Jews, Buddhists and Muslims. As a result, he was a beloved figure among adherents to every religion practiced in San Diego.

An avid tennis player, his Saturday mornings on the court took precedence over everything but weddings and funerals. It was a sign of both the respect and affection with which Monsignor Eagen was held that his many tennis partners never challenged his calls on whether a ball was in or out.

Eagen's farewell to friends

Cancer stole Monsignor Isaac Brent Eagen before he had a chance to say goodbye to many San Diegans.

But he scripted his own funeral service, so words and songs said goodbye for him yesterday.

The Mission San Diego de Alcalá choir, which he helped form, opened the funeral Mass with "All creatures of our God and King," and closed with "Battle Hymn of the Republic," as he had requested.

Rabbi Wayne Dosick, a friend and colleague from an annual interfaith service Monsignor Eagen had started, read a passage from the Old Testament.

Author E. Hughes, former president of the University of San Diego, and his wife, Marge, were among those who carried chalices of bread and wine to the altar.

On his deathbed, Monsignor Eagen had decided it all. And to those who knew him best, the service felt as if he were there at the University of San Diego's Immaculata Church.

"He was present during that Mass," Cathy Joseph, Monsignor Eagen's executive assistant, said at a reception afterward. "It was the way he did things. He planned it all — his own celebration."

Monsignor Eagen had been in failing health in recent months, but only recently had discovered he was suffering from pancreatic cancer, Joseph said. He died Tuesday at Mercy Hospital from complications resulting from surgery.

Joseph, like many of Monsignor Eagen's friends and followers, was

stunned by the suddenness of his death. She found comfort in the thought the service had gone as he would have wanted.

"He was a man of dignity and respect," she said.

For 37 years, Monsignor Eagen, called "I.B." by many, had served as a spiritual leader in San Diego.

In 1960, he joined the faculty of the San

Diego College for Men, a predecessor of the University of San Diego. From 1968 to 1989, he was chancellor of the San Diego diocese. Monsignor Eagen also served as pastor of California's oldest church, Mission San Diego de Alcalá, from 1971 to 1992, when he became USD's vice president for mission and ministry.

Monsignor Eagen touched the lives of many. So the Immaculata Church filled yesterday with mourners wishing to pay their final respects.

On one side of the church, more than 100 priests sat in white robes, praying for their departed brother. Across the aisle sat Monsignor Eagen's relatives, cousins and second cousins of various ages, wearing blue and white ribbons.

Nearby were leaders of other religions who got to know Monsignor Eagen through the annual interfaith service at the Immaculata Church.

"He was nice, a great man," said Imam Sharif Battikhi of the American Islamic Services Foundation.

During the Mass, the Rev. Monsignor Daniel Dillabough recalled Monsignor Eagen as a talented spiritual leader and a great sports fan.

On his deathbed, Monsignor Eagen told those gathered around him, "I wish I could let you know what it's like, but I'll just have to meet you there," Dillabough said.

Monsignor Eagen loved to travel and his friends often would kid him about how his last trip was always his best, Dillabough said.

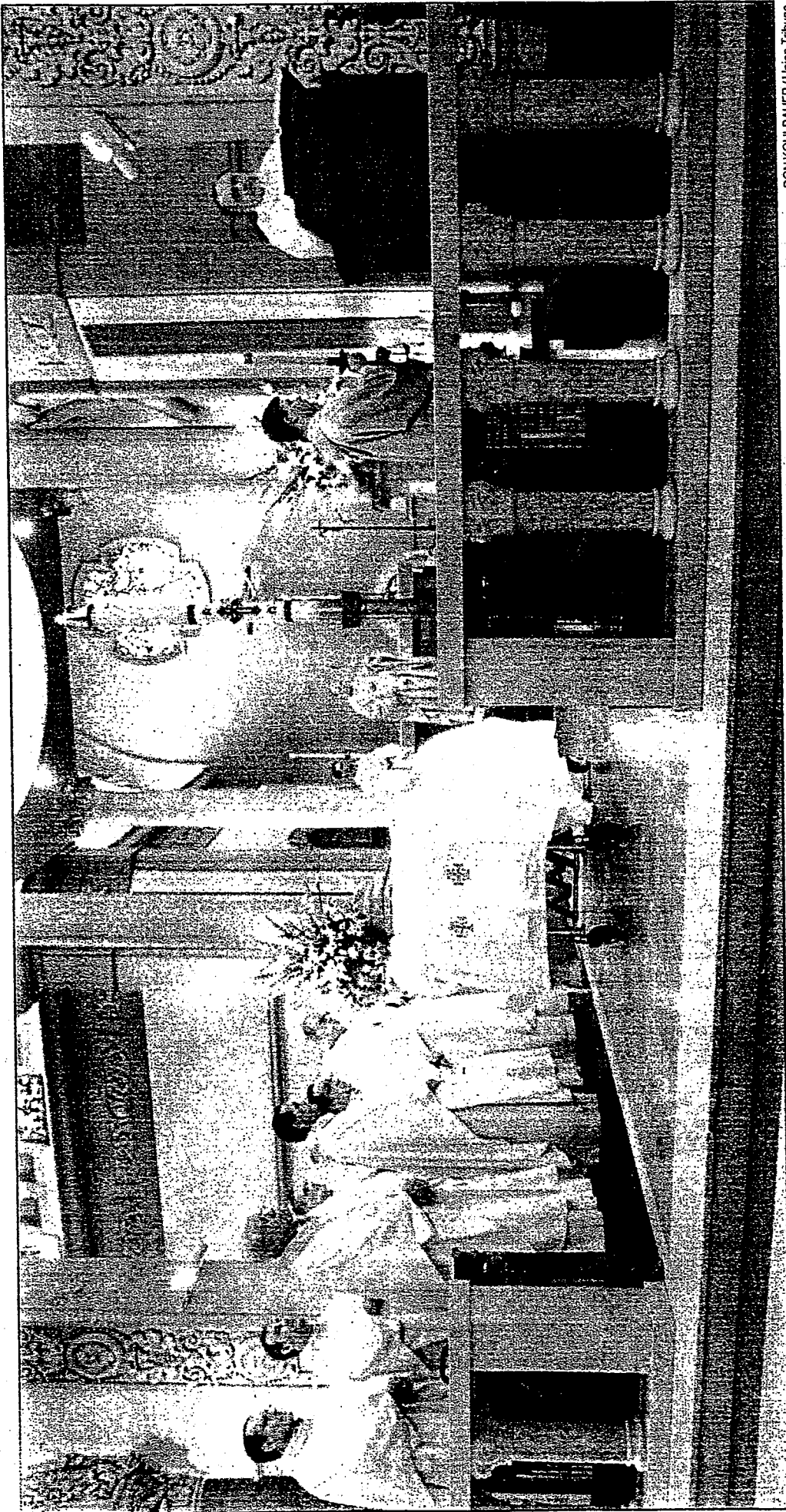
"So, I.B., I rejoice that this time your last trip indeed is your best," Dillabough said.

Family members were impressed by the turnout and the service itself.

"I think everyone did an excellent job today," said Randy Regan, a second cousin who lives in Sacramento.

Burial will be today in San Bernardino at Mountain View Cemetery, where his parents also are interred.

MONSIGNOR I.B. EAGEN, 1929 - 1997

Monsignor I. Brent Eagen, priest, educator, and ecumenical leader, died Tuesday, October 14, at Mercy Hospital at age 67 of complications arising from pancreatic cancer. He was the son of James and Stella Eagen.

Msgr. Eagen served the Diocese of San Diego and the University of San Diego throughout a long, illustrious career. He became USD's first Vice President for Mission and Ministry in 1993 after having served on the Board of Trustees since 1968, the same year he was named Chancellor of the Diocese. He was pastor of the Mission Basilica San Diego de Alcalá from 1971 to 1992.

Msgr. Eagen held numerous pastoral and civic offices, including Chaplain of the San Diego Chargers since 1978, and he served on the boards of Catholic Community Services, the San Diego Organizing Project, the Academy of Our Lady of Peace, the Mercy Hospital Foundation, the Foundation for the Children of the Americas, and the American Heart Association.

A visitation for Msgr. Eagen will take place Saturday, October 18, in Founders Chapel in USD's Founders Hall from 7:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. with a prayer service at 8:30 p.m.

A funeral Mass will be celebrated Sunday, October 19, in The Immaculata Church on the USD campus at 4:00 p.m., with a visitation from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m.

A rite of committal will take place Monday, October 20, at the Mountain View Cemetery in San Bernardino (where his parents are interred) at 11:30 a.m.

I.B. Eagen was born December 14, 1929 in San Bernardino, California. He was an alumnus of St. Bernardine High School and Loyola University, where he earned a B.A. in Philosophy and an M.A. in English and Education. He entered St. Francis Seminary in 1948 and was ordained in 1956 by Bishop Charles Buddy. That same year, he was asked to teach religion at Cathedral Girls High School. Many years later, he said, "I had no idea how much I'd enjoy teaching. Before long, I realized I wanted to concentrate on education."

In 1960, Fr. Eagen joined the faculty at the San Diego College for Men, where he taught theology, speech, English, and American literature. At the same time, he taught medical ethics at the Mercy College of Nursing and religion at Our Lady of Peace High School.

In 1964, Msgr. Eagen was named the College's Director of School Relations. He took responsibility for public relations and fundraising, and also was one of the founders of the California Conference of Catholic Colleges. He played an integral role in the 1972 merger of the College for Men and the College for Women

into the University of San Diego. In 1980, USD awarded him an honorary doctorate, and in 1993, he was named trustee emeritus.

In all his priestly duties, Msgr. Eagen made ecumenism a top pastoral priority. One of his many innovations as a USD vice president was the institution of the All-Faith Service, a liturgical celebration each February featuring clergy from many religious denominations.

Msgr. Eagen sought to imbue Christian principles into every facet of campus life. In the last year of his life, he established an "Ethics Across the Campus" initiative aimed at reaching every student, professor, and employee at USD. "This important project will help our university determine how we put our ethical values into practice," he said.

Msgr. Eagen's numerous honors included: the Regional Brotherhood Award from the National Council of Christians and Jews (1971); Honorary Chaplain of the U.S. Navy (1986); the "Man for All Seasons" Award from the St. Vincent de Paul/Joan Kroc Center (1989); the Medal of Honor from the Daughters of the American Revolution (1993); the Diocese of San Diego Unity Award for Ecumenical and Inter-Religious Affairs (1993); and the Ecumenical Council of San Diego County Unity Award (1995).

Msgr. Eagen is survived by an extended family. His family has requested that, in lieu of flowers, donations can be made to USD's James and Stella Eagen Endowed Scholarship Fund, which was established by Msgr. Eagen in 1989 to honor the memory of his parents.

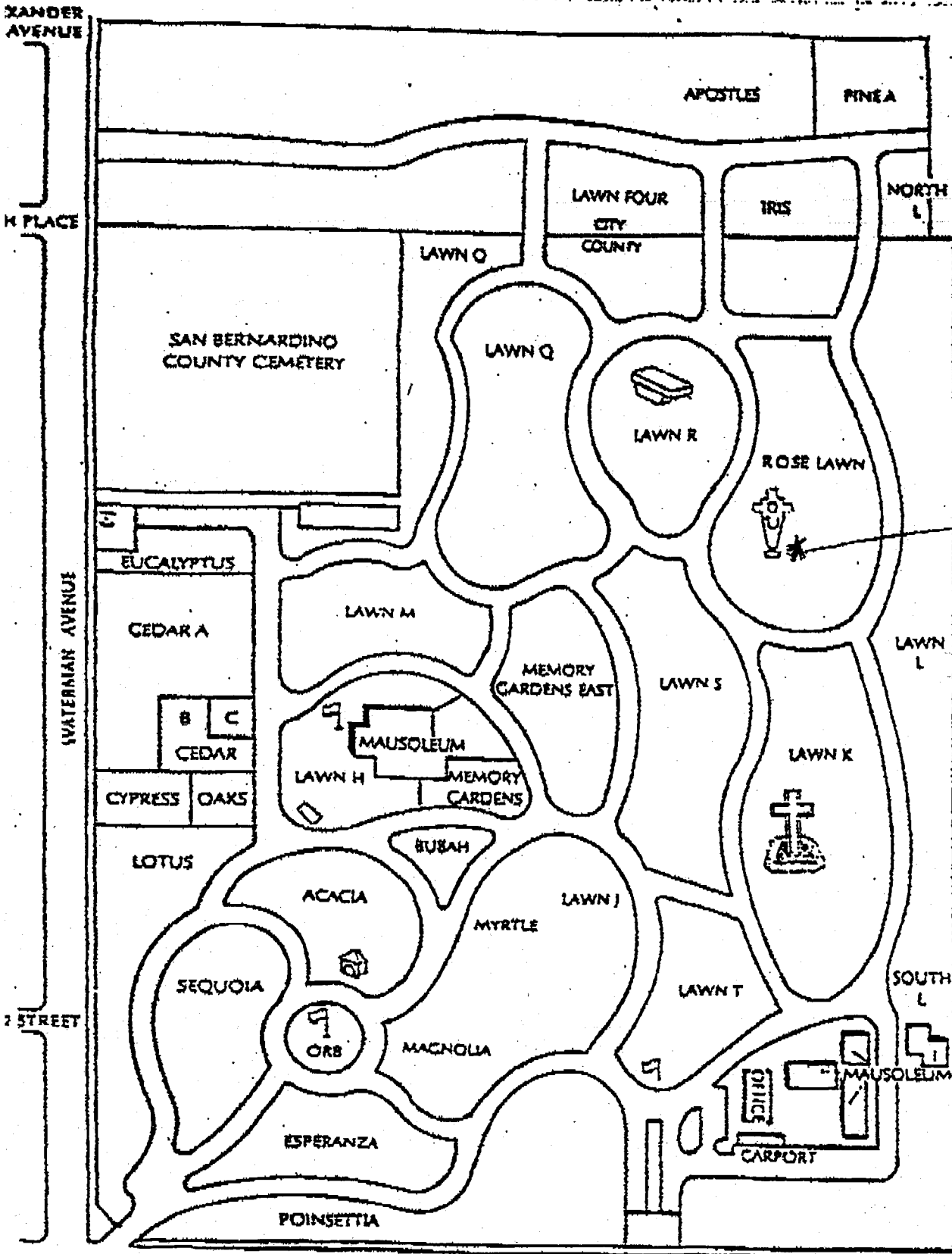

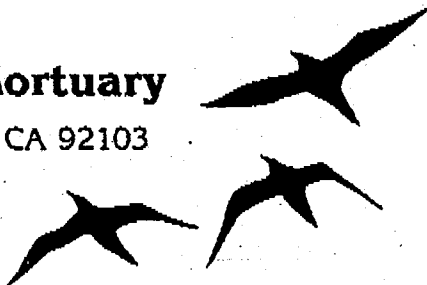

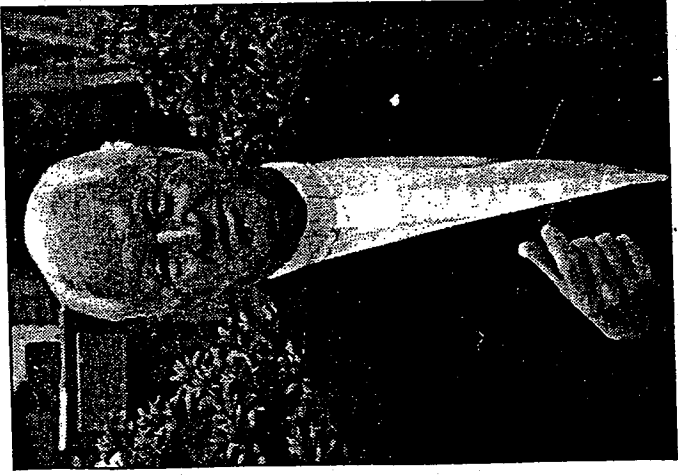
USD Mourns Loss of Friend

USD CAMPUS — Students, administrators and other members of the USD community are mourning the loss of Monsignor I.B. Eagen, USD's vice president of Mission and Ministry, whom they considered a very good friend. Since 1960 he has had a strong influence on the campus while serving in a wide variety of positions, including professor and long time member of the Board of Trustees. He helped shape USD into the University that it is today.

"He did a lot of quiet things," said Thomas F. Burke, USD vice president for Student Affairs. "People didn't know he was as influential as he really was. He worked quietly behind the scenes and didn't get much credit."

"It seems that wherever I turn [in respect] to the College, I find that he was here, [perhaps] decades ago," said University Librarian at Copley Library Edward D. Starkey, who was friends with Msgr. Eagen for many years.

Msgr. Eagen first came to the campus

in 1948 when he entered St. Francis Seminary. Since then, he has earned numerous recognitions, including an honorary degree from USD in 1980.

Yet, despite all his accomplishments, recognitions and honors, what was important to Msgr. Eagen, and what he loved was USD, the students and just being a priest. He showed this in the way he

Msgr. I. Brent Eagen Buried

SAN DIEGO — The Church in San Diego with the wider religious, educational and civic community commended Monsignor Isaac Brent Eagen to God in both sorrow and hope on Sunday, Oct. 19, in a funeral liturgy celebrated at the Immaculata.

Three bishops and more than 100 of his fellow priests, administrators, faculty and students of the University of San Diego, the Knights and Ladies of the Holy Sepulchre, filled the Immaculata to near capacity.

Bishop Robert H. Brom presided, with Rabbi Wayne Dosick, long-time personal friend of Msgr. Eagen, and Dr. Alice B. Hayes, president of the University of San Diego, as lectors. The Chancellor of the Diocese, Msgr. Daniel Dillabough, delivered the eulogy.

Msgr. Dillabough paid tribute to his brother priest and friend with remembrances, regrets, and rejoicing. He called to mind the constant thoughtfulness of others for which the priest was known, shown in Msgr. Eagen's insistence on holding the door, his ability to recall individuals' names, and his propensity for "making good friends wherever he went."

Msgr. Dillabough compared Jesus' care for Mary, Martha and Lazarus to the departed monsignor's care for all he met. Recalling that his departed friend enjoyed travel, always pronouncing his most recent trip "the best he'd ever taken," the Chancellor concluded, saying, "I.B., your last trip, indeed, is your best."

The funeral service was followed by a reception in Colachis Plaza sponsored by the University, with keepsake copies of a collection of prayers put together by Msgr. Eagen provided to those attending.

Msgr. Eagen died Tuesday, Oct. 14, at Mercy Hospital, of complications following his hospitalization for pancreatic cancer. The 67-year-old priest, whose priestly ministry spanned the tenure of all four bishops of San Diego, played many roles in the religious, educational and civic community.

Only offspring of James and Stella Eagen, he was born in Upland, Calif., was raised in Pomona, and attended high school at St. Bernardine's in San Bernardino. He spent two years at Loyola University in Los Angeles, before entering the then-St. Francis Junior Seminary in

El Cajon to prepare for the priesthood. He advanced to Immaculate Heart Seminary, also then in El Cajon, and was ordained by Bishop Charles F. Buddy in 1956 for the Diocese of San Diego.

His was first assigned to St. Joseph's Cathedral for six months, prior to being assigned to Holy Rosary parish in San Bernardino for nearly three years.

In 1959, Father Eagen returned to Loyola University for graduate studies, after which he was made a faculty member in 1960 of the then-College for Men in San Diego for eight years.

The priest played an integral role in the 1972 merger of the College for Men and the College for Women, to form the University of San Diego. In 1980, USD awarded him an honorary doctorate, and in 1993, named him trustee emeritus, after 25 years as a member of its board of trustees.

In 1971, Msgr. Eagen was made pastor of Mission San Diego de Alcalá, while continuing as chancellor, a post he held for 21 years.

He served on the Corporate Board of Catholic Charities in San Diego, working to maintain the Church's mission of social

service through the promotion of Gospel values toward a more just society, for more than 20 years.

"He was a wonderful spokesperson," said Sister Raymonda DuVall, Executive Director of the diocesan social service agency. "He went out of his way to speak his pride in Catholic Charities, (and) was always supportive and affirming. He had a rich history with us."

Monsignor Eagen continued as pastor of the Mission after leaving the chancellorship in 1989. He was elected dean of the University Deanery the following year. He continued in diocesan roles on the Priest Personnel Board, on the Finance Committee for several terms. He also acted as president of the development corporation which erected Cathedral Plaza, St. John's Plaza and Guadalupe Plaza.

He likewise played a strong role in ecumenical and interreligious affairs.

On creation of the position of Vice-president for Mission and Ministry at the University of San Diego in 1993, Msgr. Eagen was appointed to the post by Bishop Robert H. Brom. His influence at the University was significant, in terms of the religious and ethical vision on the campus.

Msgr. Eagen's involvement in the civic community included acting as member of the Foundation Board of Mercy Hospital in recent years, where he had

worked summers as a seminarian in the gardens. "I think he was a gentle person who was consistently thoughtful of others, always so very gracious and accessible," said Sister Mary Jo Anderson. 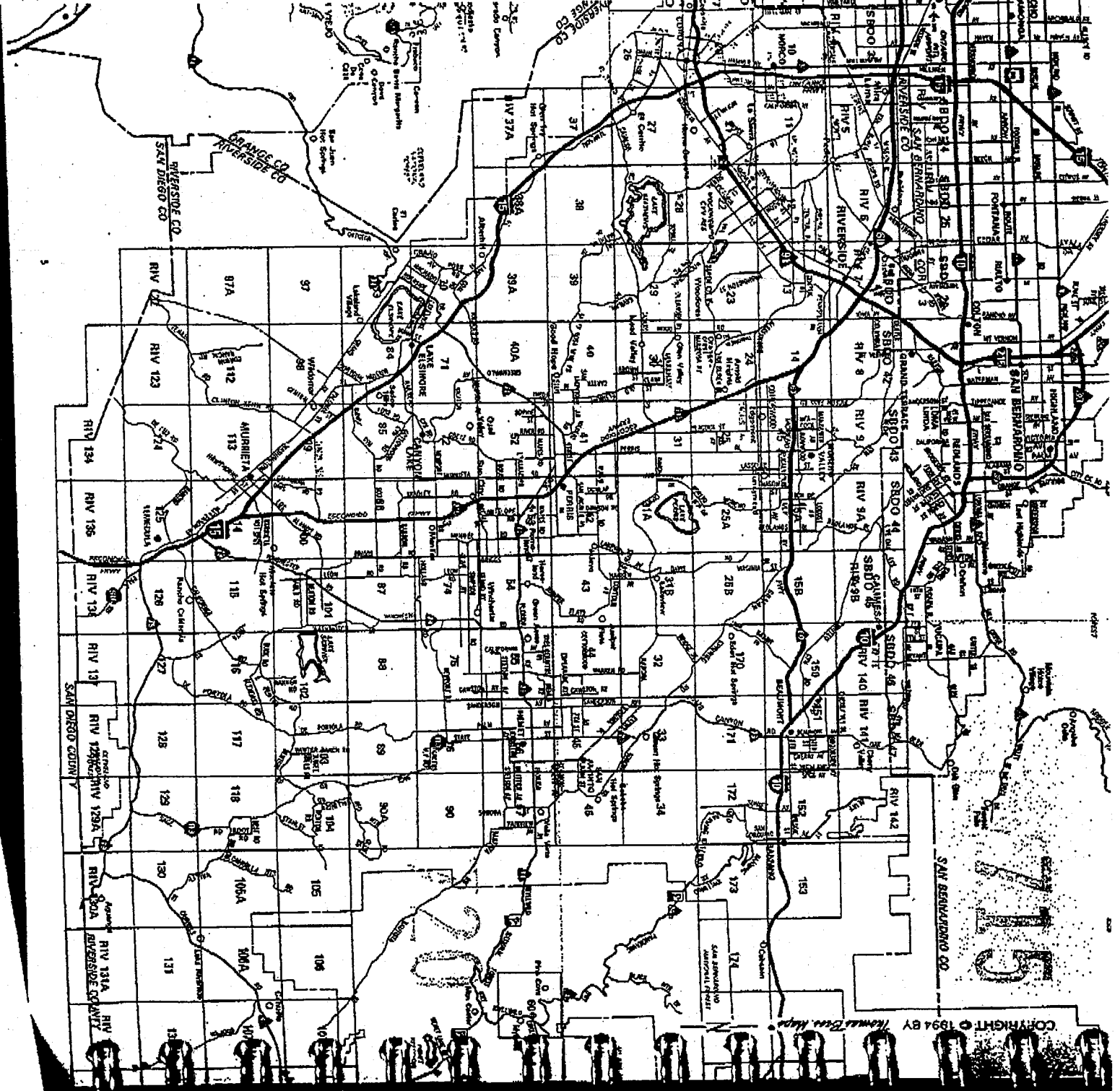

Monsignor I.B. Eagen left a personal mark on the lives of thousands of San Diegoans who encountered him as a parish priest, university educator, civic leader and chaplain of the Chargers. But his death this week at age 67 was also a loss for the broader San Diego community, whose spiritual and civic life was enriched by his energetic presence.

Monsignor Eagen's many contributions to San Diego included a major restoration of the Mission Basilica San Diego de Alcalá in Mission Valley. Established by Father Junípero Serra, the mission played a pivotal role in California's history, serving as the springboard for European settlement of the West Coast. As pastor of the mission for more than two decades, starting in 1971, Monsignor Eagen

raised millions of dollars to refurbish its historic structures.

His commitment to San Diego's spiritual nourishment included an annual interfaith service that he founded at the University of San Diego, bringing together Christians and Jews, Buddhists and Muslims. As a result, he was a beloved figure among adherents to every religion practiced in San Diego.

An avid tennis player, his Saturday mornings on the court took precedence over everything but weddings and funerals. It was a sign of both the respect and affection with which Monsignor Eagen was held that his many tennis partners never challenged his calls on whether a ball was in or out.

It is, for example, battering an ancient distinction: the difference between traded and nontraded products. Trade traditionally involved mainly farm goods, manufactures and raw materials: corn, cars, oil and the like. Most services (from schooling to surgery) were nontraded. But this distinction is breaking down.

He's been saying it a lot lately, most recently on his tour of South America. President Clinton wants to "give people the tools to succeed."

Growing up, I remember my parents telling me, "You can do anything you set your mind to," and "If at first you don't succeed, try, try again." They were teaching me the importance of persistence.

I never recall them saying that Presidents Eisenhower or Kennedy or Johnson would be giving me the tools I needed to succeed.

What could President Clinton possibly mean? Back in the days when most graduates of institutions of higher learning were supposed to be reasonably conversant with philosophy (defined as "a discipline comprising as its core logic, aesthetics, ethics, metaphysics and epistemology"), such notions that government held the tools for success would have been a cause for some derision.

Now, Clinton is taken seriously when he says such things.

In an era in which big government is supposed to be over, it appears that it is just beginning. Call it the era of the big tool shed, leading to home improvement.

What do human beings lack that government must give them in order to succeed? More than anything else it is freedom ("the absence of necessity, coercion or constraint in choice or action").

Freedom should not be confused with license ("a freedom that allows or is used with irresponsibility; disregard for rules of personal conduct").

DURABLE POWER OF ATTORNEY FOR HEALTH CARE DECISIONS

(California Civil Code Sections 2410- 2444)

WARNING TO PERSON EXECUTING THIS DOCUMENT

This is an important legal document. Before executing this document, you should know these important facts:

This document gives the person you designate as your agent (the attorney-in-fact) the power to make health care decisions for you. Your agent must act consistently with your desires as stated in this document or otherwise made known.

Except as you otherwise specify in this document, this document gives your agent power to consent to your doctor not giving treatment or stopping treatment necessary to keep you alive.

Notwithstanding this document, you have the right to make medical and other health care decisions for yourself so long as you can give informed consent with respect to the particular decision. In addition, no treatment may be given to you over your objection, and health care necessary to keep you alive may not be stopped or withheld if you object at the time.

This document gives your agent authority to consent, to refuse to consent, or to withdraw consent to any care, treatment, service, or procedure to maintain, diagnose, or treat a physical or mental condition. This power is subject to any statement of your desires and any limitations that you include in this document. You may

state in this document any types of treatment that you do not desire. In addition, a court can take away the power of your agent to make health care decisions for you if your agent (1) authorizes anything that is illegal, (2) acts contrary to your known desires or (3) where your desires are not known, does anything that is clearly contrary to your best interests.

This power will exist for an indefinite period of time unless you limit its duration in this document.

You have the right to revoke the authority of your agent by notifying your agent or your treating doctor, hospital, or other health care provider orally or in writing of the revocation.

Your agent has the right to examine your medical records and to consent to their disclosure unless you limit this right in this document.

Unless you otherwise specify in this document, this document gives your agent the power after you die to (1) authorize an autopsy, (2) donate your body or parts thereof for transplant or therapeutic or educational or scientific purposes, and (3) direct the disposition of your remains.

If there is anything in this document that you do not understand, you should ask a lawyer to explain it to you.

1. CREATION OF DURABLE POWER OF ATTORNEY FOR HEALTH CARE

By this document I intend to create a durable power of attorney by appointing the person designated below to make health care decisions for me as allowed by Sections 2410 to 2444, inclusive, of the California Civil Code. This power of attorney shall not be affected by my subsequent incapacity. I hereby revoke any prior durable power of attorney for health care. I am a California resident who is at least 18 years old, of sound mind, and acting of my own free will.

2. APPOINTMENT OF HEALTH CARE AGENT

(Fill in below the name, address and telephone number of the person you wish to make health care decisions for you if you become incapacitated. You should make sure that this person agrees to accept this responsibility. Vacant position filled after twenty years

When students and staff return to campus in January to start the new semester, they will see a new face walking the hallways and strolling the courtyards. Monsignor I. Bren Eagen, V.F., will be the University's newest addition to our administration.

Msgr. Eagen, who is currently pastor of the Mission Basilica San Diego de Alcalá, has been selected to fill the new position of Vice

President for Church Relations and Director of University of Ministry. The position has been in the works since 1972 when the San Diego College of Women and the San Diego College for Men merged. The agreement between the two schools stated,

"If there was an appropriate person for the job, a senior administration position would be made available for the priest Diocese," according to Jack Cannon, Director of Public Relations.

"This is the first time in 20 years since the merger that a priest of his stature has been available to fill the post," Cannon said.

Currently a member of USD's Board of Trustees, Msgr. Eagen has been involved with the University for 32 years. President Author Hughes conveyed his, as well as the entire University Administration's, excitement concerning Msgr. Eagen's arrival.

"We are delighted that Monsignor Eagen will undertake this new role in the USI community," Hughes said. "We know his extensive experience and inspiration will enrich the church's pastoral mission at our university."

He has received numerous awards for his outstanding performance in community activities, including the San Diego County Heart Association's Good Guy Award and the First United Methodist Church's Good Samaritan Award. In 1989, he was named "A Man for All Seasons" by the St. Vincent de Paul Center.

Born in San Bernardino, Msgr. Eagen attended Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles and the St. Francis Seminary. He studied drama and literature at UCLA and in 1974, attended the Institute for Continuing Theological Education in Rome.

"I'm excited about joining the University and working with the people that I admire and like so much," he said.

tant part of my life," Msgr. Eagen continued. "I've been here for 22 years, and it really filled a goal for me, because I had always wanted to be a pastor."

His responsibilities will include presiding at official University functions requiring a religious presence, overseeing a wide range of pastoral programs and directing ministerial, liturgical and catechetical duties.

Among his many accomplishments, Msgr. Eagen was one of the early pioneers of the ecumenical movement in San Diego. "The ecumenical movement is aimed at achieving universal Christian unity and church union through international inter-denominational organizations that cooperate on matters of mutual concern," Msgr. Eagen said.

Msgr. Eagen's initial contact with the USD area was when he joined the faculty of the San Diego College for Men in 1960. Four years later, he was appointed to the directorship of school relations. When Bishop Brom and President Hughes originally confronted Msgr. Eagen about the job, he was hesitant. But Msgr. Eagen said that "it is time to move on. The Parish needs this opportunity for new leadership."

Monsignor Eagen ends vital era at mission

Monsignor I. Brent Eagen is talking about what he will miss after 22 years at the San Diego Mission de Alcala.

It does not take long for the tears to come, welling up in his blue eyes and starting a slow trickle down his cheeks.

"Most of all, the people," Eagen said, discreetly pulling a folded handkerchief. "I'll really miss the people."

The final day of 1992 was Eagen's last day at California's oldest mission, founded by Father Junipero Serra in 1769.

The 63-year-old monsignor said he was originally expected to stay here until he was 70. "They carried me out feet first." Then, in the fall, Bishop Robert Brom and the University of San Diego President Robert Hughes talked him into becoming a vice president at the Catholic university.

In a sense, Eagen is going home. He had been a priest for only four years when, in 1960, he was appointed to the faculty of the San Diego College for Men, a forerunner of the University of San Diego. Eight years later he became a trustee of the college, a position he has held ever since.

Eagen remained in teaching and administration in 1970. That's when his affair with the mission — and the fulfillment of a boyhood dream — began.

"I really wanted to be a parish priest," Eagen recalled yesterday, leaning back against his high-back chair.

"I didn't want to be an administrator. I didn't want to be an educator. I

wanted to be a parish priest."

Under his tenure, the mission expanded by three acres, added a sprawling new parish and community center and underwent a sophisticated renovation.

He also became one of the best-known priests in the diocese as well as an ecumenical leader. Whether it's for attending glittery fund-raisers or officiating at the funerals of movers and shakers, his name pops up as often in the society columns as it does on the religion pages.

"I sort of fell into it along the way," Eagen said of his social calendar.

Besides being a USD trustee, Eagen also was chancellor to the diocese from 1968 to 1989, kind of an administrative assistant to the bishop. Both those roles brought with them a lot of meeting and greeting — and fit in nicely with the outgoing priest's

agenda for the San Diego Mission.

"I wanted people other than Roman Catholics to feel ownership in the mission," Eagen said.

So he invited them to functions at the mission. They, in turn, invited him to their functions. "I guess in order for them to be involved they wanted me to be involved in their activities," he said.

Along the way, Eagen gained a reputation for being a prolific fund-raiser — "millions of dollars in my 22 years here." But it is a role he does not relish.

"I like people very much — I like being with them," he said. "But I find 'the ask' is very hard."

There have been rough times, too. Three years ago, he and several local Indian bands got into a bitter dispute when construction workers unearthed an ancient Indian burial site where the parish center was supposed to be built.

With then-mayor Maureen O'Connor on the verge of stepping into the fray, the church finally agreed to preserve the burial site as a cemetery and move the two-story center to the rear edge of the mission's property.

Perhaps ironically, Eagen now

believes that what came out of those confrontations is one of the highlights of his mission career.

"After it was over, we had this Mass of reconciliation and it was a very deep, spiritual experience," he said.

"They had never been around the mission very much," Eagen said of the Indians. "It sort of brought them back to the mission."

Eagen hasn't packed yet. He'll do that next week. His new job at USD, where he will be vice president for mission and ministry, doesn't officially start until Jan. 15.

His favorite photographs still hang on an office wall — those of President George Bush, Mother Teresa, the mission in various poses. All reminders of the past.

But against another wall is a neatly arranged stack of moving boxes, belonging to Monsignor Thomas Prendergast, Eagen's replacement. They are reminders of the mission's future.

Although Eagen is looking forward to a new challenge, he admits he is finding it hard to leave the mission. The tears are evidence of that.

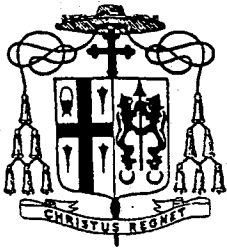

MEMORANDUM

TO: Rev. Msgr. I. Brent Eagen

Thank you for accepting your new appointment, at the request of Bishop Brom and myself, as the chairman of the Board deciding the quotas for Stewardship for the next two years.

On your committee will be the Chancellor, Monsignor Daniel Dillabough, Monsignor Fred Florek and Monsignor Richard Duncanson.

This committee is a two-pronged committee 1) to raise the quotas up to at least one-half million more and 2) to set budgets for those areas that are creating the deficits, i.e. Marian High School and Pala Indian Mission. They should be placed on a budget that will not create deficits or losses on our payroll. The payroll should always be under control through budgets. For instance, a parish which overextends itself in payroll because of bad times is charged 6% interest to control this matter. Having a half-million dollars more in our Stewardship should settle this matter for at least two years.

It is unfortunate that this began by taking money that didn't even belong to the Diocese, it was only on a holding pattern, and that is the money from University of San Diego High School. The Diocese must restore this money, for which I have signed a letter through Arthur Young. I will now sign another letter to restore it as soon as possible.

As we spoke, I advise you to send one of your committee members to see each pastor whose quota has been raised so there can be some dialogue in this matter, otherwise they may have resentment, but knowing the whole picture and the need should placate them.

Off the top of my head, I would say that for next year Monsignor Clark could easily assume \$50,000 or more; he has no quota. Monsignor Lloyd Bourgeois I believe would accept at least \$60,000. There are a number of them that could easily advance their quotas with the proper appeal. Fortunately, Monsignor Dan Dillabough has been able to pick up some of the deficit of Pala through the generosity of pastors whom he has contacted and made our problem known.

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Historical Somersaults: Virtue and Hypocrisy in the Church

By Richard Ryan

On a Sunday of last year, two days before the U. S. presidential elections, I took my youngest sister to mass at San Diego de Acala, the Spanish mission that two centuries ago gave birth to the now-expansive city surrounding it. Home to the oldest Christian church in California, Mission San Diego was the first in a series of settlements established by the Franciscan fathers along what became America's most populous and prosperous state; it had been, in effect, ground zero for the conquistadors' march northwards. Prior to this visit I had not been to San Diego for twenty years, long before my conversion to Roman Catholicism, but now I was drawn immediately to the primeval church with its overlapping echoes of national and spiritual history.

We arrived, my sister and I, an hour before mass and took the opportunity to stroll around the well-tended grounds. Gazing on the chapel's bone-white, sunlit facade, walking through the mission's gardens of flowering vine and bristling aloe bushes, I saw every detail with the clarity the senses reserve for those places where the past shivers in the air, like the aftermath of bells. My sister, who had recently expressed interest in Catholicism, was enchanted by the surroundings, and I hoped the liturgy to come would be equal to its setting. And as the service opened, my hopes were gratified: the choir was marvelous, the congregation loud and reverent in its responses, and the readers declaimed their scriptural passages with measured grace.

Then the sermon. I should here interject that I prefer a sermon in which the homilist openly parades his passions. We Catholics are, unhappily, among the most

ill spoken of denominations. It often seems in our church that there is a negative standard in force, that the seminaries will not present a candidate for ordination until his public speaking skills have proven sufficiently inadequate. Not so on this morning: Monsignor Brent Eagen, rector of Mission San Diego and our homilist, was anything but dull. His sermon was direct, it was explicit, and though it offended me, it also led me to an encounter with two of our church's most dramatic, and most irreconcilable, personalities: one a candidate for sainthood and the other a brilliant and influential church dissident.

Monsignor Eagen began his service on a nostalgic note, in keeping with his role as the caretaker of a national monument. He recounted that on November 5, 1775, almost 203 years to the day before this mass, Father Luis Jayme had been killed on the mission grounds by a band of rebellious Indians. Indeed, half an hour earlier my sister and I had gazed upon the stone cross

marking the very spot where Father Jayme fell. The cleric had been a revered figure even in life, and by virtue of his murder he literally had become one with his church: under the altar from which Monsignor Eagen now presided, the body of America's protomartyr slept, a flickering lamp keeping endless vigil overhead.

Father Jayme would have been a significant figure in the history of California and of Catholicism even had he not been crowned with martyrdom. He took charge at Mission San Diego several years after Franciscan evangelist Junipero Serra founded it in 1769. His letters to Father Serra, who is famous for establishing a network of missions as he traveled with the conquistadors up the coast of what is now California, remain major testimonials of early mission life. By all accounts, and by the witness of his letters, Father Jayme was a man of devotion and integrity, lavishing kindness on his native charges, whom he recognized were subject to continual abuses by Spanish soldiers. On the occasion of his martyrdom Father Jayme conducted himself with the dignity of a Beckett: s belligerent locals set fire to the mission's primitive chapel, he approached them with arms outstretched, crying "Love God, my children!"—an entreaty that met with a fusillade of arrows.

Monsignor Eagen touched on these events, and then observed rather casually that the

cue might have prepared me for what followed, but Monsignor Eagen's manner gave no warning of the impending ideological storm. In one of his letters to Father Serra, the monsignor noted, Father Jayme recorded his distress over an abortion performed on an Indian woman living at the mission.

There it was—abortion—the word that carries the sane to the precipice of madness. Monsignor Eagen's transportation was instantaneous. The gravity of the moment darkened his brow and, compelled by political urgency, he returned us to the twentieth century. The next night—election eve—the mission would host a workshop on "biological issues and the church." One of the issues was "the unspeakable crime of abortion."

It should be of special concern to Catholics, the pastor told his congregation, because of the upcoming presidential election.

I gave a sigh. One would have liked a little balance, a reminder, in the vapid campaign of 1988, that issues like care for the elderly, racial and

class justice, and military disarmament are every bit as central to the Catholic faith as the debate over reproductive rights. Obviously, Father Eagen's pitch was as much an advertisement for then-candidate George Bush's anti-choice posturing as for the mission's election-eve discussion group. Still, having nodded approvingly when progressive priests flaunted their politics from the pulpit, I could hardly fault a conservative for his own homiletic agitations. Reflecting thus, I calmed myself.

So, it seemed, did Monsignor Eagen. Having packaged his none-too-subtle sound bite, he jumped effortlessly back to the colonial epoch. He once again invoked the name of the legendary Junipero Serra. For many years the Franciscans have urged the Holy See to canonize Father Serra, and Monsignor Eagen reiterated the call. Well, this seemed reasonable enough. I hoped we were returning to harmless historical pieties, but no: our pastor's political imagination was engaged. The theme of church values under assault was fixed in his mind.

The canonization of Father Serra was pre-eminently just, the monsignor assured us, and would have been accomplished by now were it not for a sinister plot afoot. There were "certain individuals," either Native Americans or people "claiming to represent Native Americans," who had been urging the church not to canonize Father Serra, denouncing the very possibility in

Serra, the monsignor informed us that they were groundless, and in any case irrelevant.

And now, at last, we were coming to the sermon's climax. It is "completely unfair" and "totally inappropriate," Monsignor Eagen announced, to judge the deeds of a churchman two hundred years ago by contemporary standards. Father Serra did his best for the Indians of his day, even as Mission San Diego continues to do in the present. The monsignor noted the good works of the mission school, where the descendants of Father Serra's original charges were being blessed with the doctrines of the faith. It was this continuing ministry to the materially and spiritually impoverished

Indians of Southern California, he contended, that was Father Serra's true legacy. The monsignor urged us to consider the marvelous workings of the church, and in such exhortatory terms, the air filled with rhetorical incense, he closed.

What a startling jumble of ideas! And how like a militantly orthodox priest to mirror in his sermons the confusion of the church. Father Eagen had first directed us, with his sweeping hints, to make secular political choices in light of the absolute standards of the church. He had then swung round and demanded that the secular world judge the church by the pliant standards of historical relativism. Abortion was always and everywhere an "unspeakable crime" on which presumably there could be no compromise. But Father Serra's crimes (perhaps unspeakable as well, since Monsignor Eagen neglected to mention what they were) should be judged in context. They in any case should pose no obstacle to his sainthood.

Happily, my preteenage sister was too young to have her morning spoiled by these logical somersaults, but I remained dazed. Expecting a quaint service with a little historical flavor, I suddenly found myself thrown into a moral metaphysical ditch. The only way out would be back up the stony slope of historical fact, a journey I would have to undertake on my own.

Who was Father Serra, and what were his accusers saying about him? When I returned to Washington, D.C., where I work as a reporter, I decided to do a little reading on the controversy.

Father Junipero Serra (1713-1784) turned out to be a fascinating historical figure. Born in Spain, he excelled as a seminarian in the abstract rigors of scholastic philosophy and by the age of thirty held a chair at a major university. But despite this early academic success, he shortly left his homeland for Mexico, where from 1750 to 1758 he supervised a series of missions and familiarized himself with Indian cultures and languages.

The missionary became known for his incredible endurance. According to legend, he insisted throughout his ministry in the New World on traveling by foot. And in fact while Father Serra was sometimes forced by practical necessity to ride horse or muleback, he preferred as a sign of devotion and humility to walk hundreds of miles from settlement to settlement. These ardors were all the more remarkable given that he was troubled during his adult life with a variety of painful afflictions.

Eventually, accompanied by a military escort, Father Serra left Mexico for the coast of what is now California. From 1769 when he founded Mission San Diego, to 1782 when he launched San Buenaventura, Father Serra by his extraordinary efforts helped lay the groundwork for the Spanish colonization of California. He became the first president of the state's mission system, which successfully converted scores of native tribes throughout the region, and his exertions continued into old age. Father Serra's influence was at its height at the time of his death, and his legacy has been preserved by both secular and ecclesial posterity: the state of California has placed his statue in the company of other heroic effigies in the U. S. Capitol building, and in 1937 the Franciscans proposed Father Serra's canonization to the Holy See.

I can only regret the Franciscans' zeal, for it has stained the memory of a fine (albeit flawed) churchman. In recent years Father Serra's candidacy has been opposed, both by Native American activists in California and by such progressive Catholics as San Francisco theologian Matthew Fox. And the opposition is appropriate, for while Father Serra possessed admirable qualities, he did not have, on close inspection, the "genius for virtue" one expects in saints. Father Serra, in truth, was the ultimate company man. In his native land he had been a member of the Spanish Inquisition, and the missions that he founded became camps of forced incarceration for the Indians. Converts (i.e., prisoners taken by the missionaries' military escorts) were stripped of their heritage and

identity and subjected to all the psychological abuse that accompanies even the most humane colonizations.

The coercion of their ministry did not escape the California missionaries. Father Fermin de Lasuen, who succeeded Father Serra as president of the mission system, remarked that converts who had the chance to leave the missions would "see and meet their pagan relatives in the forest, fat and robust and enjoying complete liberty." Father de Lasuen concluded that without forcible restraint, most converts would return to their villages. This telling observation certainly accounts for Father Serra's rejection of the innovations tried at some Mexican missions, where Indian converts were allowed to come and go as they pleased.

The general brutality of the conquest of California is well recorded. In the early days of the invasions, one of the Spanish soldiers' favorite pastimes was raiding Indian villages in the vicinity of mission settlements. After the village men were forcefully driven off, the crops would be burned and the women systematically raped. Several Indian revolts in southern California were the result of this practice. Father Jayme remarked in one of his letters to Father Serra that "what the devil does not succeed in accomplishing among the pagans is accomplished by Christians." What Monsignor Eagen had neglected to say in his sermon was that the Indian woman who had aborted her pregnancy (mentioned in Father Jayme's letter) may very well have been assaulted by one of Father Jayme's countrymen.

Defenders of Father Serra and the Spanish mission system have pointed out that Father Serra and his fellow evangelists were appalled by the conduct of the Spanish soldiers and that one reason they wanted to keep women converts within mission dormitories was precisely to protect them from such violence. Well, it is not clear that life for Indian women was noticeably better in the enforced confinements of the missions.

The mission's native population was frequently devastated by the epidemics that always followed contact between Europeans and more isolated races. Health problems were worst among the female converts: unlike their male counterparts, they could not leave the missions' cramped quarters in the daylight for work in the fields. Because of the unsanitary conditions caused by their constant confinement, the numbers of Indian women at the missions soon dropped well below the numbers of Indian men.

Maternity under such circumstances was understandably wretched. In some of the missions established by Father Serra the child mortality rate periodically exceeded 20 percent.

Native women who attempted to control their reproductive fate could expect grotesque treatment. It is recorded that one woman accused of infanticide had her head shaved and was whipped daily for two weeks. Her feet were bound in irons for three months and she was forced to appear every Sunday before church with a painted wooden child in her arms. If such cruelty can be placed in historical perspective, perhaps we can again begin considering Junipero Serra for sainthood.

On the other hand, while I do not find him "canon-fodder," I must say that I largely agree with Monsignor Eagen that Father Serra should be seen in perspective. It would be unreasonable to expect the agent of a church still in the throes of counter reformation to rise up and denounce his most Catholic country, attack its policies, and thwart its soldiers.

It would be unreasonable but, in fact, two centuries before Father Serra accompanied the conquistadors on their invasion, a Dominican priest did those very things. His name was Bartolome de las Casas (1474-1566), and he is a marvelous and underappreciated hero of Catholic intellectual history. And I will say that if our church were actually a platform for justice and not a cauldron of dispute, it is Father de las Casas, and not Father Serra, whose canonization would now be at issue.

As a child in Spain las Casas remembered the return of Christopher Columbus from one of the explorer's journeys to the West Indies. Years later, he became the first Catholic priest ordained in the Americas. While ministering in the Caribbean, Father de las Casas, at first an eager partisan of Spain's colonial policies, became increasingly distressed by the treatment of the natives at the hands of the conquistadors. In 1537, partly at the Dominican's urging, Pope Paul III issued a papal bull affirming the rationality of Native Americans and forbidding the practice of slavery in Catholic colonies. From that point to the end of his life, Father de las Casas defended the autonomy and intellectual credibility of Indian culture: his *Most Brief Account of the Destruction of the Indies*, as it was translated into English, became the seminal account of the holocaust visited on Native American cultures by the Spanish conquistadors. Although Father de las Casas's views initially flourished in the church, they were eventually lost in the militant nationalism that swept Catholic Europe (and especially Spain) at the time of the Counter Reformation. By Father Serra's day, the debate on cultural autonomy in the Americas was closed.

Reviewing these controversies, I was struck by the ambiguous role the church has played since the Reformation—sometimes allied with the state, sometimes working to mollify its

worst aspect, and sometimes openly opposed to it. Let us take Monsignor Eagen at his word: Junipero Serra deserves to be seen in context, deserves credit for trying to rein in the blood lust of the conquistadors. But that he essentially cooperated with an abusive system is beyond a doubt.

If there is a figure from the conquest whose canonization we should make our cause, let it be Father de las Casas—remembered in church histories as "the apostle to the Indians." (It is a problematic title; the missionary would probably have retorted that the Indians were apostles to him.) Without surrendering his faith, Father de las Casas recognized that the church had its place in a diverse world; he saw that in addition to ministering to its own members, the church had to respect and defend the rights of non-believers. When confronted with the argument that the Central American practice of human

sacrifice justified an enlightened war of conquest, Father de las Casas responded: "Between two evils, one must always choose the lesser, and the sacrifice of a few innocents by the Indians will always be a lesser evil than the destruction of whole kingdoms and cities."

Any priest of the sixteenth century who held that tolerating Aztec human sacrifice was preferable to exterminating Aztec culture would have certainly urged greater tolerance in the twentieth century. Father de las Casas would surely have seen that any state which held sufficient power to enforce an anti-abortion law on an unwilling, non-Catholic majority would be quick to use such power toward other totalitarian ends. It is Father de las Casas's legacy of tolerance that is the lesson of the Spanish conquest.

It is also the lesson of my visit to San Diego, a lesson that Monsignor Eagen got only half right. We Catholics have much in our church's history to regret, many instances of cruelty and cowardice for the world to forgive. It is unfair and unreasonable to judge Father Serra by contemporary standards, just as it is equally unfair and unreasonable to try and enforce Catholic standards on others. Let us judge the world as we would have the world judge us, and so live together in peace.

BIBLIOGRAPHICAL NOTE: This essay is indebted to the extensive documentation in Daniel Fogel's *Junipero Serra, the Vatican and Enslavement Theology* (Isis Press, 1988), a readable and well-researched analysis of Father Serra's role in the subjugation of Native Californians. Fogel's footnotes led me to two outstanding scholarly accounts of the life of Bartolome de las Casas: *All Mankind Is One* (Northern Illinois University Press, 1974) by Lewis Hanke and *Bartolome de las Casas in History* (Northern Illinois University Press, 1971), edited by Juan Friede and Benjamin Keen. Future accounts of las Casas and his significance in our hemisphere's intellectual history will need to start with these works.)

GUIDELINES FOR SELECTION COMMITTEE--SAMARITAN OF THE YEAR AWARD
FOR INTERNAL USE ONLY

The recipient may be an individual, couple, or group, male or female. (Male pronouns are used for consistency and brevity.)

The committee shall review the nominees in the following categories. The first category, ecumenism of service, is considered to be a critical area in order that the award reflect and be consistent with the mission statement of the Samaritan Center. It is expected that the recipient would excel in at least one of the other categories, but not necessarily all of them, at a level worthy of recognition.

1. Ecumenism of service--Recipients of the service of the nominee should not be limited by creed or religion.

2. Civic involvement--This may be the major area of service. Does the nominee participate in community organizations, service clubs, schools, etc. Does this contribute to the candidates credibility as recipient of the award?

3. Professional contributions--This could be the major area of contribution. E.G. a physician develops a device or feeding program which benefits many people through his professional work. Further, does the individual belong to his professional association and does he make contributions appropriate to his field?

4. Sphere of influence--This should be broad in terms of the type of people served. The service should be to the greater San Diego community.

5. Preparation of the recipient--Did the nominee pursue an educational pathway or special training to equip him for his role? Volunteerism or seeking special experiences are worthy of note. Perhaps the candidate's lack of education for the role he is filling may be more dramatic than the educational preparation.

6. Visibility as a leader--The candidate serves as a role model for others by the service or contribution he has made. His actions set an example to be emulated by others.

7. Years of service--Preference should be given to persons with longevity of service rather than to shortterm benefactors.

8. Home life--It is possible that this category might be of prime importance if the candidate is a foster parent or provides homes for troubled teens, etc.

It is suggested that this area may enhance the recipient's credibility. On the other hand, it is hoped that such factors as divorce or difficult offspring not be deterrents for an otherwise qualified recipient.

In addition to these categories for evaluation, a number of qualities seem to be essential in the recipient. They include 1)generosity of spirit, 2)love of humanity 3) reverence for life (plant, animal, or mineral as these ultimately benefit humanity), 4)respect for the individuality of the recipients of the service, and 5) behavior which stretches beyond the boundaries of that which is expected of persons in that role, but which yields positive outcomes.

Dear Assumption Parishioners,

For some weeks now reports have been circulating thru the parish regarding the possibility of my transfer as pastor. I have not commented on them up until now because the prospects of such a transfer were tentative and depended on other factors in the large set of assignment changes that will be taking place thruout the Archdiocese in early July. Early this week this change of assignment was finalized.

I am sure that the next three weeks will provide ample opportunity for me to share with you the reflections I have on my six years with you here at Assumption and the sadness I feel at the prospects of leaving this uniquely loving Faith community. At this time I simply wish to confirm the fact that I will be leaving and the extremely good news that Father Piro has been appointed to succeed me as pastor. There are excellent prospects that Father Piro will be joined by a new associate pastor.

I also wish to convey to you that this change of assignment was not initiated by me. Our personnel procedures do offer pastors the opportunity to volunteer for a new assignment, but I did not do this and was looking forward to at least another year with you here at Assumption. The Personnel Board "drafted" me, as it were, in order to find a suitable pastor for St. Vincent de Paul Parish in Federal Way - just south of SeaTac Airport. This is a rapidly expanding suburban area that serves as a bedroom community to Seattle and Tacoma. Father Piro was formerly pastor of St. Theresa Parish there. St. Vincent's was founded 20 years ago and now numbers over 1,400 families (Assumption has 900). The present pastor has served for the past 10 years and is moving to a new assignment at a time when plans have begun for a new permanent church facility. The size of the parish and the prospects of this building project were factors that prompted the Personnel Board to ask me to consider accepting this new assignment despite my lack of personal interest in a change at this time.

So much of me wants to remain here with you, the people I have come to know and love so much, but my call to Priesthood is a call to service of the Church thruout the Archdiocese, and I have accepted this new assignment after much prayer and reflection for two key reasons. First because I have a great respect for the vitality and Faith that is present here at Assumption and the strength of this community to move onward AND upward with fresh leadership. The prospect of Father Piro remaining as my successor weighed heavily in this consideration since I feel that he has become such a vital part of our parish family and is gifted in so many ways to continue as your new pastor. In short,


Late last November Father John Smith announced to the parish via a letter and in a farewell homily his decision to leave Assumption and spend a period of time in "rest, prayer, and discernment". At that time and through these past months many members of our parish family have responded with prayer and support for Father John during this important period. Because Father John has been an important part of our life here at Assumption in recent years and because so many have continued to express an interest in his welfare since his departure, we feel that it is important that our parish family be informed of Father John's recent marriage and his apparent intention to settle in Bellingham. John's decision is obviously a significant one for himself and also alters his relationship to our parish community. This marriage removes John's delegation to function officially as a priest. And since in taking this step John has not yet fulfilled the requirements of the Church for the transition from the Priesthood to the married state, his action limits his right to full participation in the sacramental life of the Church.

While these are delicate matters, it is hoped that this clarification will serve to minimize speculation or misinformation that so often causes unnecessary confusion and pain. We ask your continued prayers for all parties involved. We especially pray that we will all be committed to approach this recent turn of events with the sensitivity, love, and understanding that should be the surest sign of the presence of Christ in our community. We are certain that we all feel a sense of loss and pain as we deal with the reality that priestly ministry will no longer be a part of John's life. Perhaps the day will come when our Church will recognize "optional celibacy", thereby embracing the gifts of many men who would remain in the formal service of the Lord if allowed the choice of either the single or the married vocation.

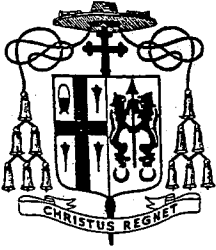

Dear Brother:

You have received notice of the second annual clergy retreat June 2-6, 1980. The retreat will once again be conducted at the University of San Diego. We are fortunate to have Rev. May the Lord continue to strengthen us in mutual trust and in our ministry of support to each other.

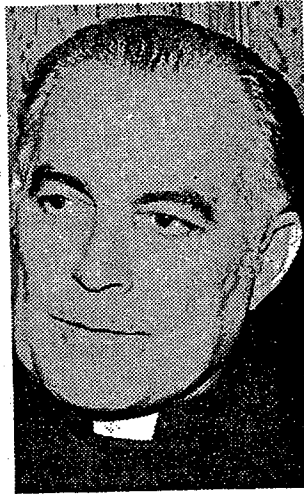
Earlier that day, the USD School of Law will confer 301 juris doctorate degrees at a 10:30 a.m. ceremony, also in the stadium.

Historic Hotel del Coronado Setting for College of Fellows Convocation Dinner

The historic and elaborately conceived Hotel del Coronado is the last of the glory-days seaside resorts of a bygone era. It was the logical choice as a setting Monday evening for the last remaining black-tie social occasion on the annual program of the American Institute of Architects convention.

As the AIA bus reached the apogee of the San Diego-Coronado bridge, straight ahead toward the Pacific Ocean, a structure resembling a castle dominates the view of the shoreline. It is indeed "the crown."

The turrets, tall cupolas, hand-carved wooden pillars, and Victorian gingerbread architecture provides a monument to the past. High-rise buildings loom on the horizon and it is difficult to believe that the land sold for 25 cents an acre before 1870. The hotel was the dream-come-true of Elisha Babcock of Indiana and by 1887 construction had begun per the rough drawings of architects James Merritt and Watson Reid.

Official Historic Landmark

Recognition of its beauty and importance is official by its designation as a San Diego County Historical Landmark and a California Historical Landmark. Reid Bros. Architects received an AIA Award of Honor from the San Diego Chapter in 1960. In October 1971 the hotel was officially listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

A small museum displays architect's drawings, photographs, early guest books and an entire bedroom of antique furnishings. A discreet corridor sign cautions "Our Retired Guests Will Appreciate Quiet."

There is a display of special china with gold rim and crown for the Prince of Wales; he met Wally Simpson here.

Crown Room Majestic

Preceding the dinner, guests gathered at a reception in the patio garden where palm trees grow tall and flower beds are tended to perfection.

Dress for gentlemen was black tie and FAIA medals; the women were in lovely summer prints or colors with pretty wraps for the cool of the evening. It was not surprising that this background has been selected by film makers. In 1958 Billy Wilder chose the "Del" for "Some Like It Hot" star-

ring Marilyn Monroe. Eight real-life United States Presidents have been guests.

The Crown Room is the hotel's main dining salon; it could easily seat 1,000. Approximately 560 guests were at the Convocation Dinner and seated at round tables covered in pink cloths. Bouquets of white and yellow mums with red carnations were centerpieces.

The light fixtures are enormous crown-shape chandeliers. Ceilings are 31 ft. The arched ceiling was made of natural finished sugar pine, fitted together with pegs (no nails) with a unique support system so that no posts or other interior supports are required.

Hewitt Guest Speaker

The Invocation was by Monsignor I. Brent Eagen of the San Diego Roman Catholic Diocese, Alcala Park, San Diego. Philip J. Meathe, chancellor, presided and introduced guest speaker William A. Hewitt, chairman of the board of Deere & Co., Moline, IL.

New Honorary Fellows and new Fellows were recognized. The program closed with the transferral of office of chancellor from Meathe to George E. Kassabaum.

There was no formal place-card seating at the dinner and part of the pleasure was seeing old friends and new ones at the table. DCN was seated next to former AIA president John Richards of Toledo, OH., who has retired and is writing a book. Its title is "Look Up In Rome" where he and his wife, Norma, have made many trips. John is doing his own illustrations.

At dinner another former AIA president told us of his book, "Phoenix" — a trilogy — novel divided into: "Battle of Plantagenet; Bust of Bureaucracy and New Hope — New Capitol of the United States."

A new dinner table friend was Mary Thiry of Seattle, WA., and wife of architect Paul Thiry. Mary regaled us with stories of her childhood vacations spent at the Hotel del Coronado

in the days when children were not allowed in the dining room at the same time as adults.

San Diego architect Bill Watson lives in La Jolla; a Princeton man, he was escort to guest speaker William Hewitt and joined the table on DCN's right.

SOME USEFUL SUGGESTIONS FOR INSTITUTE PARTICIPANTS COMING TO ROME
INSTITUTE FOR CONTINUING THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION

Laundry number # 48

Our program begins with your arrival on the date set for the opening of the session. Please plan to arrive on that day and not before, as we are not prepared to receive you here at the Casa Santa Maria. There will be a reception held at the Casa from 6 to 7:30 P.M. on the day of your arrival. This will give you an opportunity to meet some of the participants in the program and the other residents of the Casa Santa Maria.

If you intend to continue with a program of graduate studies following the regular Institute program, bring transcripts of grades and courses from all seminaries or universities attended. (It is helpful to include a description of each course)

Bring about ten passport size photos. These are needed for visas, library cards, identification cards, etc. If you plan to travel in Moslem countries or behind the Iron Curtain, have some photos taken without Roman collar.

There is some difficulty in arranging special group flights because the requirements are very strict. In the event these can be arranged, you will be advised of adequate time. If not, TWA flights Nos. 840/844; PAA Nos. 110/114; and AZ 611 are the easiest flights for us to meet.

If baggage is shipped unaccompanied, address it to *North American College, Uffici Mercè, Vatican City; Europe*. DO NOT USE ROME or ITALY in the address or you will get involved with Italian customs. Air freight, preferably with TWA, is an efficient way to ship personal effects. TWA advises us when the shipment arrives in Rome.

Italian customs may levy duty on typewriters unless actually carried in hand or sent with belongings to Vatican City. Typewriters of excellent quality can be obtained in Rome at reasonable prices for the period of the Institute.

If you arrive by air, there is airport bus service from the airport to the central air terminal in Rome. Cabs are expensive. If you do take a cab, settle the fare beforehand. The meter should not exceed 7,000 lire or about \$11.50. A charge of 150 lire for each piece of luggage is made.

Clerical dress is worn in Rome. The black suit and rabat are acceptable attire. We suggest you bring or purchase here a personal alb (nonwrinkle type) for liturgical celebrations, and that you bring your own stole.

Roman weather is changeable. The fall and winter can be chilly and rainy. Sweaters, raincoat, umbrella, rubbers, topcoat are advisable. Comfortable shoes for walking are a must.

Bed linen, blankets and laundry service are supplied by the Casa. Each resident is expected to provide his own towels, wash cloths, soap, etc. Please mark your clothing before arrival with the laundry number shown above.

Cigarettes may be purchased at the Casa at prices comparable to those in the States. American pipe tobacco and cigars are not available in Italy. Customs allows a small quantity of these items to be brought into the country. Such items being mailed from the States should be sent only to the Vatican address, and not more than one box of cigars or one pound of tobacco should be sent each month.

No visa is required for entrance into Italy by American citizens.

Most everyday needs may be obtained in Rome. However, if you prefer particular brands, they may not be available or may be expensive.

Electrical equipment: electric current in the Casa runs approximately 120-135 A.C. at 50 cycles (Note: U.S. has 60 cycles). American-made typewriters, radios, etc., will generally run off this current. Electric razors may need a special transformer.

Books are available from many sources in Rome. Those published in the U.S. are generally more costly in Rome. Judge your needs accordingly. The Seminary Department of the North American College operates a bookstore. They offer reasonable discounts for Casa residents. However, it generally takes a long time to order these books through the NAC. Please bring with you a copy of the Sacred Scriptures and a copy of Vatican Council II documents. There are enough other books in the Institute library to take care of your basic needs during the time of the program. Anyone wishing to obtain a library card at the Biblical Institute or Gregorian University can do so by applying to the Secretariat of the respective institutions. There is a fee for the use of such library facilities.

It would be helpful for each incoming priest to acquaint himself with the fundamentals of the Italian language, especially vocabulary, before coming to Rome. Special language arrangements could be made for those desiring it when free from the Institute program. The Canonesses of St. Augustine operate a language school here. Institute participants can learn some Italian. A language lab with supervision makes it possible to learn during periods in the Institute that are not taken up with official programs. The Sisters have a reasonable charge per hour, and each person progresses at his own pace. Arrangements can be made upon arrival.

An international driver's license is very useful — see AAA.

Money: Personal checks can be cashed at a small agency near the Casa, at American Express, Cook's Travel Agency, or the Istituto per Opera di Religione in Vatican City. It is advisable to have a checking account at your local bank in the States. Make prior arrangements to have your money deposited there. Money exchange is also arranged through the Casa Santa Maria once weekly. Personal checks, travelers' checks or currency are acceptable for change into Italian lire.

Blue Cross or similar hospitalization plans usually extend coverage to European hospitals. This should be checked before departure. Make certain that you have basic coverage.

Opportunity for recreation is ample. The facilities of the Seminary Department of the College are available to Casa residents (tennis, handball, bowling, baseball). Sporting equipment is expensive and difficult to obtain.

Optional excursions: Holy Land, approximately \$275 for a week's visit. Geneva, World Council of Churches, Cluny and Taizé, \$220 median price depending on accommodations and arrangements.

Dear Father:

I am sure that this letter finds you in the midst of your preparations for your trip to Rome that will bring you to the Casa Santa Maria on Thursday, October 3, 1974. We look forward to welcoming you to the Casa community. In order to assist you with the preparations that you are making, I am attaching a copy of our useful suggestions that may be of some help to you.

You can undoubtedly see from even a cursory glance at the syllabus, that the orientation of this program is highly informational in character. For the most part, the lecture system is the principal vehicle for the communication of new theological and philosophical insights that can be of help to you in your future pastoral ministry. The method is principally deductive. Keep in mind, however, that there is no specialized in-service-training program that can promise to bring a person fully up to date in all of the various Church disciplines. The main themes that have been selected and which will be presented by experts can be filtered through the personal experience of each participant and in that way made relevant to the particular circumstances of each person's situation.

The experience of living together with other priests is an additional attraction of the program. This opportunity to exchange points of view, to pray together and to share a wide variety of experiences cannot but help enrich your own personal life and in some way enhance the quality of your priestly ministry. The Admissions Committee has reviewed your request for a place in the Institute and we have accepted you for this course because it seemed to us that you were serious about your own needs for updating and wanted an opportunity to come in contact with recognized theological experts.

It will be no easy thing for you to digest all that is presented to you during the three months here in Rome. In addition to the theological aspect of the program, which is the most important thing we have to contribute, you have the added advantage of being here at the time that the Holy Father intends to open the Holy Year, a time of reconciliation for the universal Church and for all men of good will. We hope that you will enjoy the many cultural advantages that are also available to you in Rome. The total experience should be a most memorable one and we think that you will be able to look in retrospect and say, as so many others have, that this experience is one of the highlights of your priesthood.

Would you please advise me of your travel plans as soon as you have completed your arrangements for coming to Rome. If you have any questions that remain unanswered, do not hesitate to write.

Father Eagen Succeeds Msgr. Booth, Chancellor

Msgr. James T. Booth, who has served the Diocese of San Diego at the Chancery for nearly two decades, has resigned as chancellor. In accepting his resignation, Bishop Francis J. Furey said the monsignor plans to devote all of his time to his parochial work and to preparations for the bicentennial celebration of San Diego in 1969.

Old Mission San Diego de Alcalá, of which Msgr. Booth has been pastor since February 1954, will be a "focal point" of the observance, Bishop Furey said.

The Bishop named Father I. Brent Eagen to succeed Msgr. Booth. Father Eagen has been director of school relations and public information at the College for Men, University of San Diego.

Msgr. Booth was graduated from Rome's Lateran University with a doctorate in Canon Law, magna cum laude, in June 1952. He previously had served for one year in the Chancery Office as secretary of the matrimonial tribunal.

On his return to the diocese, studies in another field and a successful examination in The Therapeutic Values of Religion in Psychiatry led to his appointment as chaplain at the State Hospital, Patton.

Recalled to the Chancery, he was named vice chancellor in June 1953 and chancellor in February 1954.

Educated in the public schools of his native Needles, Msgr. Booth studied for the priesthood at Holy Cross College, Canon City, Colorado, and the junior and major seminaries of Los Angeles. He was ordained in 1946.

A native of San Bernardino, Father Eagen was graduated from St. Bernardine's High School in 1947. He attended Loyola University of Los Angeles prior to studies for the priesthood at St. Francis and Immaculate Heart seminaries. He was ordained for the Diocese of San Diego in May 1956.

For the next three years he filled the dual role of assistant pastor at Holy Rosary Church in San Bernardino and teacher of English and religion at Aquinas High School in that city. Meanwhile, he studied for, and in June 1959, received his master's degree in English.

For the next five years Father Eagen taught English and American Literature at USD's College for Men, theology and medical ethics at Mercy College of Nursing, and religion at Our Lady of Peace Academy. He also conducted teacher training courses for the Parish High School of Religion and is the author of *Released Time: A Necessary Adjunct to Secondary Education*.

The new chancellor is a member of the Board of Directors for the Community Welfare Council of San Diego County, the National Conference of Christians and Jews, the San Diego Opera Guild and the La Jolla Museum of Art. He recently was named executive board member of the Kearny-Vista Planning Association.

Father Eagen is chaplain of the University of San Diego Auxiliary; Phi Kappa Theta, a national Catholic fraternity, and was national chaplain of the National Association of Catholic Alumni Clubs. He is also a chaplain of the Christian Family Movement in San Diego.

New Chancellor Named For Diocese

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. James T. Booth has resigned as chancellor of the San Diego Catholic Diocese. His successor is the Rev. I. Brent Eagen of the College for Men, University of San Diego.

Msgr. Booth, chancellor since 1954, will devote his time to his parochial work as pastor of Mission San Diego de Alcalá and to preparing for the 1969 San Diego bicentennial celebration, which will center about the old mission.

Father Eagen, who has been director of school relations and public information at the College for Men, is a native of San Bernardino who was ordained in 1956.

ATTENDED LOYOLA

The new chancellor is a 1947 graduate of St. Bernardine's High School at San Bernardino. Before studying for the priesthood at St. Francis and Immaculate Heart Seminaries, he attended Loyola University.

After his ordination, Father Eagen served for three years both as assistant pastor at Holy Rosary Catholic Church in San Bernardino and as a teacher of religion and English at Aquinas High School there. In 1959, he received a master's degree in English.

Father Eagen then taught English and American literature at the University of San Diego College for Men, theology and medical ethics at Mercy College of Nursing and religion at our Lady of Peace Academy during the next five

Monsignor I. Brent Eagen: Chancellor, pastor, priest

Monsignor I. Brent Eagen is not overly fond of playing the game "what if," but those who know him are often tempted to wonder what their friend "I.B." might have become had he not heard the calling to the priesthood.

A diplomat, perhaps?

A college president?

A tennis pro at the Kona Kai?

Polished and poised, warm and articulate, Eagen moves easily in any milieu. He has befriended the glitterati and the illiterati alike. Of the thousands of men and women who together form the local church, the tall, white-haired Eagen may well be the most recognizable, which is why the aforementioned game of "what if" usually yields the same result.

"He would have been a success at anything he chose to pursue, but the thing he was *meant* to pursue, the thing he was *born* to pursue, was the priesthood," a confidant submitted recently. "Beneath anything you might see on the surface, and I'm sure all of us see him differently, is a priest. And I'm not sure anyone who knows him can picture him in any other way."

Born December 14, 1929 in Upland, Calif., the 57-year-old Eagen has been chancellor of the Roman Catholic Diocese of San Diego since 1968. He has been pastor of the Mission San Diego de Alcalá since 1971. Still, his importance to the local church extends well beyond the job descriptions for those significant posts.

Because he is Bishop Leo T. Maher's chief assistant and most trusted aide, Eagen's influence can be felt throughout the diocese. And because the monsignor's friends and contacts can be found in every neighborhood and every layer of life in San Diego, his influence can be seen throughout the community, as well.

No one makes more public appearances on behalf

of the local church than does Eagen. No one is sought more frequently for counsel and advice. "The guy seems to be everywhere I go," a downtown businessman once observed, and he is not alone.

Eagen, who loves tennis, tries to play each Saturday morning. This is how he relaxes. The rest of the week, he is *really* on the run.

A typical 24 hours gives witness to the depth and breadth of the man. Start with two Saturday weddings. A late-afternoon Mass. A fund-raiser with civic leaders at the Hotel del Coronado. A late-night visit to an old friend in Mission Hills. Two Masses on Sunday. A trip to the stadium, since Eagen is the team chaplain of the San Diego Chargers. Then back to the Mission to greet a visiting bishop.

"I'm just a guy who can't say no," Eagen laughs, and — to his credit — probably wouldn't even if he could.

The "life story" of Isaac Brent Eagen actually begins three years before he was born, in 1926, in Kirksville, Mo.

There, Stella Powell agreed to marry James Eagen, and the young couple climbed into the groom's Model T Ford.

"My parents had decided to drive to California for their honeymoon," Eagen reports, "and to make a long story short they never went back. It's funny. The car broke down in Colorado on their way to California. If they hadn't been able to fix it, I suspect my life might have been a lot different."

The Eagens settled in the Pomona Valley, 30 miles east of Los Angeles, and James — a personable, industrious sort whose work ethic offset his lack of formal education — found employment as a clerk in the parts department of the local Buick garage.

Ultimately, like many Americans, the Eagens were effected by the Great Depression.

"My parents always said we were poor, and wanted me to understand that, but I don't think it was as hard on us as it was on other people we knew," Eagen recalls. "My mother was a good manager and my dad was a good provider. When you're young, I guess you're oblivious to some of those sorts of things, but later I could appreciate what we'd been through."

Clearly, values learned in these difficult times stayed with the young man.

He attended San Antonio School in Ontario and St. Joseph's, a Catholic school, in Pomona. The Eagens then moved to San Bernardino, and "I.B." enrolled at St. Bernardine High School.

He considered himself an average student, "although some of my former teachers might think I'm being overly generous," with an average teen-age lifestyle. He enjoyed sports, but asthma prevented him from being a varsity athlete. A part-time job may have helped steer him toward the priesthood.

"I worked at St. Bernardine's Hospital," Eagen recalls. "Nothing spectacular at all, I think I worked my way up to elevator operator, but I've always remembered the nuns' service and dedication. In deciding to become a priest, I guess a number of experiences came into play, and the time I'd spent at the hospital was certainly one of them."

Eagen graduated from St. Bernardine High School in 1947 and enrolled at Loyola University, a Jesuit-run institution in Los Angeles.

It was there, during his freshman year, that he decided to study for the priesthood.

"I think the thought of becoming a priest had been in my mind for some time," he explained, "and during my first year at Loyola it surfaced as something to consider seriously."

Although the Jesuits at Loyola clearly influenced this decision, Eagen felt that service — rather than education — was the area that held the most fascination for him, and, as a consequence, chose to become a parish priest.

Ironically, as his ministry evolved, he became an educator and administrator anyway.

In 1948, Eagen entered St. Francis Seminary, then located in El Cajon.

"I visited several seminaries in California, and I just felt I belonged at St. Francis," he said. "It was in my own diocese (San Bernardino County was then part of the Diocese of San Diego) and the diocese needed priests. It wasn't that hard a decision, really."

Seminary life was difficult. St. Francis seminarians were expected to study and pray six days a week, beginning with meditation and Mass at 5:30 a.m. each day, and were prohibited from leaving the grounds without permission from the rector.

In a story he wrote recently for the *Southern Cross*, Eagen remembered that doctors' appointments were considered valid reasons for procuring one-day leaves, and "to this very day I look forward to having my teeth cleaned and even drilled."

Like most seminarians, Eagen recalls having second thoughts. There was, in fact, a young woman of his acquaintance he felt he needed to see again.

"Just about the time I had decided I should call her, she announced her engagement to somebody else," he said. "Call it divine guidance, call it fate, I don't know. Needless to say, I didn't phone."

On May 19, 1956, Eagen was ordained for the Diocese of San Diego by Bishop Charles Francis Buddy in St. Joseph Cathedral downtown.

He said his first Mass at his parents' church, Holy Rosary in San Bernardino, and was assigned to St. Joseph's as an associate pastor.

From the beginning, Father Eagen was an excellent writer and a compelling orator, skills he owns still today, but the young priest soon learned restraint.

"The rector at the Cathedral was Monsignor George Rice," Eagen said. "He was a wonderful man, but he was very strict and very thorough. He would red-pencil all my sermons on Friday or Saturday and he kept the reins pretty tight. I remember a sermon I wrote about divine grace, and I had used a metaphor about Grace Kelly, who was in the news at the time. I thought it was pretty clever, myself, but Monsignor Rice scratched it out. When I asked why, he said, 'She gets enough publicity without our help on Sundays.'"

Eagen's ministry soon reached a significant point, because in the summer of 1956 he was asked to teach religion at Cathedral Girls High School.

"It was a natural thing to do, since Cathedral was right there and I was an associate pastor," Eagen said. "When I agreed to teach, I didn't give it a whole lot of thought, but I had no idea how much I'd enjoy it. I really got into it, and before long I realized I wanted to concentrate on education."

In December of 1956, Msgr. Thomas Matthews — pastor of Father Eagen's home parish in San Bernardino — asked Bishop Buddy if Eagen might be available to fill an opening at Holy Rosary.

He was, he did, and Eagen spent three years as an associate pastor, just minutes from his parents' home.

While assigned to Holy Rosary, Eagen taught English and religion at Aquinas High School, and his career as a "priestly professor" began to flower.

In 1959, he returned to Loyola and earned a Master of Arts degree in English and education.

In 1960, Eagen joined the faculty at the San Diego College for Men, which later became the University of San Diego.

His was a busy schedule. Not only did he teach classes in theology, speech, English and American literature at the College for Men, he offered instruction in medical ethics at the Mercy College of Nursing and taught religion at Our Lady of Peace High School.

"It really was a great experience," Eagen recalls. "It was challenging, yes. It was taxing at times. But it was incredibly invigorating."

Soon, virtually every administrator on campus had come to appreciate the man's vigor and skill, and in 1964 Eagen was named Director of School Relations.

"Initially, at least, the focus was student recruitment," he recalled. "Our freshman class had slipped to 50 students, and we desperately needed more, so I put a slide show together and hit the road. As the position evolved, though, we got into all sorts of things, from public relations to development to who knows what all. It was a very critical time for us. So much needed to be done, and there weren't very many of us around to do it."

During this time, Eagen's network of friends, contacts and acquaintances grew quickly.

While wearing the hat of an educator, he was one of the founders of the California Conference of Catholic Colleges, a group that formed to resolve common problems and discuss common needs.

As the college's public relations director, Eagen soon befriended newspaper editors, station managers and P.R. professionals throughout San Diego.

And as a fund-raiser, anxious to attract private donations to a school that received almost no government assistance, Eagen gradually began making inroads in the business community, as well.

Others receive credit for what the University of San Diego has since become, and rightfully so. But no one in Alcala Park overlooks the role Eagen played in the development of a truly extraordinary university. Indeed, in 1980, USD conferred upon him an honorary doctorate of Humane Letters.

"Obviously, the university holds a very special place in my heart," Eagen admits. "To see it grow from a very small, shaky institution to what it's become today, and to know I had a small role in helping it along, is very rewarding. It's probably the most satisfying thing I've done in my life."

Eagen served the college until 1968, when, to his surprise — "to my utter disbelief" — Bishop Francis J. Furey asked him to become chancellor of the Diocese of San Diego.

"I was flabbergasted," Eagen confessed. "I remember saying, 'Your Excellency, I know nothing about any part of the job.' All he said to me was, 'Father, you'll learn.'"

If a bishop is the chief executive officer of a diocese,

the chancellor is the chief operations officer, and the growth of the San Diego diocese is a credit to the two men in charge.

Since 1969, when Bishop Maher replaced Bishop Furey, the diocese has erased an \$11 million diocesan debt, opened 25 new parishes, established and solidified dozens of local projects and programs, and helped USD become one of the West's best Catholic colleges.

By 1977, the Diocese of San Diego had grown so large — and so successful — that it was partitioned to form a new diocese for San Bernardino and Riverside counties.

The San Diego diocese now is limited to San Diego and Imperial counties, but it has continued to grow and prosper. There are 97 diocesan parishes, 43 grade schools and three high schools. The diocese includes almost 400,000 registered Catholics.

Although Eagen is probably best-known for his contributions as chancellor, he is he equally proud of the work he has done as pastor of the Mission San Diego de Alcala.

Eagen has directed California's oldest church since March 10, 1971, when he was assigned to the post by Bishop Maher.

At the time, the "Old Mission" was struggling. A restoration plan had bogged down due to red tape and lack of funding. Parish membership had slipped to 150 families.

By making a conscious effort to re-establish the Mission as a local landmark — "We feel the Mission belongs to all the people of San Diego, not just Catholics" — Eagen was able to remind the community of its historical and cultural significance.

And as that awareness grew, so, too, did the realization that the Mission was an active parish.

Within 10 years, membership had soared to 1,500 families. In 1980, formation of the new Ascension parish in nearby Tierra Santa cut deeply into the Mission's rolls, but again it lists 1,500 families and the pastor is understandably proud.

"Being involved at the Mission has really filled a void for me," Eagen noted. "When I decided to become a priest, my ambition was to serve in a parish. My career then went off in a different direction, but my original goals never really left me, and I don't think I would have been content if I hadn't been given an assignment like the one I have now at the Mission."

Eagen, who was honored with the title of "Monsignor" on July 1, 1969, is clearly a familiar face in the Catholic community. Beyond that, his influence is recognized by religious leaders throughout San Diego. In 1975, he was installed as senior chairman of the local chapter of the National Conference of

Christians and Jews. He continues to serve the NCCJ as a national trustee.

One of the early pioneers of the ecumenical movement in San Diego, Eagen has received a number of awards for his efforts in the area of Christian unity.

He has been honored with an NCCJ Brotherhood Award. In 1986, he received a Good Samaritan Award from the First United Methodist Church. He also owns a San Diego County Heart Association "Good Guy" award and a special citation from the Navy League.

The membership cards in the man's wallet say more than a little about him. In addition to his lifetime membership in the NCCJ, he is a member of the Canon Law Society of America, the Navy League of the United States, the Circumnavigators Club, Scholia, Phi Kappa Theta, the Rest and Aspiration Society and the San Diego County Ecumenical Conference.

Eagen is the founder and president of the Cathedral Plaza, Guadalupe Plaza and St. John Plaza corporations, HUD-sponsored residential communities for senior citizens.

He is secretary of the Board of Trustees at the University of San Diego.

Eagen is listed in *Who's Who in the West* and the *Dictionary of International Biography*.

Should the opportunity present itself, Eagen would like to spend time expanding his portfolio as an author. Despite the obvious limits imposed by his schedule, Eagen has managed to write stories about the City of San Diego, Father Junipero Serra, Father Antonio Ubach and Robert Frost for *Westerners* books.

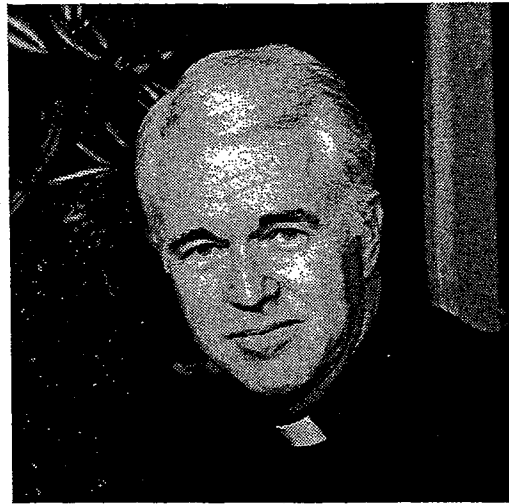
While a professor at the College for Men, he authored a book entitled *Released Time: A Necessary Adjunct to Secondary Education*, which became widely circulated among educators.

In January of 1988, Eagen will celebrate his 20th anniversary as chancellor of the Diocese of San Diego. In March of 1991, he will mark his 20th year as pastor at Mission San Diego de Alcalá.

What lies in the future for this seemingly indefatigable man?

"I really have no idea," he concedes, "but I suspect I'll find something to keep myself busy."

Thus far, at least, there is no evidence to the contrary.

"I firmly hold and accept each and every definition of the unerring teaching of the Church, with all she has maintained and declared, but especially those points of doctrine which expressly combat the errors of our time. In the first place I profess my belief that God, the beginning and end of all, can be certainly known and therefore proved to exist by the natural light of reason from the things that are made, that is, from the visible works of the creation as a cause from its effects. Next I recognize and acknowledge the external arguments of revelation, that is, divine facts, especially miracles and prophecies, as most certain signs of the divine origin of the Christian religion, and I hold that these are altogether suited to the understanding of every age and of all men, also of our times. Thirdly, I likewise hold with firm faith that the Church, the guardian and exponent of the revealed Word, was proximately and directly founded by the true and historic Christ Himself, while He dwelt amongst us, and that she was also built upon Peter, the Prince of the Apostolic Hierarchy, and upon his successors to the end of time. Fourthly, I sincerely accept the teaching of faith as transmitted down to us from the Apostles through the orthodox Fathers in the same sense and even in the same wording; and, therefore, I wholly reject the heretical notions of the evolution of dogmas, which pass from one sense to another alien to that which the Church held from the start; and I likewise condemn every error whereby is substituted for the divine deposit, entrusted by Christ to His Spouse and by Her to be faithfully guarded, a philosophic system or the creation of a human consciousness, gradually refined by the striving of men and finally to be perfected hereafter by indefinite progress. Fifthly, I hold for certain and sincerely profess that Faith is not a blind religious sense making its way out of the hidden regions of the sub-liminal consciousness, morally tinged by the influence of heart and will, but is a true assent of the intellect to truth received from without by hearing, an assent whereby we believe to be true, because of the authority of the all-true God, whatever by the personal God, our Creator and Lord, has been spoken, testified and revealed.

In universum denique me alienissimum ab errore profiteor, quo *modernistae* tenent in sacra traditione nihil inesse divini; aut, quod longe deterrius, pantheistico sensu illud admittunt; ita ut nihil iam restet nisi nudum factum et simplex, communibus historiae factis aequandum; hominum nempe sua industria, sollertia, ingenio scholam a Christo eiusque Apostolis inchoatam per subsequentes aetates continuantium. Proinde fidem Patrum firmissime retineo et ad extremum vitae spiritum retinebo, de charismate *veritatis certo*, quod est, fuit eritque semper in *episcopatus ab Apostolis successione*; non ut id

"I further, with all due reverence, submit and with my whole mind adhere to all the condemnations, declarations, and ordinances contained in the Encyclical letter *Pascendi* and in the Decree *Lamentabili*, particularly regarding what is called the history of Dogma.

"I also reject the error of those who aver that the Faith proposed by the Church may be in conflict with history, and that Catholic dogmas in the sense in which they are now understood cannot be harmonized with the more truthful "origins" of Christianity. Moreover, I condemn and reject the opinion which declares that a Christian man of better culture can assume a dual personality, one as a believer and another as an historian, as if it were permissible for the historian to hold fast what his faith as a believer contradicts, or to lay down premises from which there follows the falsity or the uncertainty of dogmas, provided only that these are not directly denied. Likewise I reject that method of estimating and interpreting Holy Writ, which, setting aside the Church's tradition and the analogy of Faith and the rules of the Apostolic See, adopts the rationalists' principles and with equal arbitrariness and rashness considers criticism of the text the one only supreme rule. Furthermore, I reject the opinion of those who hold that a teacher of the science of Historical Theology or the writer on the subject must first put aside the notions previously conceived about the supernatural origin of Catholic tradition or about the divine aid promised for the perpetual preservation of each revealed truth; then, that the writings of individual Fathers must be interpreted solely by the data of science, without any reference to sacred authority, and with that freedom of judgment wherewith every profane record is usually examined.

"Finally and in general, I declare myself to be far removed from the error of the modernists who hold that in sacred tradition there is nothing inherently divine; or who—far worse still—admit it in a pantheistic sense; so that thus there would remain only a bare simple fact equal to the ordinary facts of history, viz., that the school started by Christ and His Apostles finds, in the ages that follow, men to carry it on by their energy, their skill, and their genius. Wherefore most firmly do I retain and to my last breath will I retain the Faith of the Fathers of the Church concerning the sure endowment of truth, which

is, has been, and ever will be in the succession of the Episcopate from the Apostles; not in such a way that what seems best and most fitting according to the refinement of each age may be held, but that the absolute and unchangeable truth preached from the beginning by the Apostles may never in any different wise be believed, never in any different wise be understood.

All this I promise that I will faithfully, entirely and sincerely keep and inviolably guard, and from this never in teaching or howsoever by word or writing in the least depart. So I promise, so I swear, so help me God and these His holy gospels.
