Your Excellency:
Thank you for taking the time to write me.
It is quite evident that you missed the main point of the original letter; the name Rudolph Galindo on my mother's checking account, savings account, deed to her property and in her will without the family's knowledge, and with evasive answers from both parties when the discovery was made. Why was he afraid for the family to know? Priests, regardless of vocation, are still human beings and subject to human frailties. Again I ask, is this situation such a case?

As far as Konsignor Galindo's phone call to me, the one call he made was nothing more than a thirty-minute monologue reiterating how long he and mother had been friends, what a wonderful person she is, etc. When asked about his name on the deed to her property, his reply was "I'm glad you brought that up." He said he didn't really want it there but gave me no time to ask why he permitted it to be done. Both times I made a comment, I had to interrupt him-he talked non-stop. No clear understanding of anything resulted from sald phone call excent reinforcement of my contention that there was something not completely kosher about that entire procedure of having his name put on all her property.

No disrespect is intended, but a phone call from him does not relieve you of the responsibility of answerins your personal mail. If a cessation of comunication between him and mother was what I wanted, I would have written him directly telling him to leave her alone. I don't have to go to a bishop for that!

It isn't necessary for you to reply to this letter, but if you would like to, a response would be appreciated. After all, it is only common courtesy to reply when a person comes to you for help with a problen, even if it is only to say "Sorry, I cas't kelp" or "I don't.feel that you have a problem".

I have a copy of your letter to Bishop Maher. I have not responded because I've been on vacation.

However, I am terribly sorry if I have in any way caused you and your family anxiety and worry because of my phone calls to your mother.

Doris, as you know, just to keep the record straight, my relationship with your mother has been one of years of friendship and gratitude. Your dear mother has been a personal friend of mine for nearly 30 years. In her young days and mine as a young priest, she helped me immeasurably as a Sacristan. No work around the church was too big or impossible. For this I am eternally grateful and I will never forget her kindness to me, especially in my young days.

I hope that the following comments will help clear the air regarding your letter. Lack of communication seems to be the problem.

You state in the second paragraph, that on September 1981, your name was taken off a checking account and mine put on. I had no idea that your name was taken off or that it was even on this account. (This was not made known to me by your mother.) All I did was sign a little card your mother sent me by mail and returned it back to her again. It was my understanding that it was a new account. Your mother asked me if $I$ would do her a favor and help pay the utility bills, etc., if an emergency ever arose. I agreed only because she asked me to do this as a favor. I didn't want her to worry, nor. did I want to refuse her. That entergency, however, never arose. Soon after a month or so, she wer live with you. I never wrote a check on that accoun mon to the check book. (You fail to mention that I returned. I never even saw small check, I believe of $\$ 10.00$ that your mother mad you personally a that account. I could be mistaken but I am almost sure out to me from account. At that time I suggested that next time in San Diego, to plat close this account, now that your mother was at your side. Do you remember?)

In the same second paragraph, you mention that "she felt it was her responsibility to provide a home." You may or may not know, but throughout the years everytime your mother mentioned this to me, I always said to her that the house should go to the church. She told me that she preferred to put my name on the property and to let me give it to the church on my death if I wished. Further more I always told her to check with the family first.

Again in the same paragraph you mention that I made a comment about "children's behavior towards aging parents." If I did make a statement such as that it was not intended to be personal in anyway. It was a genexal statement. REDAC I know for a fact that you have been an exemplary daughter as well as your other sisters and I'm sorry this statement has been misinterpreted.)

In the third paragraph, you mention that your mother both by mail and phone said that she was coming to San Diego on that particular Friday. I was delighted and looking forward to seeing you and your husband and your mother. I waited all day Friday. (Somewhere, lack of communication.) Saturday you arrived and I was not in - maybe even out of town. I don't remember. (I felt no reason to call again because your mother phoned the rectory either that same day or a couple of days aftewards and left the message, that other arrangements had been made. She would try to see me next time in San Diego. I felt no need to call, I just presumed the situation was taken care of.)

In the fourth paragraph, you mention that your mother had put my name on her property. This was her wish. She wanted to do this for me. It was my intent that the house would eventually go to the church. She understood this. When I asked her about the children she answered "the children are well taken care of." (I'm glad you mentioned the declaration of trust. This was documented giving her all rights to her property. She could do whatever she wanted freely. But you fail to mention that I took my name off the deed and gave the house back to your mother when she wanted to sell the house. Your mother has sold the house and she has the money. As regards the will, that's between the lawyer and the person making the will.)

In the fifth paragraph you complain about my reply to you. I'm sorry but I thought the note I sent you was an answer to your letter.

In the sixth paragraph, you mention phone calls. Your mother has both by mail and phone, contacted me and asked me to call her, not to forget her. So I have. (You may or may not be aware, I told her l couldn't

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call as often as I would like to, because it was too costly. So we agreed that one time I'd call collect, she would pay and the next time I'd pay. We would alternate. And we agreed to cut down our calls to once or twice a month. This would help keep down the phone bill. A couple of times I told her that $I$ thought it was too expensive for her. She'd always answer "please don't worry I enjoy talking to you." (Please remember your mother has been calling me for over 25 years once or twice a week. It was a way of life with her.)
