Rev. Herve Carrier Named Pastor at Lille; Will Be Succeeded by Rev. McKeone

Rev. Herve Carrier, assistant at Holy Cross parish in Lewiston since 1951, has been named pastor of Our Lady of Mount Carmel parish at Lille.

Word of his assignment to that pastorate reached here today and it was disclosed that he is to be succeeded at the Lewiston parish by another native of the city, Rev. Lucien McKeone, assistant at St. Joseph's parish at Biddeford for the past three months. Rev. McKeone formerly served at Rumford.

Commending the work of Father Carrier in the parish, Rt. Rev. Msgr. Felix Martin, the pastor, noted today that he was founder of the Ladies of Charity and the St. Vincent de Paul Sodality of the parish, for which he has served as chaplain since their institution. He is chaplain of the Alumni of Holy Cross school and can be credited with much of the success of the 25th and 35th anniversary observances of the school in 1952 and 1962, the pastor said. Liquor Can Be Sold 'Til 2 A.M. New Year's Eve

On New Year's Eve, liquor can be sold in the Twin Cities, as elsewhere in Maine, until 2 o'clock in the morning.

That was the word today from Timothy J. Murphy, director of the Enforcement Division of the Maine Liquor Commission.

Murphy noted that law provides "liquor may be sold on Jan. 1 of any year from midnight to 2 a.m. unless Jan. 1 falls on Sunday." This year it doesn't.

Licenses may allow consumption of liquor on the premises until 2:15 a.m. Friday, Jan. 9. All licensees who sell liquor on Friday, Jan. 1, Murphy said, must publicly display their 1965 licenses on the premises.

Larceny Charge Is Filed

A charge of larceny of a motor vehicle, brought against a 43-year-old Waterville man, a former resident, was filed on a plea of innocent in Lewiston Municipal Court today.

Adelard J. Maillet, represented by Attorney Louis Scouffe, had been charged with taking a rental car from the Spofford's Chevron Station, 135 Bates St., Lewiston, July 28.

Noel T. Ouellette, the station operator, alleged that Maillet rented a car for three days, but kept it three weeks and three days. Police said the vehicle was found abandoned in Bar Harbor.

Judge Paul A. Cote, after hearing both sides, filed the case on the stipulation that Maillet pay to Ouellette \$5 a week until the sum of \$500 is paid in full.
