Mission Awareness Trip to Haiti

The response to our invitation in the summer issue of the newsletter, to join us on a missionary journey to Haiti in October this year, was excellent and speaks of the interest our sponsors take in the work of *Christian Child Care International*. It was thus with great regret that due to the prevailing political instability in that country, with the ongoing escalation of violence leading up to the national election in November this year, we had no choice but to postpone this trip indefinitely. Once the election is over we will reassess the political situation in Haiti and inform you eventually of a new possible departure date.

The reality on this island of Hispanola is that the killings have gradually intensified, claiming over 750 lives over the past 12 months. Many, if not most of the deaths have occurred in "Cite Soleil" one of the most desperate neighborhoods in the troubled capital Port-au-Prince, where amid relentless squalors arguments are settled with guns. In that very area Fr. Tony Mercieca and his team of courageous dedicated brothers run one of CCCI's sponsorship programs and a hospital for AIDS patients. That indeed deserves all our admiration and respect, considering the horrendous circumstances they face on a daily basis.

Let's hope that some of you too will be witness to the dedication and mission of Fr. Tony and his team, in the not too distant future.

Each day, children in many poor and unhappy corners of the world receive a healthy meal to eat because of a generous sponsor.

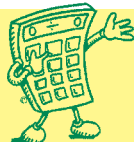
Beans, rice, perhaps a piece of chicken.

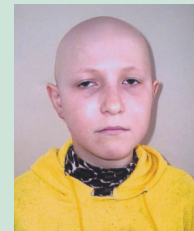
TUM1305
