

# Lawrence R. Overbaugh



cSHERRYSTOWN — Monsignor Lawrence R. Overbaugh, 78, a priest of the Diocese of Harrisburg, entered into God's eternal care Saturday, Feb. 23, 2008, at the home of his sister, Marie A. Smith.

Born in McSherrystown on Dec. 13, 1929, he was a son of the late J. Clarence and Helen C. (Topper) Overbaugh.

Msgr. Overbaugh was a member of the class of 1947 of Delone Catholic High School in McSherrystown, and a graduate of St. Charles Borromeo Seminary, Philadelphia. He also received his Master of Education degree from Villanova University.

Ordained to the priesthood by the late Bishop George L. Leech on May 28, 1955, at St. Patrick's Cathedral, Harrisburg, and honored with the title of Monsignor in November 1972, he served as associate pastor at St. Anthony of Padua Parish, Lancaster, and Church of Our Lady, Mount Carmel. He\_

also served as principal of Lebanon Catholic High School and of Mount Carmel Catholic High School, and was director of the Mission Board of the Diocese of Harrisburg.

He was assistant pastor at St. Edward's Parish in Shamokin; Church of Our Lady; St. Joseph Parish, Locust Dale; SS Cyril & Methodius, Lebanon, and St. Patrick Parish, Harrisburg. He was the spiritual director and professor of Lebanon Catholic High School, and was in residence at St. Paul's Parish, Annville. Pastoral assignments included St. Lawrence Parish, Harrisburg; Immaculate Conception Parish, New Oxford; Church of Our Lady; administrator pro tem of St. Monica Parish, Sunbury, and post-retirement residence at Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary Church, McSherrystown, where he celebrated daily Mass, visited the sick, and spent time helping in the parish school.

Some of the offices Msgr. Overbaugh held were, Scout chaplain in the Lancaster Area; secretary and executive secretary of the Mission Board of the Diocese of Harrisburg; secretary-treasurer of the Priest's Advisory Council, member of Diocesan Cemetery Board; member of the Diocesan Ad Hoc Committee on Catholic Education; member of Diocesan Council of Administration; member of Diocesan Committee for Aid to Needy Parishes, and was on the Board of Directors for the Harrisburg Catholic Publishing Associates.

On Oct. 19, 1972, Msgr. Overbaugh was appointed honorary prelate to His Holiness Pope Paul VI.

An Eagle Scout, he was an active supporter of the Boy Scouts. He was a member of the Knights of Columbus, and enjoyed music, reading, golfing, swimming and outdoor activities.

Surviving are three brothers, Philip J. Overbaugh of Hanover, Msgr. Hugh A. Overbaugh of Harrisburg, and Joseph C. Overbaugh of Lancaster; eight sisters, Mary Clare Weaver of McSherrystown, Elaine M. Pace of Van Nuys, Calif., Jean T. Heidler of York, Constance A. Keffer of Amelia Island, Fla., Marie A. Smith of McSherrystown, Rosemary E. Cook of Lancaster, Joyce C. Groft of McSherrystown, and Sheila M. Hennessy of Shepherdstown, W.V.; numerous nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by two brothers, Jerome E. Overbaugh and Bernard F. Overbaugh, and a sister, Charlotte "Patty" Overbaugh.


