

Bro. George Sheehan Leaving Salesian High

The Rev. Bro. George M. Sheehan, guidance director at Salesian High School the past seven years, has been transferred to St. Dominic Savio High School, East Boston, where he will take on the task of revitalizing the guidance program. The change was announced recently by the Rev. John J. Malloy, Provincial Superior of the Salesians of St. John Bosco.

Bro. Sheehan came to Salesian in 1963 after nine years as guidance director at Don Bosco, Technical High School, Paterson, N.J. During his years at Salesian, he developed a detailed four-year group guidance program. He was also instrumental in helping graduates each year to get into college and after graduation many alumni returned for personal guidance from Bro. George.

The moving force in introducing dramatics at Salesian in 1963, he moderated this activity from its beginning and directed four of 11 plays given during the past seven years. Through his efforts, Salesian High School's Dramatics Club became a member of the Na-

tional Theater Arts Conference in 1968.

Since 1965, Bro. Sheehan has been moderator of the school yearbook, The Echo. He began the practice of the yearbook actice of the yearbook staff attending the annual yearbook workshop at Catholic

University in Washington, D.C. In 1967, when Salesian introduced Student Council, Bro. George became its sponsor. The same year he was appointed school catechist, in charge of the school's religious activities. During his three years as catechist, he modernized liturgical participation by the addition of folk Masses, liturgical happenings, and contemporary bible services.

Bro George is being replaced as guidance director and catechist by the Rev. John J. Vetere. Father Vetere, ordained to the priesthood in June of this year has a masters degree in religious education from the Pontifical College Josephinum in Columbus, Ohio, and a master's degree in counseling and guidance from Ohio State University.
