father Dion was born in Manchester, N. H., Jan. 17, 1917. He was ordained in St. Louis, Mo., on June 4, 1944, by the late John Cardinal Glennon. He joined the diocese of Salina 50

years ago.
Father Dion served in Norton from 1944-47; Aurora-Miltonvale-Meredith, 1947-60; Clyde, 1966-66; Leoville, 1966-70; Belleville-Munden, 1970-76; Hanover, 1976-80; and Clay Center, 1980-82.
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Since 1982 he has been living at Hanover and assists the pas-tor at Hanover-Greenleaf and other pastors in the area by offering weekend Masses, by assisting with penance services and other priestly work.

Bishop Fitzsimons likened Father Dion to the wisemen who came from the East to bring the good news to the people. He asked that the congregation find young people willing to share in

He also mentioned the other 50th anniversary being celebrated this week, that of D-Day.
