The reunion was organized by a handful of Father Schutty's former classmates — including Sheila Savidge of Raytown and Richard Hauber of Overland Park — who had contacted the rest of the group by telephone and planned the surprise.

Among the several hundred people attending were Dennis Noel of Minneapolis, who had been a student of Father Schutty. "He's been a good friend," Mr. Noel said. "He's lots of fun. I felt very happy for him."

Two of Father Schutty's former teachers, who are Benedictine Sisters in Atchison, Kan., also were there to congratulate him. Sister Theophane Reinecke taught Father Schutty during fourth through sixth grades.

Sister Beatrice Domann, who taught Father Schutty during second and third grades, said: "It was a joyful day . . . I enjoyed it immensely because I knew John so well. He was always very polite at the altar and very dependable."

After he finished at Guardian Argels School, Father Schutty began studying for the priesthood at Immaculate Conception Seminary in Conception, Mo. But after a couple of months he left the seminary and enrolled in what was formerly the De La Salle Military Academy. He graduated in 1950 with the rank of captain.

"I just couldn't get the Latin," he said, explaining his reason for leaving the seminary. "It just didn't work."

Father Schutty attended the University of Missouri-Kansas City and graduated with a major in theater. On Saturday, he was ordained for the Diocese of Jefferson City, Mo., and plans to serve somewhere in central Missouri.
