High Mass Offered at St. Ignatius

Mother Marianne Came From Family of 7 Religious

St. Ignatius.—Mother Marianne Adams, Ursuline religious, celebrated the 50th anniversary of her religious profession Nov. 13 at St. Ignatius. High Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Gabriel Menager, S.J. The girls' choir sang the Mass of the Infant Jesus, and at the Offertory "Quid Retribuim." In the afternoon a program was given by the pupils of Villa Ursula school.

Mother Marianne comes from a devout family whose home was in Lancaster, Wisc. Seven members have served as religious in the Northwest: Two brothers were Jesuits, three sisters were Ursulines, one other sister was a Franciscan. Of these religious only Mother Marianne and Mother Emmanuel, both of the Ursuline Order, still survive. A married brother and a sister still live at Lancaster, Wisc.

Most of the 50 years of Mother Marianne's religious life have been spent on the Indian missions, especially at St. Ignatius.
