

Director named for Big Brothers

A 35-year-old Fair Haven man has been named the new executive director of the Big Brothers-Big Sisters of St. Clair County.

Thomas J. Mousley, presently an area supervisor with Big Brothers-Big Sisters of Macomb County, will assume his St. Clair County directorship May 1.

Mousley was born April 25, 1939, in Wilmington, Del. He received a bachelor of arts degree in philosophy from St. Mary's College, Baltimore, Md., in 1961.

He completed graduate studies in social work from Catholic University of America in 1965. His field training in graduate school was with the National Training School for Boys in Washington, D.C.

A licensed certified social worker, Mousley has practiced social work in both the voluntary and public sectors.

He previously worked for the Department of Public Welfare and Catholic Social Services in Delaware.

He was active in the Big Brother movement both in Delaware and Pennsylvania. From 1966-1968, he was field representative for Big Brothers of Delaware Inc.

Between 1968 and 1971, he was the founding executive director of Big Brothers of Montgomery County, Pa., in suburban Philadelphia, where he was nominated by the Philadelphia Jaycees as Young Man of the Year in 1969.

Mousley moved to Michigan four years ago to serve as a consultant on youth ministry for the Archdiocese of Detroit, where he worked in parishes in Southfield and Farmington.

He recently completed studies at Sacred Heart Seminary in preparation to become a permanent deacon in the Catholic Church.

He assumed his present position Jan. 1, 1974, when five Big Brother and Big Sister agencies came together in a merger in metropolitan Detroit.

He has received advanced training in organizational administration from Big Brothers of America, at the C.S. Mott management institute in Flint, and

recently at the Kellogg management institute in Woodstock, Ill.

Mousley, who is single, lives at 8441 Dixie Highway, Fair Haven. He is a member of the Macomb County Social Workers Association and of Immaculate Conception parish in Anchorville, where he also teaches ninth grade catechism.

He has also served with both the Delaware and Michigan National Guards.

Mousley replaces former agency director Dennis C. White, who resigned several weeks ago. Mousley's salary will be \$14,500.

The agency, previously headquartered in St. Clair, has moved its offices to 411 Quay, in offices formerly occupied by the Port Huron Education Association.
