

Two Jesuits Will Say First Masses

One at St. Michael's,
Other at St. Teresa's

WOODSTOCK, Md.—Two young men from Buffalo are among the 49 Jesuit seminarians who will be ordained to the priesthood at Woodstock College here on Sunday, June 21. The ordaining prelate will be Most Rev. Francis P. Keough, D. D., Archbishop of Baltimore.

The seminarians are Rev. Francis E. Reilly, S. J., and Rev. John L. Farrand, S. J.

Ordination is the long-awaited goal of the course of studies prescribed by the Society of Jesus for its members, and the crowning achievement of 13 years of study and prayer.

The newly-ordained priests will return to their home parishes to celebrate their first Solemn Masses and impart their priestly blessings to their relatives and friends on Sunday, June 28.

Mass at St. Teresa's

The future Father Reilly is the son of the late Thomas E. Reilly, and Kathryn Eagan Reilly of Unger avenue, Buffalo. After graduating from St. Teresa's Parochial School, and from Canisius High School, he attended Canisius College for a year and then entered the Society of Jesus at St. Andrew-on-Hudson, Poughkeepsie. He completed his novitiate and classical studies there in 1944, and then went to Spring Hill College in southern Alabama for studies in philosophy and chemistry.

In 1947 he was sent to the Philippine Islands, where he was on the first faculty of the new Ateneo de San Pablo. In 1950 he returned to the United States by way of Rome and Europe to study theology at Woodstock College.

He will celebrate his first solemn Mass in St. Teresa's Church on Sunday morning, June 28, at 10:45. The pastor, Rev. Leo J. Toomey, L.L.D., will be archpriest, and Rev. Hugh J. McLaughlin, S.J., will preach. A reception will be held from 3 to 5 p. m. at St. Teresa's school.

Native of Stamford

The Jesuit was born in Stamford, Conn. on August 20, 1920. He was educated in Catholic, public and private schools in Forest Hills, L. I., Larchmont, N. Y., and Hollywood, Calif. He graduated from The Taft School, Watertown, Conn., in 1938. He attended Fordham University during the year 1938-39.

In 1939 he entered the Society

of Jesus at St. Andrew-on-Hudson, Poughkeepsie. Following his novitiate and classical studies, he studied Philosophy at Woodstock College, Woodstock, Maryland.

He came to Buffalo in 1946. He taught Latin, English and French and was moderator of the Behrens Debating Society at the old Canisius High School on Washington street for two years. He moved with the school to the new building on Delaware avenue in 1948, where he taught until 1949. During the year 1949-50 he taught at St. Peter's Prep., Jersey City, N. J. His theological studies were made at Weston College, Weston, Mass., and at Woodstock College.
